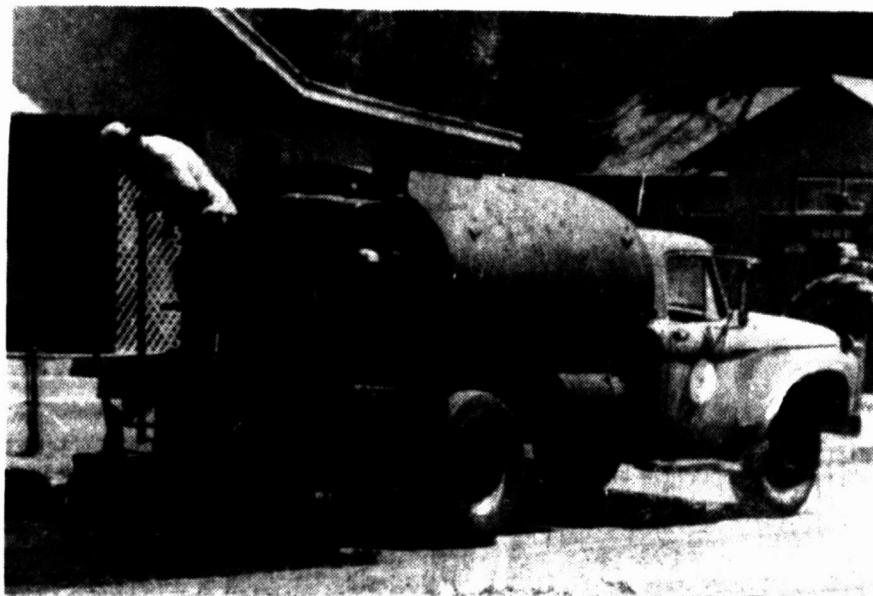

Safe And Effective Expectorant

Expectorants are medicines which loosen sputum (phlegm) in the lungs. Expectorants may also increase sputum volume and the ease with which sputum is removed from the lungs during episodes of coughing.

Because of a lack of definite findings as to the exact actions of expectorants, there has been some disagreement in the past as to the therapeutic value of expectorants. Recently, however, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced that one ingredient had been found to be safe and effective as an expectorant through its effect of increasing sputum volume. The ingredient is *guaifenesin*, the most widely used ingredient in nonprescription cough and cold medicines. Products containing other expectorant ingredients have a period of time during which they can be reformulated.

Guaifenesin is also approved as a prescription drug for use by individuals who have chronic bronchitis, to help loosen lung sputum and thin bronchial secretions.

Persistent coughs of more than one week, accompanied by other symptoms (such as fever or rash) should be evaluated by a physician.

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You can help slow down your meter and lower your cooling bills by following these tips:

- Set your thermostat on 78° or higher and use ceiling or portable fans to help circulate the air.
- Have your air conditioner serviced annually and once a month, check the filter. A dirty filter can keep your air conditioner from working efficiently.
- Keep doors, windows, and drapes firmly closed to keep cool air in and heat out.
- Protect ceiling and walls with adequate insulation. Make sure cracks around windows, doors, pipes and wiring are tightly sealed with caulking and weatherstripping.
- Use heat producing appliances, like ranges, dishwashers, and dryers during the cooler part of the day.

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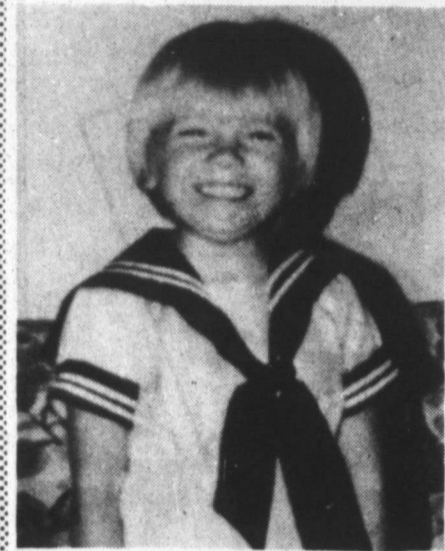

Notice To Residents

Beginning July, 1989 (the first month of the City's fiscal year) the City of Hedley will implement a raise in the water rate. This is only the second water rate hike since the City was incorporated.

Due in part to the City's low expenditures and to low inflation the City of Hedley has been able to offer the citizens with the lowest water rate of any incorporated city in the Texas Panhandle.

The decision to raise the water rate came after many hours of study and discussion. Therefore, based on the new costs that the City has been forced to bear, old failing equipment, and the rising cost of insurance plus the need for more coverage etc. the City of Hedley will implement a new water rate which will be realized on the July, 89 bill to be received August, 89.

The water rate will be changed from: \$8.00 for 3000 gallons to \$15.00 for 5000 gallons. This means that all minimum water bills will be \$15.00 instead of \$8.00, and every meter will be allowed to utilize 5000 gallons before any more is charged rather than 3000 gallons which is the allowed amount to be utilized at the present.

Again this will be noticed on the July, 89 bill to be sent out in August, 89. 25-21c
