Interview With Hospital Administrator

Board's Proposal To Help Rid Tax Burden

The Donley County Hospital District Board is presently attempting to figure out a way to relieve the taxpayers of a tax burden on a hospital which isn't even open.

In an interview with Gerry Knight, hospital administrator, said, "We have been researching various ways we could perhaps open the facility and at the same time maybe end some of the conflict. What the board thought it might do is find a health concern which would have an interest in the facility, come in and take a look at it and then lease the facility. Let them take over the operations of the facility and thereby nobody could say Old Joe out here is a farmer and doesn't know anything about it. It would be run by

professional people who had top management, and there would be no controversy. The idea in mind was to set it up in such a manner to reduce the taxes. Everything went along fine until a supreme court ruling concerning the issuance of bonds for the purpose of financing a private enterprise in Galveston. This left doubt as to whether we could do this with the hospital."

The Board is considering making the hospital wing into a nursing home from an economical standpoint. The present 22 bed nursing home facility at the Medical Center cannot create enough cash flow to pay for itself. The board will discuss the issue further at its next meeting on Tuesday, August 12. What the board is trying to do now is find out if it is feasible to

do this.

The board is concerned as to whether such a move would require a vote of the people. Attorneys for the district are checking rather or not this will be necessary.

"We are in debt from the 1974 operations," continued Knight. "This means after the taxes are collected for this year that the bond and interest payment must come out of the taxes, then warrants which were taken out for last year. After all of this is paid there are no taxes left for this year. So this eliminates all our sources of revenue. This means that this facility at the very minimum must break even. If it stays as is, then the district cannot operate. Then something must be done to generate more revenue. So this is our thought to be able to convert this side into a nursing home. Studies show that to do so we would not only be able to break even, but to make some money. Cover our operation and come out of the hole."

"Two years would probably be required to make the proposal work. Instead of losing \$42,000 a year, we could possibly clear \$15,000. If no agreement can be reached then there is no way to continue operating such as has been done. We can help heal our sores while meeting a need."

"What the whole purpose of the whole thing is to create a facility first of all that is economically stable," said Knight. "Second to be able to come back through and create a multi purpose facility that can provide a nursing home, clinic area and hospital, but not cost the taxpayers so confounded much."

"Now the only way we can do this is to be able to go back through and utilize what we have the best possible way we can, as economically as possible and then come back through again and re-establish and add what we need to make it stable. That is the basis, the whole reason behind the whole thing is what can be done. What we do to create a facility that can be an asset to the community, to the district and can eliminate the difficulties which we have had in the past. But again it is something that cannot be done over night."

"Right now if four physicians were to walk in and say they were ready to start practicing medicine, where would I get the funds to be able to open the hospital. This year we are paying off last year's operations and without even taking a look at this year's yet. There will have to be something else to pay for this year's expenses until it comes to the point where we don't have to worry about paying for it, it will come through on its own."

For First Time Since 1949

Commissioners Increase Land Evaluations

Inflation and higher prices forced Donley County Commissioners to raise land evaluations by \$2 per acre thus increasing county taxes on grass and farm land for the first time since 1949 at a called meeting July 28th.

For 26 years the county has operated under the old tax structure which has become obsolete since salaries, living costs, costs of supplies and materials have risen since the post war days.

"We're not a profit making institute," said Donley County Judge Billie Christal. "But we can't do it with the present

Assistance Available Under ECM Program

HEAVY RAINS have caused severe damage in Donley County and farms suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Measures Program administered by the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), according to the August newsletter.

FARMERS ARE entitled to assistance if the damage: (1) is unusual in character and is not the type which would recur frequently; (2) materially affects the productive capacity of the farmland; (3) if not treated will impair or endanger the land; (4) will be so costly to correct that the farmer cannot do it without federal assistance and is truly an emergency condition for the farmer. That is, it is so severe that the farmer cannot correct it using his normal labor supply and farm equipment that is normal for the area and his other resources are such that assistance is required to restore the land.

A FARMER qualifying for ECM assistance may receive up to 80 percent of the cost of performing the following types of measures: (1) removing debris from farmland; (2) grading, shaping or releveling severely damaged farmland; (3) restoring permanent fences; (4) restoring conservation structures and other similar installations.

FARMERS WHO feel the damage is sufficiently severe and their capabilities are such that assistance is necessary to correct the problem, should contact the county ASCS office, and request assistance by not later than September 2nd, the deadline for filing requests. Wheat production must be reported within 15 days after harvest for the farm to be eligible for disaster payments. Farmers need to get their production in as soon after harvest as possible. If a crop is abandoned, the farmer must report it and have it appraised before it is plowed up. Failure to do so could cost the farmer his disaster payment. If a farmer has hegar or other feed grains he intends to graze or hay, it too, must be appraised if he thinks the farm might be eligible for feed grain disaster payment.

MONROE WILL attend Clarendon Junior College in the fall where he plans to major in accounting.


KENNETH KING TO PLAY IN TEXAS-OKLAHOMA GAME


Two Clarendon Women Get Honors

The atmosphere chill of a new football season can already be felt as Clarendonites anxiously await September 5th when they will get a chance to see Jerry Wilson and his Bronchos in action.

Wilson will hold the Bronchos' head coaching reins for the first time. Wilson assumed his new duties after Clyde Nonkster resigned earlier this summer.

Assisting Wilson with the coaching duties will be Bill Crockett and Doug Keeney. Crockett comes to Clarendon from Claude where he has been assistant coach for the past three years. He is a graduate of McLean High School and has 10 years of teaching and coaching experience.

In an interview with Wilson Tuesday morning he told The Press that 62 boys have signed up for high school football. Of these 25 players will makeup the varsity squad and the rest will be on the junior varsity.

"All positions are open and anybody has a chance to try for a position he wants to play," said Wilson. "After four or five days we will be able to see who can play position the best. We want all the kids to play. We want the Bronchos to be a team, everybody helping each other."

Two-a-days will start at 8:30 Monday morning, August 11th when Coach Wilson will get a look at all of his players for the first time. The players will work out twice a day on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, and only once a day on Wednesday and Saturday.

Coach Wilson considers John Hall, a 6', 165 pound, halfback and linebacker, a great sophomore prospect for the 1975 Bronchos. Religious Thoughts

MARRIAGE AND THE HOME

The home was the first institution of mankind and was ordained by God Himself. There has always been down through the centuries a vast difference between the Biblical concept of marriage and the home and the various cultures of the nations of the world. This is no less true today. The Biblical concept of the home has ceased to be the concept of our modern American culture. To say the least, the Biblical concept is greatly buried though what we see today. The things the Bible says about marriage and the home sound strange to many people.

The Apostle Paul discussed the Biblical concept of marriage with the Christian church of his day. He pointed out that the Christian concept is distinctive. The Christian home is to be an example of the teachings of Christ. Being this, the Christian home is thereby different from the customs and culture of the times. This was so in the pagan culture of the Greek-Roman world.

The Apostle Paul used Christ's love and concern for his church as an example of the love and concern that the Christian home is to demonstrate. He discusses the roles of wife, husband, and children (Eph. 5:22-33).

The wife is to submit herself to her husband as unto the Lord. Most modern women say, "Now wait just a minute!" The next statement of the Apostle even sounds more preposterous to the modern woman: "For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church." He closes his discussion of the wife's role by saying, "And the wife see that she reverence her husband." (v33).

About here the man are saying, "Amen! Amen!", while the women are accusing the Apostle Paul of being an old bachelor who didn't know what he was talking about, and then the Apostle says, "Husbands, love your wives even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it" (Eph 5:25). Now's a lot of love. Christ died for the church. The Apostle is saying that a man ought to love his wife enough to die for her if necessary. This is a little more involved, fellows, than ruling the little lady with a rod of iron. The word Paul used for "love" means to put her before yourself. It means to think of her before you think of yourself. It means to consider her wishes, her desires, her comforts, before you do your own.

And while you are catching your breath, men, the Apostle Paul says, "So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself. For no man ever yet hated his own flesh, but nourished and cherished it." Men, if you need any explanation of this, you are too immature to be married. Let me spell it out for you anyway. It means that if you hurt that little lady, you are destroying your own flesh.

Ladies, the Apostle Paul wasn't such an old Blow-hard after all, was he? You need to remember that the same Bible that tells your husband to love you so much also tells you to submit yourself to him in love (considering him first).

This isn't all. The Apostle says that when you leave home to get married that you ought to really leave home. "For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh."

Does all of this sound strange to you? This is the Biblical

concept of marriage and the home. This is what the Christian home is to be. This is how it is to operate. This is how Christian husbands and wives are to relate to each other. Those who operate in this fashion seldom have to see a lawyer or a marriage counselor. Things work themselves out in an atmosphere of love and devotion of the husband for his wife and the wife for the husband. Children raised in this atmosphere seldom have any problems either.

valuation increase the same amount of land would increase \$2 per acre, thus making the assessed valuation \$3600 and county taxes on said property would be \$54.31. This increase would make the county taxes approximately \$19.27 more per section. The valuation increase only amounts to approximately 3.18 cents per one hundred dollars on the tax structure.

The commissioners instructed County Clerk P. C. Messer to forward written notices to persons whose property had a proposed increase in valuation to appear before the Board of Equalization at 1 p.m. on Monday, August 11 and show cause why the value of their property should not be increased.

According to Judge Christal, Donley County possibly has the lowest tax structure across the board in the state.

A motion by Commissioner John Hill and seconded by Jess Finley set the tax rate for 1975 the same as before on property such as: regular ad valorem tax rate, 95 cents on \$100 valuation; farm to market road tax, 30 cents per \$100 valuation; and 14 cents on \$100 valuation for the Donley County Road Bond Fund.

Commissioner Gene White made a motion which was seconded by Commissioner Olace Hicks which carried to enter into an agreement with the city of Clarendon and the County Ambulance Authority to purchase through the Panhandle Emergency Medical Service System Inc. one mobile unit for the ambulance and pay share of system fee costs. The cost of the mobile unit will be \$1,379.25. The Ambulance Authority is to pay one-half, \$689.63, and the rest cost divided before the City of Clarendon and Donley County, each paying \$34.81 Hedley

questions and answers



(Have you a question about social security? Address it to the Social Security Administration, 317 East Third Street, Amarillo, Texas 79101. You will receive an answer in this column or by mail.)

Q. I fell and broke my leg last week. I will be at least six weeks before I can go back to my job. Would I be eligible for disability benefits?

A. Not unless there are complications. To be considered disabled under social security you must have an impairment that is so severe that it will prevent you from doing any substantial gainful work and is expected to last at least 12 months.

Q. I am not yet old enough to retire. My main concern is the welfare of my daughter who is my only dependent. She is 35 years old and so severely retarded from birth that she will never be able to work. In case of my death, would she be eligible for monthly benefits?

A. Yes, she would be eligible for monthly survivor's insurance benefits. She may also be eligible if you become entitled to disability or retirement insurance benefits. She could possibly qualify now for benefits under the new Supplemental Security Income Program. Contact your nearest social security office for more information.

Q. I am 61 years of age and became totally disabled in October 1974. I have not filed application for disability benefits because a friend tells me there is a big reduction in the amount of the benefit if you apply before age 65. Is this correct?

No, it is not correct. If you meet the disability requirements, your benefit amount will be computed as though you were 65 years old when you became disabled. There is no reduction.

SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE

Senator George McGovern will make the keynote address at the 30th annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America in San Antonio on Monday, August 11.

Theme of the meeting, which runs from August 10-13, will be "Land Use: Food and Living."

The senator is a long-time friend of conservation interests and served as a special assistant to President John Kennedy and director of the food for peace program prior to his election to the Senate in 1962.

Other speakers during Monday's opening session include Mrs. Francine I. Neff, Treasurer of the United States; San Antonio Mayor Lila Cockerell; and Ms. Peggy Toben, San Antonio Conservation Society. Program Chairman Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Temple, will preside.

More than a thousand professional conservationists from the United States, Canada, and Mexico are expected to attend the four-day meeting, which begins Sunday, August 10, with registration and a reception.

The society is a nonprofit scientific and education organization dedicated to advancing the science and art of good land use. It has about 14,000 members throughout the world.

Official hosts for the San Antonio meeting are the members of the society's Texas Council of Chapters.

Speakers at Tuesday's general session include Dr. A. H. Hannah, assistant deputy minister, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Canada; Dr. Gerald Thomas, president, New Mexico State University, Las Cruces; and Mel Davis, administrator, Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D.C., at the general session on Wednesday, August 13, speakers will include Dr. Anson Bertrand, Dean of Agricultural Science, Texas Tech University, Lubbock; John White, regional administrator, Environmental Protection Agency, Dallas; and Dr. Keith Arnold, director, Division of Natural Resources and Environment, University of Texas, Austin.

Other speakers at a series of 10 concurrent technical sessions will consider the land use implications of meeting domestic and foreign food demands. They will also discuss the impacts expanded agricultural production will have on the nation's soil, water, and other natural resources.

James Gillespie, Range Conservationist with the SCS at Clarendon will attend the meeting.
