Texas Strawberries.

Two cars of strawberries were shipped from Tyler Monday. One car was shipped Saturday. All cars were sold on the track and brought about \$2700. Lindale and Swan shipped three cars Tuesday. Express shipments from Lindale, Tyler and Swan amount daily to nearly as much as the solid car shipment. This year it is estimated that forty cars will be shipped from Tyler. The balance of the county will probably ship fifty cars, making a total of ninety cars. If prices hold up as they have started out, the strawberry crop in Smith county will bring between \$60,000 and \$75,000.

New Hunting Law.

The new law in regard to hunting and fishing will take effect June 30, and reads as follows: "Any person who shall enter upon the enclosed land of another without the consent of the proprietor, owner or agent in charge, and therein hunt with firearms, or therein catch or take any fish from any pond, lake, tank or stream, or in any other manner depredate on same, shall be punished by fine not less than \$10, nor more than \$100; provided, further, that this act shall not apply to inclosures including 2,000 acres or more in one inclosure."
