HOSPITAL DENIED CONVERSION REQUEST

Bronchos To Host

Quanah Indians Friday

A request for permission to convert the vacant 20-bed Donley County hospital into nursing home facilities has been denied by the Texas Health Facilities Commission, it was announced this week.

Gerald D. Knight, administrator for the Donley County Hospital District, said that a letter from Gaines West, hearings officer for the commission, was received earlier this month and was presented to the board at their September meeting last Tuesday, September 9.

However, under new state and federal regulations, the hospital district may apply for a Certificate of Need which if granted would open the way for the use of the hospital facilities for nursing home use.

The board took this under advisement and tabled action until later this year when more information can be obtained concerning the proper compliance with the new regulatory laws.

Knight explained that the hospital is now under the direct supervision of the Commission, an agency created by the Texas legislature with the expressed purpose to "insure health care service and facilities to make available to all citizens in an orderly and economical manner."

The state law was designed to implement the national law covering health care.

In July Knight had filed a request with the Commission for an exemption certificate which if granted would have given the hospital district the right to make changes deemed necessary.

However, the Commission representative stated that the district is not eligible for the exemption and outlined several alternatives, one of which is to make application for the so-called "Certificate of Need," which if granted would also clear the way for the expansion.

Knight explained that the board is considering expanding the nursing home facilities to encompass the entire hospital since current economic conditions will not permit the normal operation of the hospital.

The problem in making application for the Certificate of Need is that the Commission will not accept any application until October 3 with January 9 the earliest date that an application could be acted upon.

Because of this, the board voted to table the application until after at least the Commission hearing in Austin next Monday.

Greenbelt Approves Testing

Two proposals for core testing for foundation studies for construction of water tanks at sites near Quanah and Childress were approved by the board of directors of the Greenbelt Water Authority at a meeting in Hedley Tuesday, September 9.

The proposals were made by Southwestern Laboratories Testing Engineers, Arlington and the costs were \$1,162 for the site near Quanah and \$925 for the site near Childress.

The board also approved legal services and expenses in the amount of \$30,230.77 to McCall, Parkhurst and Horton and \$2,472.02 to Lowe and Courtney of Clarendon.

Religious Thoughts

"Spare the rod and spoil the child!" "Don't discipline your child and inhibit him!" With so much advice from so-called experts, today's parents often are confused. To say the least, there is sometimes inaction, hesitation, and inconsistency in regard to discipline of children. This results in unhappy children filled with guilt because nobody told them no.

Suggestions regarding discipline must vary with the child's age, sex, intelligence, maturity, health, emotional stability, and personality. No one can set rules by which you can discipline your children.

Perhaps the meaning of the word "discipline" will help parents understand the intent of discipline in the home. Discipline comes from a Latin word meaning "to teach." Teaching should be the ultimate goal of all discipline of children and not the flying off the handle that some parents do. Whenever parents discipline their children, it must be for the sake of the children and the development of mature character and balanced personality.

Parents should understand the difference between discipline and punishment. Discipline, however, may include punishment if it is designed to teach; and sometimes it should. Many children and adults psychologically punish themselves because they have done something wrong for which no one corrected them. Lack of correction allows guilt complexes to build up. Punishment, however, that is designed to hurt or to pay back the other person for wrong he has done may be necessary in courts of law, but it has little or no place where discipline of children are concerned. Discipline must be designed to impart a valuable lesson. If its intent is not teaching so much as it is a "balancing of the books," then the punishment alone may only teach a child to hate and fear his parents.

Parents must understand the purposes of discipline. Children are not born with a highly developed sense of what is right and wrong. Discipline is designed in the Bible to teach this. By nature their impulse is to take for themselves whatever attracts them and to please themselves no matter who else may be displeased in the process.

It is the obligation of parents to instill in the child those principles which will transform him from a creature of personal, selfish whim and impulses to a person who not only recognizes the rights of all other persons about him, but who also feels an obligation to give himself in unselfish service for their good.

Discipline in the home lays the foundation both for the further discipline which society imposes on individuals and for the discipline which God purposes for all men. For Christian parents, all discipline should have the distinct Christian objective of bringing the individual to accept the yoke of Christ.


Discipline serves many specific purposes. It teaches children respect for authority, the consequences of wrong doing, the habits of right living, the exercise of responsible freedom, and the regulation of his own behavior. According to Proverbs, discipline proves the love of parents for their children. The Bible says, "He who spares the rod hates his son, but he who loves him is diligent to discipline him" (Prov. 13:24RSV.)

Society insists that maturing individuals control their impulses. This is necessary for people to live together in harmony and peace. If parents do not teach their children self-control, then society steps in and does it. Many children are saying, "If I throw a temper-tantrum or beg enough, Mom and Dad will let me do whatever I want to do." If parents do what their children are saying, then society will eventually do the correcting. This correction is usually painful, embarrassing, and is usually unsuccessful in leading a person toward a stable character and a disciplined life.

The place for a person to learn self-control is in the home. The time for it is when he is a child. The persons responsible for it are the parents. This means discipline.

Thanks to six-foot-eight and a half inch freshman Victor Lee of Chicago and others in a new crop of freshmen, the Bulldogs will be taller — and Coach Davis thinks, more winsome — in the Western Junior College flag race this fall.

"We're shooting to be in the top four of the conference," Davis mused, reflecting on an 11-17 record last year in a title race with the national champion.

In fact Clarendon closed their season with a close 72-64 loss to Howard College who went on to capture the national title.

"We've got more height, more strength and we believe more expertise at the basket, even though we lost some very fine players last year," the Coach added.

Back with the Bulldogs as sophomores this year are Donald Warrior of Checotah, Oklahoma 6-5, who led with 11.8 per game scoring average and 10.5 rebounds and who was elected by his teammates as the most valuable player of the year.

Joining Warrior are Terry Blanks of Kansas City, 5-9, with a 9.9 scoring record and a six rebound average; Charles Quisenberry of Lubbock, 6-5; Robert Evans of Big Springs, 6-2; and Russ Franklin of Gallop, N.M., 6-1. Randy Merkey of Perryton, 6-7, is a transfer from Cameron College.

Freshmen additions to the quintet also include Larry Mackey of Miami, Fla., 5-9; Anthony Norris of Philadelphia, 6-1; Dan Bolin of Hedley, 6-2; Anthony Bailey of Brooklyn, 6-3; Mike Wrinkle of Gallop, New Mexico, 6-6½; Mike Montgomery of Sweetwater, 6-4; Jesse Gray of Macon, Ga., 6-2; and Artis Betts of Abernathy, 5-11.

While the Bulldogs lost 17 games last year, ten of those games were by 10 or less points. Of the 1974-75 team, Archie Hughes went to Rider

College in Chester, Pa., while David Graham, a good forward, went to Henderson State at Arkadelphia, Arkansas.

For the time being, the Bulldogs are doing body conditioning exercises but will get regular daily drills underway after October 1. Davis said the team will practice an hour in the morning, from 3 to 5 p.m. in the afternoon and at night until the season opens on November 18 with Oscar Rose Junior College in Midwest City, Oklahoma.

Both Howard College and Amarillo College are picked as the two teams to beat but Coach Davis has his sights set on a position in the top of the league.

"We're planning to do some climbing this year; how high will depend on the Bulldogs," he added.

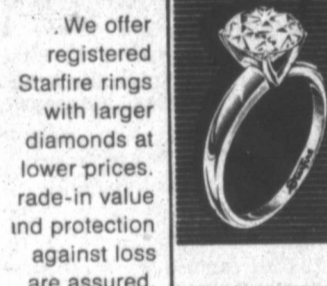
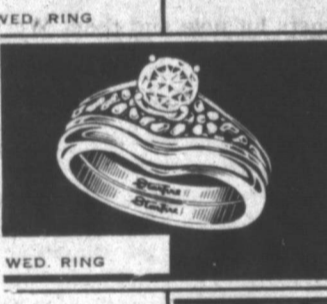

The district's fiscal year ended in June and according to state regulations an audit is to be taken.

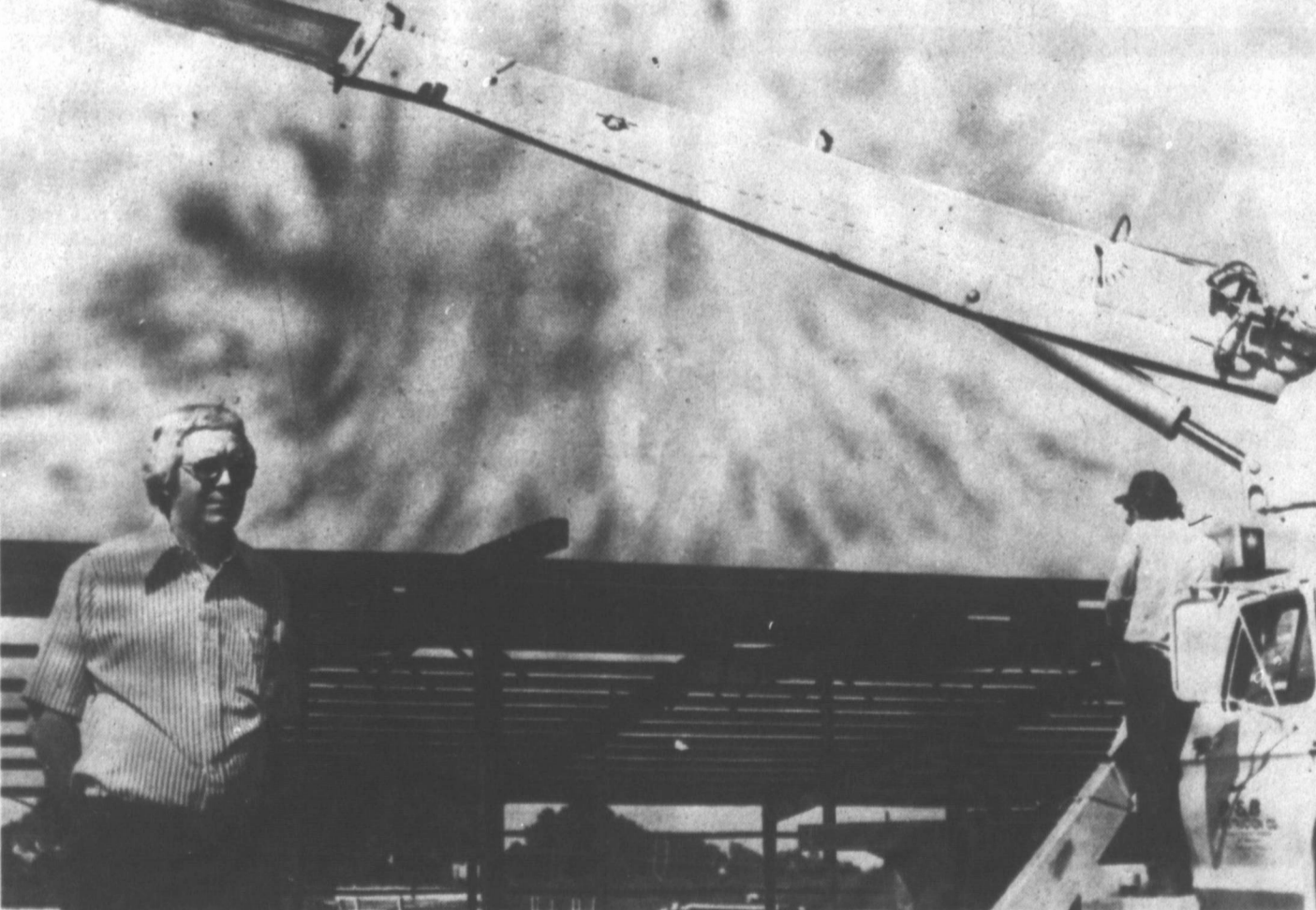
"However, the district not only does not have funds to pay for a current audit, we don't even have the money to pay for past audits," Knight said.

BLOOD DONORS BEING SOUGHT IN DONLEY

According to the federal government, the American Red Cross Blood Program collects about 40 percent of the blood supplied in the United States. As the nation's largest blood program, the Red Cross Blood Program during 1972-73 collected 3,806,278 units of this life-sustaining fluid. All this blood, 7 percent more than was drawn in the previous year, was donated by volunteers. The figure at the present time is probably up over the last figures given.

Many eligible donors who are not aware of their status. Some of the answers are in the eligibility guide listed here. The age limits are 17 to 66 years. Prospective donors 17 years old can donate with written consent of parent or guardian. Consent is not needed if donor is married, self-supporting, or in the armed forces. Written permission for those 18-21 is not

required. Prospective donors age 66 and over should have written approval from a physician dated within two (2) weeks of the date of donation.

As to diet, do avoid fatty or fried food or alcohol during the four hours prior to donation-but eat something. Do not starve yourself.

Minimum weight must be at least 110 pounds.

Medical qualifications guidelines are explained this way.

For persons with an allergy requiring desensitization injections, the injections must be deferred for three days before giving blood. Hayfever is cause for deferral only if the donor has symptoms on the day of donation.

A donor with asthma is no longer deferred for six months after an attack of asthma. He or she may donate any time as long as he/she is asymptomatic at the time of the donation.

Those persons on blood pressure medications who have been on medication at least six weeks and have normal blood pressure, when it is checked may be accepted. The donor should have the name of the medication being taken.

A person must be free of the obvious acute symptoms of colds, sore throat and flu at the time of donation.

If you are a diabetic and the condition is controlled by diet only, the donor is acceptable.

How is a 260-pound bulldozer driver like a 110-pound college coed? If you expect the answer to be a joke, it isn't. It's a miracle.

Both can be blood donors. Size, strength, or sex doesn't matter. Neither does race nor creed nor color. Every blood donation is of equal value. Each donation can save a life. And with today's technology, one unit can help more than one person.

So the next time you think

about the state of the world, and despair that one person alone can change anything, remember the importance of blood donations. There is something you can do to make the world a better place in which to live. One donation does matter—every donation matters. You don't have to be wealthy, but you do have to be healthy. You don't have to be the same age as Jack Benny, but you do have to be between 17 and 66 years of age. You don't have to be as beautiful as Helen of Troy, but you do need a good hemoglobin count. Finally, you don't need hours and hours of spare time, but you do need less than an hour every 8 weeks, up to five times a year.

Being a blood donor isn't fattening or costly or difficult. You rest for a few minutes on a donor table, have a cup of coffee and some cookies, and receive the thanks of all the Red

Cross workers. But you get something else, too—a warm inner glow that comes from knowing that you have done a job that you know matters.

Visit your Bloodmobile October 6, and donate blood. It may hurt a little to give...but it will hurt a lot more if you don't.

Important information regarding donors for the first bloodmobile visit will appear in next week's paper.

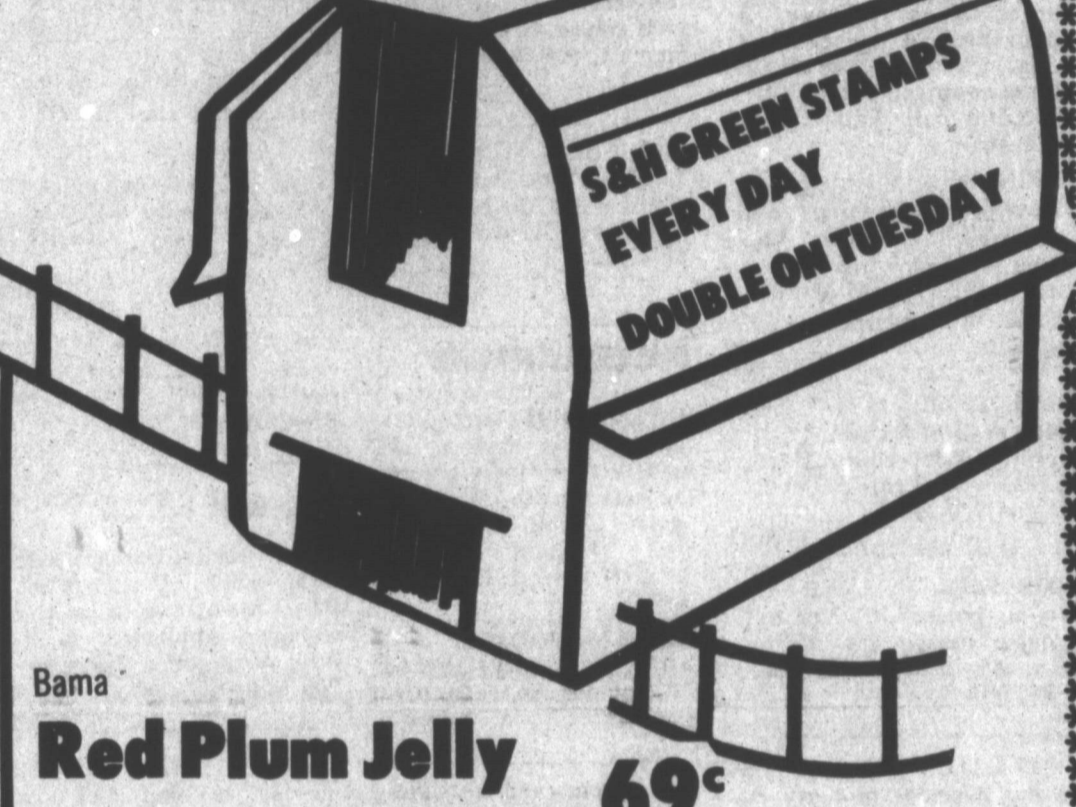

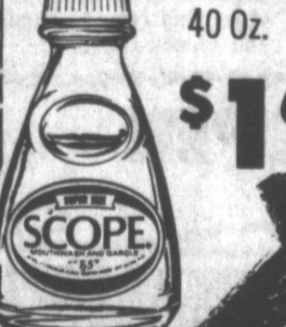



PUBLIC NOTICE**SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (S.J.R. NO. 11)**
SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in even-numbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of three-fifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.

Article IV, The Executive, is amended to:

Continue the present status of the governor and all other state officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to state agencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governor-elect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years unless extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report on the organization and

efficiency of the executive branch.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the SEPARATION OF POWERS, LEGISLATIVE, AND EXECUTIVE PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."

If adopted by the voters, it will become effective January 1, 1976, except Article III, Section 5, which becomes effective January 1, 1981.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the judiciary provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article V, The Judiciary, is amended to:

Establish a unified judicial system consisting of the supreme court, court of appeals, district courts, and circuit courts. Existing county courts and county judges are continued until otherwise provided by law. All judges (except municipal judges), district attorneys and district clerks must be elected by the people. The supreme court and the court of criminal appeals are merged into a single court of last resort, and this supreme court is authorized to provide for efficient administration of the judicial system and to balance case loads. Individual rights for a trial by jury and appeal by the accused are continued. The state is granted the right to appeal in criminal cases in limited circumstances, and the legislature is permitted to establish methods of appeal to the courts from decisions of state agencies.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the JUDICIARY PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."

If adopted by the voters, it will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections, is amended to:

Provide for registration and qualifications for voting including voter residency requirements to be established by law. A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years of age and who meets the registration and residence requirements provided by law is a qualified voter unless the person has been convicted of a felony and for that felony is incarcerated, on parole, or on probation, or unless the person is mentally incompetent as determined by a court. Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VII, Education, is amended to:

Provide that the Permanent and Available School Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax of ten cents on \$100 valuation is continued as the source of revenue for the Fund. The ten cent higher education tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Permanent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the EDUCATION PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."

If adopted by the voters, it will become effective September 1, 1976, except Article VII, Section 9, which becomes effective January 1, 1979.

If adopted by the voters, it will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance, is amended to:

Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a

tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must be taxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present dedication of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The "pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, non-profit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds, prescription drugs or medicine, or food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption. An assessment voted by marine food or agricultural producers on their product sales is not a tax if provision is made for the individual producer to receive a refund of the assessment when the producer does not desire to be assessed.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the FINANCE PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."

If adopted by the voters, it will become effective September 1, 1976, except Article VIII, Section 2, Subsections (b) and (c), which becomes effective January 1, 1978, and Article VIII, Section 6, Subsection(c), which becomes effective January 1, 1979.

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:

Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county officers are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create additional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the LOCAL GOVERNMENT PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."

If adopted by the voters, it will become effective January 1, 1979.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the general provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article X, General Provisions, is amended to:

Provide the basic requirements relating to public officeholders such as the official oath and residency requirements. The provision defining the separate and community property of spouses is retained, and the protection of a homestead from forced sale is continued. The legislature is required to protect certain personal property from forced sale. Current wages for personal service are not subject to garnishment. A private corporation may not be chartered except under general law, and no bank may engage in business at more than one place in this state. The legislature must provide for the regulation of bank holding companies. The present system of local-option elections for the prohibition or sale of alcoholic beverages is continued. The legislature is required to prohibit lotteries and gift enterprises but may permit certain bingo games and raffles. The presently existing provisions for retirement benefits of teachers and other public employees are modified to allow the state to contribute more than 10%.

A policy that the quality of the environment of the State of Texas is to be protected is established, and the legislature is required to implement and enforce this policy. No state funds may be used to remove surface water from the river basin of origin if the surface water is necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable water requirements of the basin for the ensuing 50 years, unless the removal of water is sufficiently replaced to the point of removal from outside the state or is on a temporary, interim basis. The seaward beaches of the Gulf of Mexico and coastal submerged lands belonging to the state are held by the state in perpetual trust for the people, and subject to reasonable limitations prescribed by law, the public has the free and unrestricted right of use and benefit of the beaches. The provision is continued that, except as otherwise provided by law, a rate of interest in excess of ten percent a year is usurious, and that if a contract does not specify a rate of interest, the rate under the contract may not exceed six percent a year. Discrimination against handicapped persons is prohibited, and a goal of the state is established to provide every resident access to adequate, comprehensive health care.

**Six Rural
Accidents**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of August, 1975, according to Sergeant J.R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1975 shows a total of 41 accidents resulting in one person killed and 31 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1975, shows a total of 596 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 292 persons injured as compared to August, 1974 with 542 accidents resulting in 30 persons killed and 314 persons injured. This was 54 more accidents, 14 less killed, and 22 less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 16 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1975, occurred in the following counties: three in Castro; two each in Potter, Wheeler, Hale, and Palo Pinto; and one each in Archer, Parker, Yoakum, Hardeman, Wilbarger.
