TWO LOCAL TRAINS TO BE DISCONTINUED TODAY

The Fort Worth and Denver Railway has announced that with the approval by the Interstate Commerce Commission this week, Passenger Trains 1 and 8 between Dallas-Fort Worth and Denver will be discontinued effective December 15.

This change will leave one passenger train traveling each direction daily designated as the Texas Zephyr. The northbound train will leave Dallas at 1:35 p.m., Fort Worth at 2:50 p.m. and arrive in Denver at 7 a.m. The southbound train will leave Denver at 8 p.m., arrive in Fort Worth at 3:55 p.m. and Dallas at 5 p.m. Trains will be operated with modern stainless steel equipment, providing chair car, Pullman, and dining car service.

Panhandle Economy Is Discussed At Meeting

A discussion of Panhandle Economy was the subject for a meeting held at Memphis Thursday, December 8. Six Rolling Plains Counties participated in the meeting sponsored under the Panhandle Economic Program. James Murphrey, Extension Service Farm Management Specialist of Amarillo was coordinator of the program.

Some of the potentials for the Panhandle indicated in the study included: improvement in resource allocation, profit combinations and more efficient management in farm and ranch incomes, effective estate planning, value added to products by processing and manufacturing in the Panhandle, utilization of water for crop production, and accurate application of irrigation water.

The Panhandle Economic Program, Build East Texas, and Black Income Growth are three programs now being carried on in a regional effort to boost Texas' agricultural economy. These agencies are working with other agencies, schools and area leaders to promote programs and tackle problems.

County Program Building Committees throughout a 26 county area will be meeting in January to launch local projects. Some 200 attended the Memphis meeting and about twenty from Donley County were on hand for the discussion.

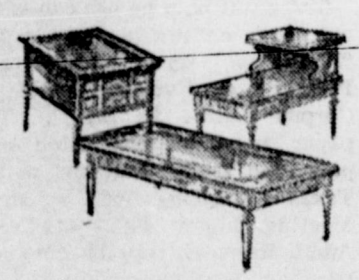

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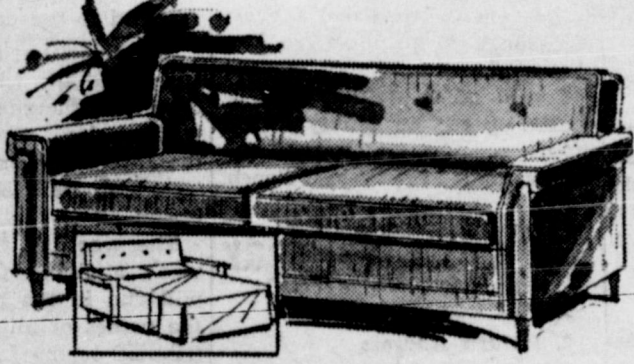

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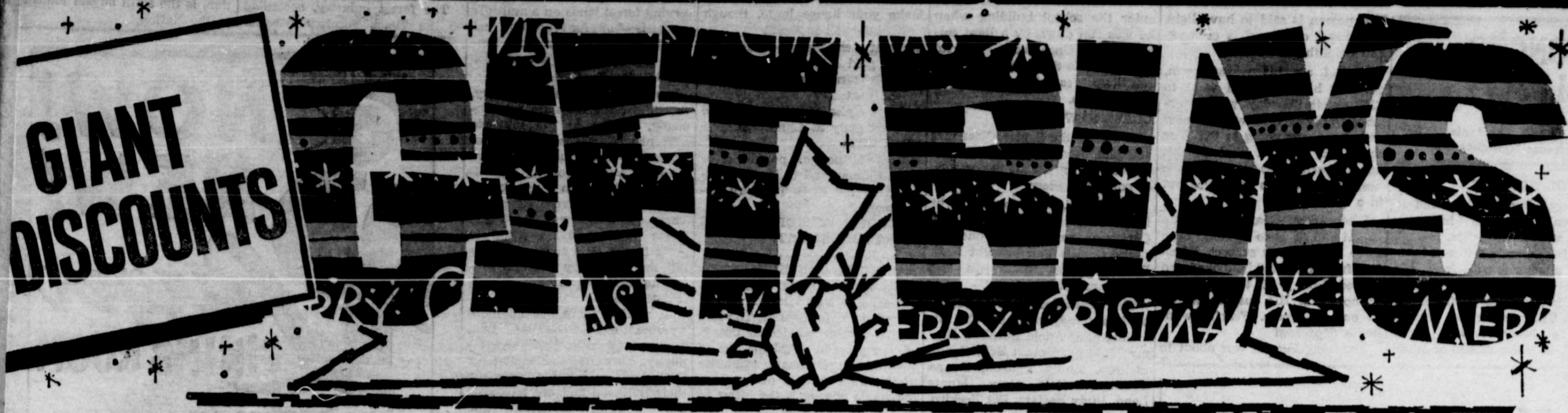

PRACTICAL CONSERVATION

We hear a great deal about accepting in a philosophical manner the need for change. The fact is that change, needed or not, is always present. Perhaps one of the most unfortunate examples of the utter futility of opposing inevitable change is the effort of sincere conservationists to preserve inordinately large areas of the nation in a state of untouched wilderness. Even a wilderness area is not a thing of static beauty. Forests grow, mature and die. That is why all but the most dedicated conservationists accept the practical necessity of pre-

serving forest lands on a multiple use basis—both for recreation and selective removal of mature timber to meet public demand for wood products.

Contrary to the belief of many, our timber resources are not vanishing, thanks to the multiple concept and other modern timber utilization techniques. There are more redwoods growing in California today than ever before. There are extensive state parks. There are today over 29,000 tree farms where owners agree to grow timber as a crop—replacing the trees they use and protecting them against fire, insects, and disease.

In reality, there are no more genuine conservationists than those who work in the timber industry. They love the wilderness, too. And beyond that, trees are their livelihood and are treasured as both objects of beauty and ability.

The forest industry, according to the Texas Forestry Association, is the sixth largest in the Nation.

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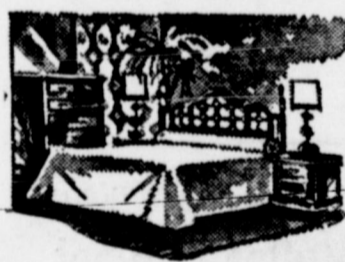
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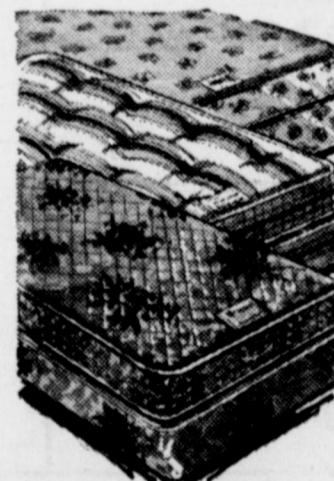
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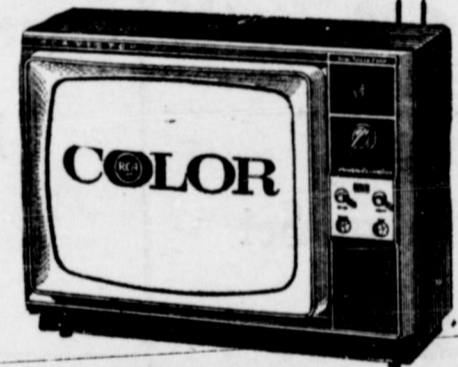

Forecast 47 Will Die Christmas Week End

Forty-seven persons in Texas will be the focus of one of the most intensive traffic safety efforts ever to be expended during the Christmas holiday week end, according to Department of Public Safety Director Col. Homer Garrison, Jr.

"The DPS will be concentrating its efforts more than ever in an attempt to make sure that the indicated death toll of 47 persons is not reached," said Garrison.

This year has been the most terrible in Texas history in terms of lives lost and property damage, and we are working with other state agencies and organizations interested in safety in order to hold down this toll as much as possible.

"We are issuing a personal invitation to each motorist, asking every individual to join the battle, and it must be considered a battle, for traffic has claimed more lives than have been lost in all the wars in which we have been engaged."

"Operation Deathwatch" will be conducted from 6 p.m. Friday, December 23 through 11:59, Monday, December 26, to focus attention on dangers involved in holiday travel. The present traffic trend indicates that 47 persons will die in traffic during this period.

The "Deathwatch" will resume for the New Year's week end, beginning at 6 p.m., Friday, December 30th, and continuing thru 11:59 p.m. January 2. Indications for the New Year's period are that 36 persons will die in traffic accidents.

To supplement its enforcement activities, the DPS will place approximately 150 additional men from its other uniformed services on highway patrol duty. Every effort will be made to remove dangerous or irresponsible drivers from the highways for the safety of law-abiding motorists.

Traffic deaths will be tabulated at DPS headquarters in Austin, and reports will be issued to news media sources three times daily to show just how the "Countdown" stands. "Countdown boards" will be distributed to news media so that the public may stay informed on the traffic situation.

Joining the DPS in its traffic safety efforts are several other organizations and state agencies: The Texas Safety Association is distributing a kit of "Holiday Safety Materials" and is stressing the need for courtesy and caution during the holiday period.

The Texas Highway Department is distributing reminders on danger spots, construction areas, and information on signs and markers to help keep drivers informed and alert.

The Texas Association of Broadcasters and the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission are cooperating in the distribution and use of radio announcements concerning safe driving practices.

And the Texas Motor Transportation Association and the Council of Safety Supervisors are working with members of the trucking industry to promote safe driving practices and alertness during the holiday period.

COTTON MARKETING NEWS

Cotton classed at the Memphis USDA Cotton Classing Office during the week ending December 8 was lower in grade, staple length and mike readings. There were 22,000 samples classed during the week. About 25 percent of the crop was estimated to remain for processing.

Spotted grades showed 52 percent with the predominant grade this week Middling Spotted. Cotton reduced in grade due to bark increased 10 percent. Staple length showed 74 percent in the

15/16 range. Mike readings showed 75 percent reading 3.4 and below. It was estimated a 300 point or 3c per pound discount based on the CCC loan.

Cotton selling the past week was mainly low grades and low mike ranges. Average prices in trade channels with mike readings of 3.4 and below brought from even with CCC loan to as much as 70 points above. Cottonseed ranged from \$63 to \$70 per ton at gin points.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Gov. John Connally has made his big decisions on state spending and taxes for the coming fiscal year.

He scheduled releases of his budgets by sections starting this week. Reportedly it calls for just under \$200,000,000 in new taxes.

First section on state employment problems calls for payroll hikes of \$75,000,000 from all funds and \$26,000,000 from the general revenue.

Connally told Texas mayors and council members that he will not recommend the optional local sales taxes they advocate. He indicated that he won't ask for an increase in state general sales levies.

Speculation is that the governor will include a gasoline tax increase, college tuition boost and sales tax on alcoholic beverages in his revenue program.

He definitely will recommend some financial relief for hard-pressed cities. He hinted this will be in the form of state assistance for building, maintaining and policing streets.

While Connally completed his financial recommendations which will be sent to legislators on December 15, legislative budget writers made no progress.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith has not called a meeting of the Legislative Board since dismissal of Director Vernon McGee on August 29. Smith promised a legislative budget would be submitted by the January 15 deadline, however.

REQUESTS ALMOST DOUBLE — Texas' state agencies have requested 93 percent more money for the 1968-69 biennium than they are receiving during this biennium. Governor Connally said that's evidence of the increasing complexity and magnitude of State government.

Connally said general revenue appropriations for the current biennium total \$634,000,000, and requests for the next two-year period amount to almost double that sum—\$1,216,000,000.

"Biggest item in the budget is public and higher education," Connally said, "and it is in this critical area where the largest increase is requested." The current appropriation in this area is \$347,000,000, but \$683,000,000 is requested, he said.

OIL ALLOWABLE AT PEAK — Santa Claus came early for Texas oil producers. Railroad Commission set the highest production factor in seven and a half years for December.

Statewide allowable will be 36.5 per cent of potential. Factor will permit production of 3,322,712 barrels a day, compared with November's 34.5 per cent which produced allowable of 3,205,042 barrels daily.

Commented Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey in announcing the happy tidings: "The crude oil market is extremely tight. Demand is extremely strong, and will remain strong for several months."

NEW VOTER SIGNUP SYSTEM PROPOSED — A bipartisan election law sub-committee, headed by Sen Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, has agreed unanimously on a proposed new free registration system for Texas voters.

System would work like this: all voters must sign up personally with county tax officials, initially. Afterwards, they can register annually by signing an official application form sent out by the tax office.

Voters must carry a registration card or certificate and identify themselves by signature at the polls.

Creighton said he hopes to submit the plan, together with an omnibus election law "clean up" bill, to the public hearing early next month.

Voters at the November 8 general election expressed preference for annual registration as opposed to permanent signup.

TEACHERS' BENEFITS — Texas college teachers may not get salary increases from the 60th Legislature, but they may get a new battery of fringe benefits as compensation, if the recommendations of the Interim

Legislative Committee on Faculty Compensation in State-Supported Colleges and Universities are followed.

In reporting to approximately 200 college presidents and professors, the committee said it would recommend to the legislature an optional retirement or annuity program, paid research or study leaves, state aid for group insurance plans, the waiving of tuition for faculty members and their families and lifting the legal ban against construction of parking lots that don't charge user fees.

WATER PLAN ADVISORS — Twelve West Texans have been named as an advisory group to the Texas Water Development Board to keep the board informed of West Texas attitudes toward the state's fulfilling its Texas Water Plan.

The 12, nominated by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of Lubbock, will be kept fully informed and will be asked for advice as two major Texas engineering firms and the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation explore various ways to get water surpluses from East to Northeast Texas and West Texas.

Board authorized the preparation of two contracts aimed at the West Texas water problem and accepted the bureau's offer to make a study of the possibility of pumping water back up the Colorado River to serve San Angelo, Midland, Odessa and El Paso.

Appointed to the advisory group were C. B. Ray of El Paso; K. B. Watson of Amarillo; A. V. Jones of Albany; Hank Avery of Midland; Bill Clayton of Springlake; Fred Conn of San Angelo; Jess Cooper of Dumas; J. Lee Johnson of Fort Worth; George W. McClesky of Lubbock; S. B. Whittenburg of Amarillo; H. R. Drew of Fort Worth; and Joe B. Pate of Lubbock.

SHORT SNORTS District Judge Marvin Blackburn and attorneys for both sides agreed on Dec. 9 as pre-trial date, and Dec. 19 as trial date, on a suit by land owners to stop condemnation on their land located within the site of the proposed Lyndon B. Johnson State Park.

State Selective Service Headquarters says 1,946 Texans will be called to service during January, compared to only 744 for December, and 2,339 for November.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced that the School Land Board awarded 22 oil and gas leases, but rejected 76 others as too low, and the Veterans' Land Board awarded sales of 72 tracts of land (repossessed GI farms amounting to 4,307 acres.

AIDS IN CATTLE BREEDING

Breeding heifers should not be allowed to get too fat, cautions County Agent Ronald Gooch. This will help avoid calving difficulties.

Excess weight has a harmful effect on fertility and calf production. Research shows heifers that are excessively fat have a high percentage of dead calves. They also have more calving difficulties.

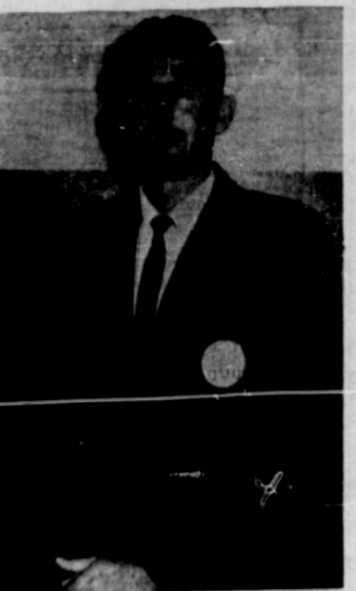
It is sometimes a good idea to breed heifers to a smaller type bull rather than one that is extremely large for his age. This means smaller calves can be dropped without difficulty.

After a heifer has dropped her first calf, the size or breed of bull does not seem to be an important cause of calving difficulties.

Breeding heifers when they are too young is another case of calving problems.

Breeding heifers should not be too fat, bred when they are too young, or bred to a large growthy bull—follow these guidelines for less calving difficulties, concludes Gooch.

When your match goes out, be sure it can't come back. Be careful with fire and smoking materials when in or near wooded areas.

At the present time, Clarendon College basketball stars have the opportunity to compete for berths on teams from six universities: Utah University, New Mexico University, New Mexico State, Texas Tech, Memphis State, and Panhandle A&M.

Silver Dollars On Display At Local Bank

A unique collection of silver dollars dating from 1486, and reflecting historically important events of 173 countries during the past five centuries, will be on public display in the lobby of the Farmers State Bank thru December 30th.

This collection of 336 coins is owned by the First National Bank of New York, and is being placed on public exhibition for educational purposes. School children are especially urged to view the collection.

As part of the educational feature the importance of interest savings is shown. If these coins, worth about \$336 when made, could have been placed in a bank drawing compound interest at the time they were minted, they would have today a value to their owners of billions upon billions of dollars.

In Tyrol, under reign of King Maximilian I, the first dollar (Guldiner) was struck. This dollar is among the valuable collection.

Others listed include: early Spanish pieces, famous venetian crowns, Neapolitan coins, Ar-

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gentinian reals, Chinese Tael, Cypriot piostres, Ecuadorean sueres, French francs, German Thalers, Guatemalan reals, Haitian gourdes, Italian scudi, Russian rubles, and West Indian reals.

Six American dollars are displayed. The first dollar minted in the new Philadelphia build-

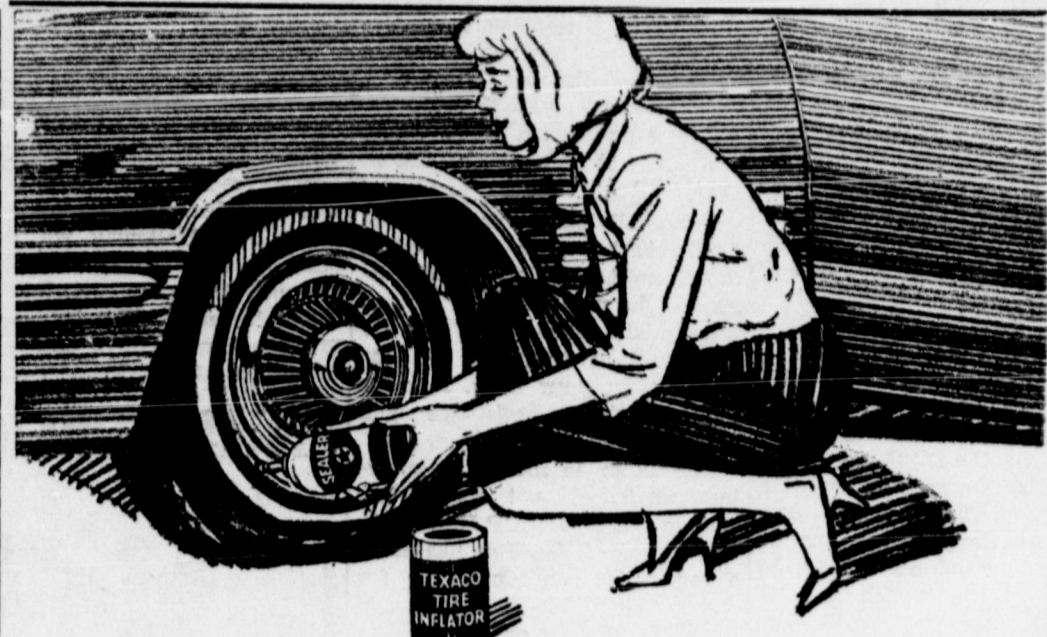
ing established in 1792 has the Goddess of Liberty head, with flowing hair tied back in what was then known as the "fillet head."

The Dollar of our Daddies, dated 1859, was a name applied to the silver dollar during the agitation for free silver coinage. The "peace dollar" issued in

1921, to commemorate the Armistice, is also among the 336 coins.

All persons living in this vicinity are invited to view the collection between now and December 30th.

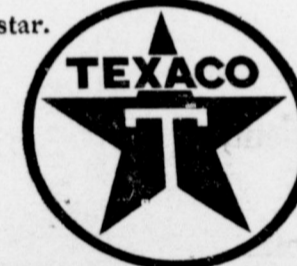

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FARM NEWS

1966 ACP
Funds are still available for practices to be carried out before Jan. 1, 1967. Fields where cotton has been stripped should be protected now. Cost-share assistance is offered for listing, chiseling or for deep plowing. These high winds remind us all that the top soil gets away in a hurry unless something is done to prevent it.

1967 ACP
Our ACP Handbook for the 1967 year has been approved at the State ASCS Office and copies will be made as soon as possible. Make your plans now to carry out every good practice you can on your farm. Ask for the cost-share assistance you need.

The 12 to 15 inch deep plowing practice is not offered for 1967 in the State ACP Handbook. Our County Committee has made a request for that practice for our county. We will know in January whether or not it is to be approved for us. There are a number of conservation practices you should be thinking of doing on your farm or ranch. Some are:

Planting grasses.
Drilling water wells for livestock.
Building standard or diversion terraces.
Constructing earthen dams for erosion prevention or livestock water.

Reorganizing irrigation systems.
Planting summer legumes.
Controlling the growth of (1) Mesquite, (2) sage, (3) shinnery, (4) Yucca, (5) bindweed.

You might need a conservation practice—that is not offered in our ACP Handbook for 1967. If you do, come to the county office and tell about that need and it might be possible to add a practice to those already approved for us.

COTTON MARKETING QUOTA REFERENDUM
The results will be in next weeks paper, however you probably know from radio and television reports. We will tell you how the Donley County producers voted.

1967 FEED GRAIN AND WHEAT ANNUAL PROGRAM
The bases and yields will be mailed in January and along with them will be some detailed information on this program.

There are some changes so be sure to watch for your mail and read the information you receive.

1967 CROPLAND ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM (CAP)
Fifty-five (55) producers have made requests to put some land into this long-range program. Last year there were 27 who made application for CAP but only 19 signed contracts. We do not know yet how much money will be allowed for our county but we do know that the amount needed is about ten times that already sent to us.
