No Boll Weevil Remedy.
The law passed by the presen Legislature of Texas providing a prize of $\$ 50,000$ to the first one
who discovers a method to extermiate the boll weevil at a cost not to exceed \$I an acre, has greatly amused the officials of the Agricultural department, especially the
scientists of entomology. They will not discuss the scheme because it would be in bad taste for Federal officials to criticize the statesmanship of the Texas Legislature. These scientists are certain, howweevil is perceivable. They have now studied the beetle historically and anatomically and are satisfied that the present experiments which look to methods of cultivation to enable slanters to grow cotton in spite of the weevil will solve the
