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State Teenage Beauty Pageant To Unfold Here This Weekend

Forty-nine contestants in the 1975 Miss Texas Teen-Ager Pageant will begin arriving in Clarendon tomorrow (Friday) to begin preparing for events in the contest. The fifth annual Miss Texas Teen-Ager will be crowned Saturday evening in the Harned Sisters Fine Arts building at Clarendon College.

The 1974 Miss Texas Teen-Ager, Cynthia Mitchell, of Seagraves will crown this year's winner. Also on hand will be the 1974 Miss National Teen-Ager, Lisa Lyon, of New Port Richie, Florida.

All contestants are due to arrive by 2 p.m. Friday and check into Knorrp Hall of Clarendon College where they will be housed throughout their stay in Clarendon.

The public is invited to attend the essay judging Friday evening in the auditorium of Clarendon College, beginning at 8:30 p.m. There will be no charge to the public. Girls who have entered the contest are

required to submit a 100 word essay entitled "What's Right About America" and present it orally to judges. Only five contestants will be chosen to present their essays at the finals Saturday night.

Final judging will take place Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. in the fine arts center, followed by a dinner and autograph party. The autograph party will be held in the lobby of Knorrp Hall at 10:30 p.m.

The 1975 winner of the pageant will receive many gifts including a \$500 scholarship to Clarendon College, a \$750 scholarship to the Fashion Institute of America at Atlanta, Georgia, a \$50 gift certificate from John's in Clarendon, a "Basic Concept, Now" beauty kit from Kay Eastep, an all-expense paid trip to Atlanta for six days to compete in the Miss National Teen-Ager Contest in August and a large arm bouquet from Harlan's Flowers in Clarendon.

The first runner-up will be presented a \$500 tuition scholarship to the Fashion Institute of America and the second runner-up will receive a \$250 scholarship to the modeling school. Winner of the essay

portion of the contest will receive a tuition scholarship from Clarendon College, presented by the Memphis Coca-Cola Bottling Company of Clarendon.

The entrant who receives the designation for best citizenship will be presented a \$100 Bicentennial savings bond from the Farmers State Bank and Trust Company of Clarendon.

Miss Congeniality will receive a \$50 tuition scholarship to attend Clarendon College presented by the Western Skies Motel in Clarendon.

In addition, the directors of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce will present the national director, Mrs. Sybil Shaffer, and Miss Lyon with traditional western hats during the pageant.

Mike Wells, a recording artist from Nashville, Tennessee, will arrive in Clarendon Friday afternoon to act as Master of Ceremonies for the Saturday night pageant.

Wells, a native of West Texas, will entertain the audience during the final judging with selections from his recordings on the Playboy label since moving to Nashville.

Phil Cates, State Representative from Pampa, sche-

duled to be one of the pageant judges, will be unable to attend because of commitments in Austin. Taking his place on the panel will be Zack Fisher of Memphis, owner of Fisher Red River Insurance Agency. Fisher is also a stock farmer and rancher and state Executive Director for the Republican Party of Texas.

Felony Warrants Issued For Pair In Home Burglary

Felony fugitive warrants have been issued by Donley County Justice of the Peace Carroll Lewis for two men wanted in the burglary of the James Gillispie home about a month ago.

Memorial Day Weekend Quiet, Only Two Accidents Reported

At least 31 people either visiting Donley County or travelling through the county during the three-day holiday weekend are a little sadder but wiser this week.

All were charged in Peace Justice Carroll Lewis' court for alleged violations from Saturday through Monday.

State Trooper Ray Burch, working alone while his partner Dwayne Nichols was vacationing, issued a total of 25 traffic citations for the three-day period, most of which were for speeding violations.

In addition, Burch investigated two accidents two hours apart which involved the same person on both occasions. According to accident reports filed by Burch, Danny Holland, about 19, was involved in an accident about 5:30 a.m. Saturday about one-fourth mile south of the Greenbelt Lake Dam when his car hit

the back of a boat which was blocking the highway. No injuries were reported in the accident, and only about \$200 damage to the boat trailer and motor.

About 1:30 a.m. Sunday, Patrolman Burch was called to investigate an accident on FM 2471 about six miles east of Clarendon. Burch reported that a 1974 Oldsmobile Cutlass driven by Holland was wrecked when Holland apparently fell asleep at the wheel. He estimated damage to the car at about \$3,000. Holland was not injured in the accident.

Burch reported that although traffic was heavy in Donley County over the weekend, there were few problems with motorists here.

Lake patrol issued one citation to the operator of a boat which cited five people with not wearing life jackets while operating the boat on Greenbelt Lake. Although

state laws prohibit Texas Game and Wildlife officers from issuing tickets to persons not wearing the protective garments, lake patrolmen are authorized to issue citations on Greenbelt Lake.

Game Wardens Dennis Thomas and Gary Hunt did issue eight citations which were filed with Justice of the Peace Lewis over the weekend. Three were for not having fishing licenses, four for failure to provide enough life jackets for occupants of a boat and one for operating an unregistered motor boat at Greenbelt.

Although Lake Greenbelt was inundated with visitors during the weekend, officials reported a relatively quiet holiday period with no one being arrested. Only one accident was reported, that being a youth suffering a broken arm. He was treated at Hall County Hospital in Memphis.

Two Clarendon Teachers Mark Retirement Sunday

Sunday will mark the official retirement date of two Clarendon elementary school teachers who, combining their total years in the school system, account for more than 44 years of teaching in Clarendon.

Retiring as of that date will be Wilma K. Batson and Mildred P. Hendrix, who for many years, have occupied teaching desks only a few feet apart in the school here.

Mrs. Batson began her teaching career in 1930 at the age of 18 when she began teaching youngsters at the old Ashtola School when it was a two-room school with only a handful of pupils. For the past 17 years, she has taught in the Clarendon system.

Mrs. Hendrix began her teaching career in 1934, serving the schools in Hall County (Bethel, Brice and Leslie) for 10 years before moving to Donley County to teach a total 29 years. Her tenure with the Clarendon Schools began 27 years ago, and has consisted of instructing the first and third grades all of those years.

Mrs. Batson has been a life-long resident of Donley County, and lived in Lelia Lake all of her life until moving to Clarendon following her husband's death in 1964. She was the daughter of the Mr. and Mrs. H.R. King.

Many of the schools where

she was service, were the one and two room variety, including Ashtola, Windy Valley (just a few miles south of Lelia Lake) and the early Clarendon School.

She has many fond memories of the children that have passed through her classes, including one youngster that expressed sincere wishes that "he wished she was smart enough to go on to the third grade with us".

Like most people, Mrs. Batson remembers the pleasant happenings more vividly than anything else, but she can also remember the days when teachers made only \$70 a month and considered themselves lucky.

For many years, she said, teachers were required to see that kindling and coal were brought into the classroom at the end of each day, ready for use the following morning. When the oil burning heaters were acquired in the schools where she taught, it was a day to remember, she says.

"All in all, it has been a joy to teach the hundreds of young children that have been in my classes down through the years," she said. "It brings a lot of fond memories to know what you've done for children in your career."

Mrs. Batson began her teaching work when a teaching certificate could be

obtained after only one year of college study. She obtained her elementary teachers certificate after attending Clarendon College for one year and began teaching when she was only 18 years of age.

However, additional education was necessary to continue in her life-long career, and she obtained her BS Degree in 1949 from West Texas State College in Canyon. She also earned a Masters Degree in elementary education from the same college in 1959.

Following her retirement, Mrs. Batson plans to relax a lot, travel occasionally to visit friends and relatives and pursue her hobbies of painting and sewing in her spare time.

The first years of Mrs. Hendrix's career was marred by an unfortunate memory. While teaching the first year at the Bethel School in Hall County, the school building burned completely to the ground during the last month of school.

Although the county school superintendent was willing to allow the students and teachers a long vacation and do away with the last month of school that year, the teachers set up shop in one of the houses furnished teachers at that time, borrowed desks and books and continued teaching until school was dismissed for the

summer.

For the next eight or nine years, she continued to teach at Brice and Leslie before moving on to Chamberlain where she taught for one year and then to Martin School for two more years.

Then, she assumed teaching duties at the Clarendon School which was located in the present city hall building. She has been with the local school system ever since, and has taught only second grade students with the exception of the first year when she had third grade students.

Mrs. Hendrix also attended Clarendon College for one year, then after a short absence, resumed studies at West Texas State College, receiving a BS Degree in elementary education in 1941. She completed requirements for her Masters Degree in the same field in 1957.

Not unlike her fellow retiree, Mrs. Hendrix hopes to do a little travelling and a lot of work around her home in Clarendon in the future years. She likes to cook, sew and paint in addition to working in her yard.

Mrs. Hendrix has one son, Martin, who is presently a student at West Texas State University in Canyon. His wife, Debrah, is also a student at Amarillo college enrolled in the RN program there.

Her husband, Amos Dewey Hendrix, died in July, 1963.

Mrs. Batson has no

children of her own, but adopted two small cousins several years ago, and these are her children.

Mack Tomlinson, 22, is presently attending Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene where he is preparing to

become a minister, and Donna Kaye Scott, 25, is married and the mother of three children.

Nobody's Perfect But...

Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Clarendon College will be host for the fifth annual Miss Texas Teen-Ager Pageant. From what we've been able to find out, tickets to the pageant are getting a little thin because a local demand is eating into the supply rapidly.

Although the pageant is not expected to actually bring a lot of money into town like the Miss America Pageant would, we consider it an honor for Clarendon to be the host city for this year's activities.

Perhaps the people who come to Clarendon this weekend will be a bit disappointed with the size town we have here, but we're sure that most will enjoy the wide-open spaces that surround this community and the beautiful scenery that is typical of the Panhandle.

Moreover, we're sure that many of these folks will agree with us that it will be a pleasant change from driving the crowded freeways and expressways of the larger cities in Texas to get somewhere.

After all, about the only traffic jam in town is usually in front of the post office about 9:30 each morning. What could be better?

Speaking of traffic jams, if you happened to be one of the thousands who visited Greenbelt Lake during the holiday weekend, you found true togetherness. Many late arrivals were forced to camp far from the water's edge, creating one of the largest congestion areas this country has seen since Labor Day weekend last year.

Just by watching the traffic flow into town from the east and west, it appeared Greenbelt received more than its share of patronization from far and wide over the weekend.

Out of curiosity, we visited the lake late Saturday night with friends and found the entire north and east sides of the lake a mass of reflectors in our headlights. Many families were still fishing at a late hour, taking advantage of the few boats still on the lake at that time of day.

Perhaps the amazing part of it all, is the fact that Greenbelt Lake has had only three deaths in its history. Even one of those did not involve drowning. This low death toll has made the lake perhaps one of the safest in the State of Texas.

While researching other news stories around the court house this week, we checked with Peace Justice Carroll Lewis, who also acts as coroner for Donley County, and found that only two persons have been victims of drowning since the lake was completed several years ago.

The first recorded death in the waters of Greenbelt was on August 11, 1968, when Joseph Shadle drowned after a boat occupied by he and his father overturned. Kevin Mooney of Amarillo was the second victim, being one of the occupants of a small boat which sank on June 30, 1974.

The third death related to Greenbelt Lake was on July 17, 1972, when a cave being dug by several youngsters collapsed and killed Richard Pearson.

Perhaps much of the safety record for the lake should be credited to the lake patrolmen and Texas Game and Wildlife officers who keep a vigil around the shores of Greenbelt Lake. Many people who receive citations for violations while operating boats around the lake don't like to pay the fines involved, but by the same token, have violated laws designed to protect them.

This weekend was no different, since at least four people were ticketed by game officers for not having enough life jackets in the boat to take care of all passengers. This is an open invitation for disaster since it is not unusual for high winds to strike lakes in this area with little warning.

One other thing we would like to point out is the fact that although state game officers cannot issue citations for occupants of a boat not wearing life jackets, the lake patrolmen who are employees of Greenbelt Water Authority can.

This comes as a surprise to some people. Although the lake patrolmen generally warn the occupants of a boat to wear the protective gear before issuing any tickets, a few people find themselves in JP court dishing out money for unnecessary fines.

Several weeks ago, we had an article in this space relating to a clean-up campaign in Clarendon in preparation for the visitors that will be received here this weekend. The article was a little difficult to write since our building was one of the real buggers and needed a lot of work done cutting weeds and picking up trash and junk around the rear.

We would like to point out that this has been done, even though it wasn't an easy task. It's a lot like our Christmas shopping intentions every year. We intend to start early, but somehow it is never finished until the last moment.

In an ad on the classified page of today's paper, there is a notice that the Clarendon Press will be closed Friday. We will be closing for a three-day weekend mainly because it was necessary for our employees to work Monday while others were enjoying a long Memorial Day weekend.

We are asking that any business that needs to be conducted prior to next Monday be done before closing time Thursday so it won't be necessary for our employees to come into the office off and on throughout the weekend.

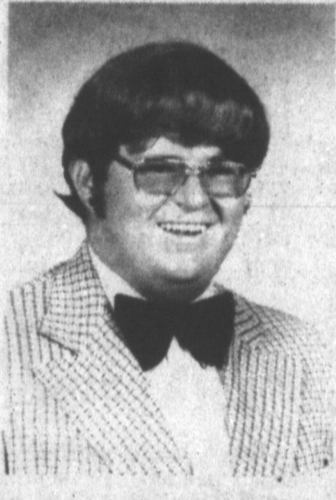
Dr. Caldwell Receives Highest Medical Foundation Award

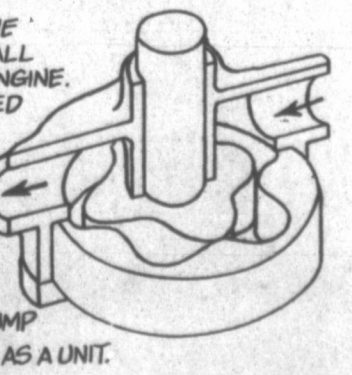

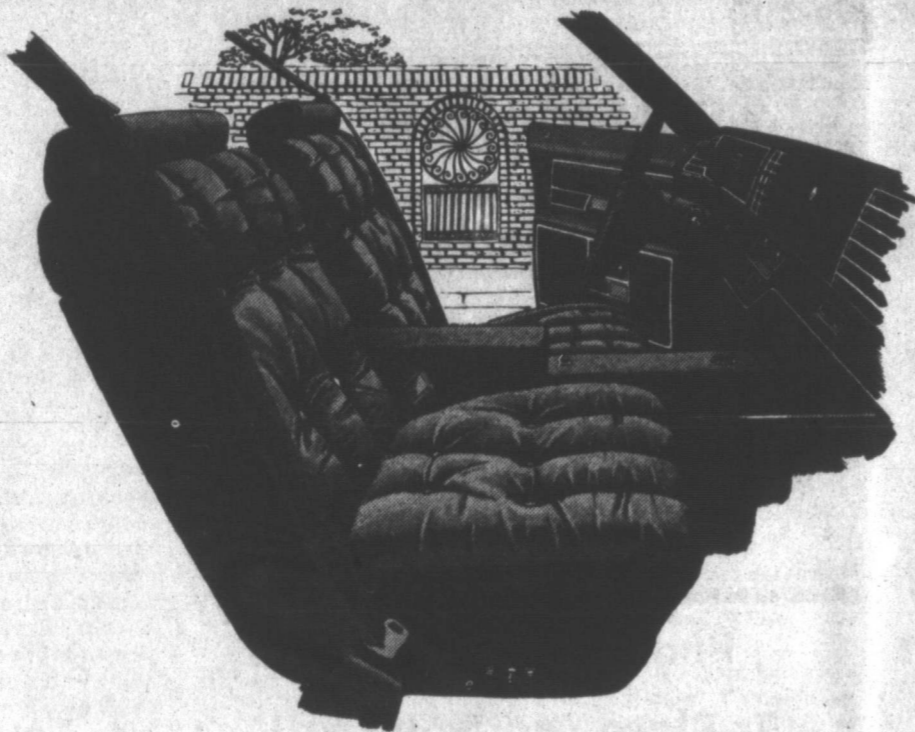

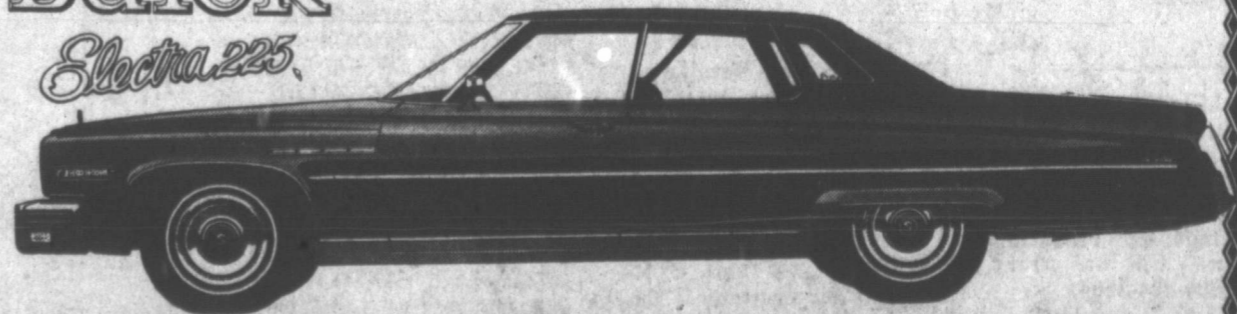
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
