

Borger Will Play Host To World's Largest Fish Fry

The World's Largest Fish Fry will feature some of the country's top banjo pickers who will compete for a \$550 banjo tune.

The fry, which annually hosts about 5,000 people from throughout the country, decided this year that it would return a festival atmosphere to the event. The Aluminum Dome is the site once again.

John Griggs and Lou Cooley, both members of the Borger Chamber of Commerce, came up with the idea. They presented it to Fish Fry Commodore Tom Stone with the idea of putting the plan into effect in 1976.

However, the more the committee thought of it, the more it liked the idea.

So, Griggs and Mrs. Cooley set to work on the idea. They have gotten commitments from Dr. Charles Townsend, a recipient of the Grammy Award and the Wrangler Trophy of the National Cowboy Hall of

Fame, and Rip Ramsey, a former musician with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys, to judge the contest.

The committee is also trying to obtain a similar commitment from Roy Rogers, who will be in the area making a movie during the fish fry.

The pickers will compete for a \$550 Ibenex Blue Grass banjo with a hard shell case. Second prize will be \$75 cash. Third prize pays \$50 and fourth pays \$25.

Judging is based on four different areas including tuning, clarity of play, difficulty and originality with the piece. Entries must be received by June 3 with a \$5 fee.

Other rules include a maximum time of 10 minutes for two selections and one accompanist. Four or five string banjos will be allowed.

Entry blanks are available from the Chamber of Commerce, Box 911, Borger,

Texas 79007. In other fish fry developments, the food has been ordered and plans have been finalized for the event.

The fry, now in its 12th year, will use more than one and a half tons of fish for the festival. In addition, 1,000 pounds of cabbage and 1,500 pounds of french fries are being purchased.

Tickets for the festivities go on sale May 16 at a cost of \$1.50 in advance and \$2.00 at the door. The Women's Division of the Borger Chamber of Commerce is in charge of advance ticket sales.

The event was started by Borger businessmen in 1964 and after it got so large, the Chamber of Commerce took it over. More than 45,000 people have been served since its inception.

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



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STOP and LOOK

Religious Thoughts

The home was the first institution of mankind and was ordained by God Himself. There has always been down through the centuries a vast difference between the Biblical concept of marriage and the home and the various cultures of the nations of the world. This is no less true today. The Biblical concept of the home has ceased to be the concept of our modern American culture if it ever was. To say the least, the Biblical concept is greatly blurred through what we see today. The things the Bible says about marriage and the home sound strange to many people.

The Apostle Paul discussed the Biblical concept of marriage and the home with the Christian church of his day. He pointed out that the Christian concept is distinctive. The Christian home, according to the Apostle, is to be an example of the teachings of Jesus Christ. The Christian home, being this, is thereby different from the customs and culture of the times. This was so in the pagan culture of the Greek-Roman world. It is true today (Ephesians 5:22-33).

The Apostle Paul used Christ's love and concern for his church as an example of the love and concern that Christian home is to demonstrate (Eph. 5:22-33). He discusses the roles of the wife and husband and in that order.

The wife is to submit herself to her husband as unto the Lord. Most modern women, where this is concerned, say, "Now wait just a Minute!" The next statement of the Apostle even sounds more preposterous to the modern woman: "For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church." He closes his discussion of the wife's role by saying, "And the wife see that she reverence her husband." (v. 33).

About here the men are always saying, "Amen! Amen!", while the women are accusing the Apostle Paul of being an old bachelor who didn't know what he was talking about, and then the Apostle says, "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ, also loved the church, and gave himself for it" (Eph. 5:25). Now men, that's a lot of love! Christ died for the church. The Apostle is saying that a man ought to love his wife enough to die for her if necessary. This is a little more involved, fellows, than ruling the little lady with a rod of iron. The word Paul used for "love" means to put her before yourself. It means to prefer her before yourself. It means to think of her before you think of yourself. It means to consider her wishes, her desires, her comforts, before you do your own.

And while you are catching your breath, men, the Apostle Paul says, "So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself. For no man ever yet hated his own flesh, but nourisheth and cherisheth it..." (Eph. 28-29. Men if you need an explanation of this, you're too immature to be married. Let me spell it out for you anyway. It means that if you hurt that little lady, you are destroying your own flesh.

Ladies, the Apostle Paul wasn't such an old blow-hard after all, was he? You need to remember that the same Bible that tells your husband to love you so much also tells you to submit yourself to him in love (considering him first, putting him first, thinking first of his welfare).

This isn't all. The Apostle says that when you leave home to get married that you ought to really leave home! "For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh (Eph. 5:31). This means that you leave mom and dad and all the Kiss-and-kin. Your wife is first. That man you married comes first. You two are starting a new home, a new family unit. To go running back to mom and dad every time a little trouble comes up is taboo. It also says that mom and dad ought to keep their nose out of their kids business, fusses, and marriage problems and let them work them out for themselves. Parents with good intentions have caused a lot of divorces.

Does all of this sound strange to you? This is the Biblical concept of marriage and home building. This is what the Christian homes is to be. This is how it is to operate. This is how Christian husbands and wives are to relate to each other. Those who operate in this fashion seldom have to see a lawyer or a marriage counselor.

Each boy's trip is financed by the Salvation Army Service Unit Committee which is supported by contributions from citizens in the community," Bromley said.

Located on 360 wooded acres with a 30-acre lake, Camp Hoblitzelle is completely equipped with recreational facilities. It is owned by the Salvation Army and operated by the organization for children who could not otherwise enjoy a camp experience. Over 900 boys are expected to attend the four summer camps which the Salvation Army reserves each summer for boys from Service Unit communities.

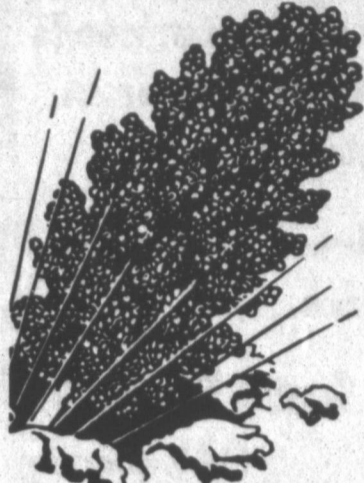
