

# Cocaine and Train Accidents.

Chicago physicians declare that the cocaine habit is responsible for many of the street and steam railway accidents that are now so frequent in Chicago.

The use of the drug is not limited to any class, physicians say, as the sale of small vials and boxes of the product of the cocoa leaves testifies to its grasp on residents of fashionable hotels and houses on the boulevards.

Wilhelm Bodemann, treasurer of the state board of pharmacy, testified before the grand jury that in his opinion the many wrecks on the railroads could be traced to the use of cocaine by the employes of these companies, and out of this state-ment grew the investigation that has revealed the widespread uses of

the drug.

The effect of cocaine is to deaden the nerves and sensibilities. With that comes a feeling of exhilaration and strength. Its use has been known for many years to the In-dians of Peru. They gather the leaves of the cocoa plant in large quantities, and when about to start upon a journey or in their daily work they chew these leaves. While under the influence of the drug they loose all sense of hunger and fatigue, There is no nutriment in the leaf. When the effect passes away the person has a feeling of depression and weakness. 
