

CROPS LOOK GOOD BUT RAIN NEEDED

The some 50,000 acres of cotton and grain sorghum in Donley County show signs of making a bumper crop but a good general rain is needed to finish spelling the word "bumper."

County Agent Ronnie Gooch said that moisture stress is showing up in many fields of grain sorghum, cotton and sunflowers.

Cotton prospects look good for most of the 10,000 acres of cotton remaining in the county, he said. The cotton acreage is down from the 21,000 acres planted last spring because of the heavy rains, blowing sand and hail that destroyed an estimated 11,000 acres in June. The damage came too late to replant cotton and producers

used the acreage for other crops.

Grain sorghum is in all stages of development from pre-boot to maturing grain but over all the sorghum crop is much later than normal. Acreage is much larger than last year's crop with some 40,000 acres compared to the 26,000 acres harvested in 1974.

Gooch said that in that late planted sorghum, the sorghum midge is a potential damaging insect that farmers should watch for. The small orange gnat is best seen as it crawls over spikelets of blooming sorghum. The adult midge is about 1/12 of an inch long and the females begin laying eggs soon after emergence in the individual

grain florets of the sorghum head. The eggs produce larvae that feed on and consume the developing grain.

Economic damage occurs, Gooch pointed out, when adult midge numbers exceed an average of two per head. He advised producers to apply treatment when 25 to

30 percent of the heads have begun to bloom if the average number of midge adults per head exceed two. If adults are still active from three to five days later, a second treatment will be necessary.

Farmers are frequently unaware of the midge until tell-tale blighted or blasted heads begin to appear, then

it is too late to attempt control, Gooch added.

As a service to the customer Todd will pick up for them at the warehouse Admiral and Norge major appliances. This usually means a reduction in costs to them.

T&M General Store was opened in October of 1971 and plans at that time were to stock clothing, grocery and kitchen items as well as furniture which accounts for the name "General Store" according to Bill Todd who, with his brother-in-law, J.G. McAnear, owns the business. Todd and McAnear joined forces in 1945 when he purchased the Household Supply furniture store in Clarendon and which they operated until February 1971 when a heart attack forced Todd into early retirement and the sale of the store. The silver medallions, 999 percent pure silver, are bought for the family as a whole while the \$2.50 bronze medallions are being ordered for each child and grandchild in the family, he added.

The medallion, designed by Mrs. Betsy Hawkins, art instructor at Clarendon College, shows an arrowhead, bowl of cotton and a steer head on one side and a flag of Texas and figures showing an Indian, a Spaniard and a pioneer settler on the other.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

How Grasses Will React To Grazing

When a grass seed is planted, there is enough food stored in the seed to sprout the seed and start green plant growth. From this point on, the plant must produce its own food to survive and reproduce.

Plant food is manufactured in the green leaves. It is not drawn directly from the soil as many people suppose. Roots draw water and minerals from the soil and these raw materials are transplanted to the leaves.

The leaves take the carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen from the air and combine them with the elements drawn from the soil. Then by using energy drawn from the sun, the leaf cells manufacture food for plant growth. Green leaves are the plants' food factory and without adequate topgrowth a grass plant cannot continually produce forage or seed.

Perennial grasses store food in their roots in late summer and fall. About 75 percent of the stored food is used to start new growth the following spring. If the grass is continually grazed so close that very little food is stored, the plant will not produce much forage the following year.

When most of the leaves are grazed off, a grass plant becomes a food user instead of a food factory. It must then rely upon food reserves in the roots to produce new top-growth. This causes a delay in forage production that can cover a period of several weeks or months. If the plant is repeatedly forced to draw upon root reserves to produce new leaves, the reserve food supply becomes exhausted and the plants become stunted or dies.

This occurred on a considerable amount of Donley County grassland during

the drought of 69 and 70. Some of our rangeland has not yet returned to normal production.

With the hot dry months of summer on us, now is a good time to be looking at our expected fall forage production. Overstocking at this time of the year means grass plants will automatically be pulling from their root reserves by this fall.

This weakens the plant and will have a direct bearing on the amount of winter grazing available. The weakened grass plant will also be much slower in greening up next spring, especially if we don't have good late winter rains.

Research shows that a grass plant must retain about 50 percent of its leaf area in order to dependably manufacture enough food to supply its own needs. The Soil Conservation Service has popularized the slogan "take half and leave half" for this reason.

This practice not only assures a rancher of future grass production but also protects his land from erosion due to the good grass cover on the soil.

Plowin' Out the Corners

Maybe not as a child, but especially later, I admired my father's ability to make money. To pinpoint it just a little more I think it was the way he could always come out at the end of the year with a larger backlog of savings than when he had started. Much later we would talk with him and some of his rules would work even in this hard to save era of spending.

First, it seemed in those days that someone was always "Getting in a tight spot financially" and someone with a good credit or a little cash could snap up a bargain. He worked continually to keep his credit good and also often had a little bit of cash. He would buy this bargain and then set about to pay the biggest half of every dollar he took in on this debt. Even as children we just couldn't imagine anyone being so mean as not paying his debts. We could do without the so-called necessities to do that...Pretty soon the farm, or whatever it was, would be all paid out, and sitting there comfortably in the savings or backlog.

We didn't have enough room in those early days to run range cows so he turned to hogs...The price of hogs in those days consistently went up and down in cycles. When they would get dirt cheap and everyone was quitting the hog business he would start picking up a few for a proverbial song and would turn them out on the fence rows and my mother's chickens. He would feed them just enough to make them come home to roost, always keeping them a shade and a mud hole. Anyway, the most of them came home. At the proper time he would breed the gilts and then it seemed so many many times the demand for hogs would come back and he would clean up on selling bred gilts.

He believed that if you owed for something that would make a profit on its own, then you took other money you earned and put on that debt that soon you would own it. He could come the nearest of paying over half of every earned dollar on some investment. He managed to live on the little half of the income. I reckon, this would be hard to do in this age...Folks might call one a bit of a close manager.

26 Injured In Donley Accidents

The rural traffic accident summary for Donley county during the first seven months of 1975, shows a total of 35 accidents resulting in one persons killed and 26 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1975, shows a total of 568 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 398 persons injured as compared to July, 1974, with 485 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 280 persons injured. This was 83 more accidents, four more killed, and 118 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

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Religious Thoughts

By DR. JAMES BRANDON

The Christian individual and the church need a better understanding of the special needs and special abilities of the older.

We need to remember that the individual does not become someone else as he grows older. People do not develop drastically different personalities overnight at the point of retirement. A person has the same basic needs and general traits when he is 70 as he had when he was younger. The aging do not suddenly become either self-sufficient or dependent, responsive or withdrawn, hopeful or hopeless. They had these qualities earlier although they may become more pronounced in later years.

The general needs of older persons can be summed up as follows: They need to love and be loved. They need friends and companionship. They need to be useful. They need activities in keeping with their abilities. They need adequate income for food, clothing, lodging, health care, and some miscellaneous purposes. They need recreation along with an opportunity to entertain as well as to be entertained. Older persons need to continue to grow through mental stimulation, keeping up with the times; and learning new facts. They need physical care. When they are well and active, care means regular examinations to discover problems which may be treated. When they are handicapped, care means rehabilitation and special provisions for them in the home. When they have serious chronic illness or are physically or mentally incapacitated, care may even mean institutional services.

Older persons may need financial and legal counsel and, when they do, the role of the family member will be to encourage them, in a non-threatening manner, to get such help. They need to be an integral part of the normal life of the family, the church, and the community. They need to feel that friends and family members do things with them, not just for them. Most older people do not want to be around their children or grandchildren all of the time. They value their privacy very highly and generally prefer to maintain in their own homes. The best living arrangements for older people may be with their relatives, but this is often not the case. Usually, this is pushed upon them by younger members of the family who wouldn't have it that way for themselves at all under the same situation.

Older persons often need transportation for a variety of purposes. For instance, they may need help getting to the grocery store, the doctor, the drug store, the church services and etc.

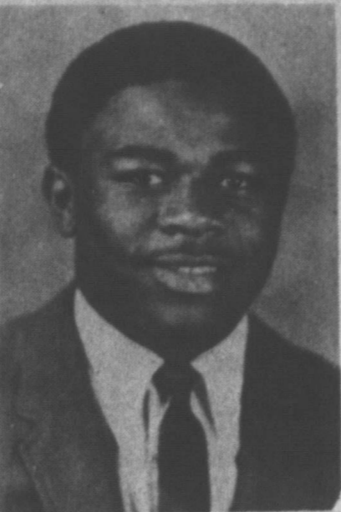
Christian families, churches, and communities should be aware of the deep spiritual needs of their aging members. The aging especially need the assurance of God's continuing love and protection, release from anxiety about illness and fear of death, spiritual growth through new experiences with the Lord, and a continuing feeling of usefulness in the work of the Lord. Certainly the greatest need for those who have come to old age without Christ is to come to a personal acceptance of Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. It is never too late to make this decision.

There are many things which older family members can give to those younger people around them: They can give encouragement and understanding to those who are struggling toward certain goals or who face frustrating circumstances. They can communicate a feeling of rich heritage by serving as a link between the younger generation and those who have gone before. They can offer the gift of respect for persons who have differing ideals and life styles. They can offer a listening ear to concerns of younger people, and from experience and wisdom they should be able to help. They can help others with undue anxiety and guilt by going as open as possible about their own experiences in life. They can offer the gift of their time and helpfulness, not feeling rejected if it is not always accepted.

Older persons have a unique opportunity to share the gift of Christian faith since they have had a longer period of time to test it and nurture it. They can be a living example of how to grow older with grace and dignity and still be useful to their church and community.

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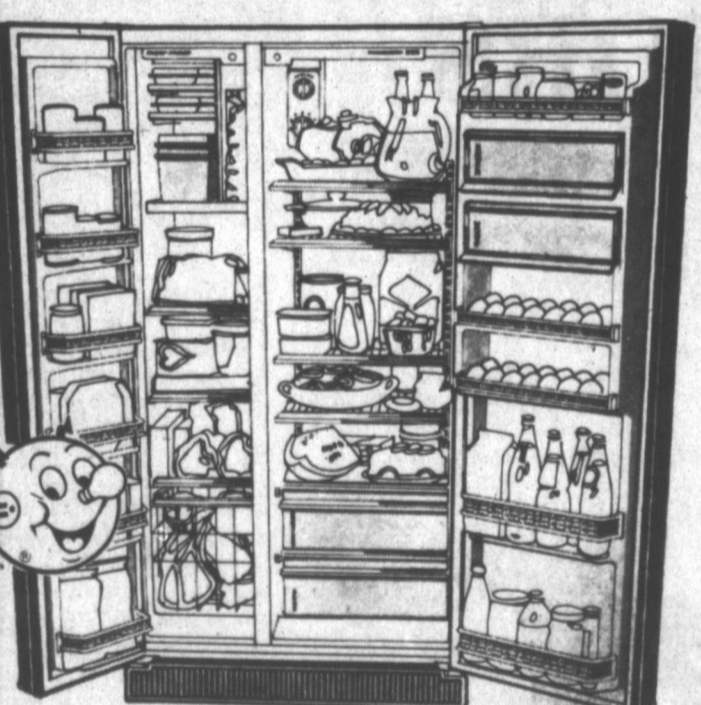

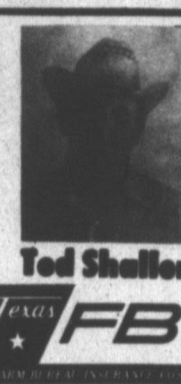

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Wesley Braddock On Pipeline Crew

Wesley Braddock, a member of the pipeline construction crew working on Alaskan pipeline, has returned to Alaska after vacationing here.

Employed by Company 798 of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Braddock and other crew members are sent to various job sites, such as the Alaskan construction job which is 250 miles north of Fairbanks.

A work day is 10 hours long and the working period is nine weeks in the summer with a shut down in September. The men live in permanent camps and are bussed over gravel roads to the job site each day. After a two weeks stint there is a rest and recreation break.

Part of the construction is above ground and 300 miles of the 48 inch diameter pipe is to be underground.

Living quarters are barracks with two men to each room. The rooms are carpeted and otherwise well appointed. There is no air-conditioning and the temperature reaches 90 degrees in the summer. With

the long hours of daylight windows must be darkened for sleep. Dust pneumonia is a problem but medical care and doctors are available.

Food is catered and relay television, movies and a recreation room furnish entertainment. Washers and dryers are provided also.

Sight seers come to the construction site although they are encouraged to stay away. Grizzlies are a problem most any where in the locality, and steal the lunches left on the bus by the crew, if windows are not tightly closed. Meal time brings the bears to slap at the window glass as the men eat.

Wesley's wife Doris, of South Africa, and 10 year old twins, Dorothy and Dennis, live in Clarendon. Another daughter, Pat Ford, lives in Mobeetie. Braddock has worked for a year on the pipeline project and says the 57 degrees below zero temperature is not noticeable if the proper clothing is worn.

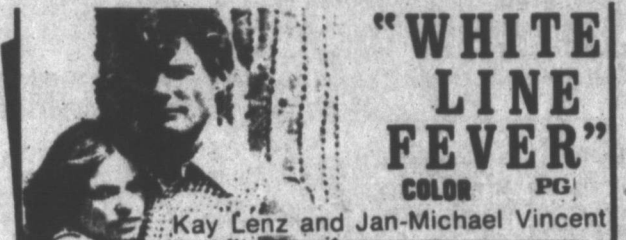
