



Property owners should report controlled burning

in the past several weeks the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department has been hit by a siege of fire calls due to unreported controlled burning by property owners in the city and county. A controlled burn is one in which the property owner is knowingly and intentionally burning grass, trash, or other materials. Anytime a property owner is going to burn fence rows, grassland, trash, or other items they should report the controlled burn to the Donley County sheriffs department dispatcher by calling 874-3533 and providing the dispatcher with information regarding the controlled burn. Often times these fires are spotted by neighbors or passersby and reported as a legitimate fire. Besides being embarrassing to the person doing the burn, this failure to report the burn can be costly and dangerous. Think

about this before you decide to burn and not report it:

When the fire department responds unnecessarily to an unreported controlled burn the situation exists that fire units could be needed elsewhere in the county on a legitimate fire where someones life or property is at risk. This is particularly true when units respond to a distant location within the county. Firefighters are at risk of accident or serious injury while responding to the station or fire believing that life or property are endangered. Responding unnecessarily to a fire causes undue wear and tear on fire nent. Your tax money goes to pay for the wear and tear on the trucks and equipment as well as for the fire responses itself.

have to take time away from their jobs, homes, and families to respond to all fires. When the response is unnecessary, this is depriving them

of time that they often must make up on their jobs or time away from important family activities that can never be made up.

Remember, if you plan to have a controlled burn, take the time to

think about these factors and take the time to call the dispatcher and inform them. The fire department will still be glad to respond if the fire gets out of control if requested on a legitimate fire. They want to be of assistance to the people of the county but they want to do their job of firefighting in Firefighters, who are all volunteers, a prompt, safe and efficient manner.

SCS will assist landowners with vegetative plans

The Soil Conservation Service has been assigned the responsibility for assisting landowners and operators with vegetative plans. SCS personnel can recommend plant species suitable for livestock or for desired wildlife species, designs of wildlife plantings, and procedures for vegetative establishment.

The Texas Forest Service will handle tree planting plans.

If planted primarily for wildlife, the vegetative plan should provide for habitat that is currently deficient at each location.

Donley County sales tax recepts up .07%

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$131.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax February 12.

February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December and reported to Bullock by January 20, as well as quarterly returns for the last three months of 1985 and sales made by annual filers.

Fruit, nut trees need annual "lube" job

Have you given your fruit and nut trees their annual "lube" job? This refers, of course, to an application of dormant oil to control scale insects, points out Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

Why control scale insects?
The answer is simply to save the tree. If a scale insect such as the San Jose scale or white peach gets

started, it could kill your tree.

Dormant oil can be purchased at many different stores where garden supplies are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the temperature is between 40-70 degrees F. Don't apply if a freeze is likely within 48 hours of application, and do not apply after the tree has budded out, cautions Gooch. Dormant oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying flowers and leaves could

cause leaf burn and flower drop.

Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect, so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later you your tree will probably be attacked by scale insects, so be ready by guarding against them with an application of dormant oil, suggests Gooch.

The tendency to be for sale starts in childhood. If the child is not taught that wrong is punished, and if he gets no spankings, wrong is not made distasteful to him. He often times gets his desires by doing wrong. If he cries long enough, he gets the candy, and often times he is even rewarded when throwing a temper tantrum. He does not have to mind his parents. To say "no" to Mom is considered cute. Then he will say "no" to the teacher, "no" to the Sunday School worker, "no" to the law, and "no" to God. He then dies and goes to Hell because the parents thought it was cute for him to say "no."

This tendency to sell out continues in youth. It is found in the youth who does right only if it turns out right. Right needs to be vindicated in such a life. Every action is determined by its reward or results. According to this opinion, nothing is right or wrong in itself, only in how it turns out. Hence, anything can become right if it turns out right. Popularity, gaining a new boy friend, good grades, etc. become the main end rather than principles and character. How sad! Such people stand only until the price is big enough. They are not taught to live by principles. Their convictions last only until the selling price reaches their desires.

This tendency increases in adulthood. From such young people we have our police scandals, our crooked politicians, our compromising preachers, our loafers, lawbreakers, and homebreakers.

Watchdogs of the Treasury is a Washington, D.C - based non-partisan organization whose award for fiscal integrity in government is presented annually.

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

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

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Downtowns are in a serious state of decline

In most of our small Texas cities, the downtowns are in a serious state of decline. The automobile, suburban housing, and the growth of local and regional shopping centers and malls have greatly reduced the traditional role of Main Street as the principal center of economic activity. Many government programs such as urban renewal and various city beautification programs havee failed to halt the decline of Main Street.

In the last five years a new philosophy for revitalizing central business districts has evolved. The concept is simple: rehabilitation of existing structures capitalizing on the unique character of the buildings, coupled with development of progressive marketing and management techniques. Preservation and rehabilitation of historic commercial buildings provide the necessary image for the downtown area and serve as a unifying factor to encourage area merchants and building owners to reinvest in downtown. While this historic image can establish the tone for the revitalization effort, a commitment to a full-time project manager and utilization of progressive marketing and management techniques are critical elements in the Main Street concept.

The Texas Main Street Project of the Texas Historical Commission works to bring this proven approach to downtown revitalization to towns across the state. Each year the project accepts applications for official designation to the program from cities with populations of under 50,000. Five cities are selected annually. The cities are required to fund a full-time project manager who is employed by the city and reports to the city manager. In turn, the Texas Main Street Project works with each of these communities for three years, providing start-up assistance and developing more local

initiative and expertise in the second and third year. Training and supervision of the local project manager is provided, as well as professional assistance and supervision in design, restoration, marketing, parking, and other areas where the community does not have local expertise.

The Texas Main Street Project has also begun to work with communities that are not included in the five official cities. If a community has a full-time project manager that has been trained by the Main Street Project and meets other program requirements, the community can be designated a "self-initiated Main Street city." Self-initiated cities receive limited assistance in the form of periodic Main Street staff visits, merchandising and display assistance, participation in Main Street training sessions, and help in finding professionals to provide required design, marketing, parking, and other assistance.

In the first four years of the Texas Main Street Project, more than \$74 million was reinvested in the downtowns of the official and self-initiated Main Street cities, and 721 new businesses came to these cities' downtowns. These figures indicate that the Main Street concept of economic development within the context of historic preservation works. It is the aim of the Texas Main Street Project to have many Texas towns follow the successful models in the Main Street network and take a renewed interest in the revitalization of their downtown.
