Text-Book Bill.

Under the terms of the text-book board to select the books is to be composed of the Governor and four teachers to be appointed by him, connected with the normal schools of the State.

Text-books now in use are to be readopted provided they shall be found of equal merit to books offered at the same or higher price in competition. The best books are to be selected after a careful examination of all presented, unless, in the judgment of the board, are extravagant. If material errors are found in the text-books now in use, such errors shall be revised and corrected within a reasonable time after the passage of this act, and the revised and corrected edition shall be exchanged at par.




