## Rabies Case Confirmed In Clarendon

Authorities in Austin have confirmed a case of rabies in a specimen from in Clarendon. On Sunday, August 6th, Billie Taylor noticed her cat playing with a bat. She killed the bat with a broom and took it to the Deyhle Veterinary Clinic on Monday. The doctors forwarded the animal to Austin for testing.

Since the cat had not been vaccinated, the veterinarians immediately inoculated the pet and placed it under observation. It will remain under observation for at least 14 days. Since the animal was vaccinated so quickly after the possible exposure, its chances are fairly good. But its odds would have been better if it had received the recommended annual vaccination earlier.

No humans were bitten.

On Wednesday, August 9th, the lab phoned the veterinary clinic and confirmed the presence of rabies in the specimen. Area residents should take normal precautions.

Rhonda Howell, a technician at the veterinary clinic said, "This shows again how important it is to get animals vaccinated." Virtually any mammal can suffer from rabies.

At one time "hydrophobia" [the old name for rabies] was the most dreaded of all diseases humans could contract. Not only was it inevitably fatal, but death was slow and excrutiating.

In 1884 Louis Pasteur developed the first primitive vaccine against the rabies virus, although he had no means of isolating the organism. It was a truly remarkable accomplishment. With time, better and better vaccines have been developed, and today's vaccines are far better than those of a decade ago. Yet even today, there is little science can do if the disease is too far advanced.

The first line of defense against the dread disease is prevention. All pets should be vaccinated annually. An unvaccinated pet is an intolerable danger not only to its owner and family, but to the entire community.

Failure to vaccinate pets is against the law. In the event that a Clarendon pet contracted rabies, the owner could face a civil suit if his dog or cat bit someone. And the owner might be indicted for negligence.

The second line of defense against rabies is the exercise of caution with wild animals. Any animal that behaves strangely should be regarded as dangerous. Wild animals would normally flee from humans, but they may act indifferent to the presence of people when the animal is under the influence of the disease. Animals that would normally avoid cities may wander into town. Ranchers and farmers may see animals that are normally secretive. Foxes and skunks may even become aggressive. As the disease progresses, the animal may salivate excessively and as the animals' nervous system deteriorates, the animal may stagger or even snap at imaginary objects in its path. Rabies is a horrible death.

Bats are not necessarily more likely to have rabies than other mammals. Bats can contract the disease, but usually pose little threat to humans. Clarendon residents who find a bat in their home may call the city. County residents can call the Sheriff's Office. Do NOT handle the bat with bare hands. While it is highly unlikely that the bat is diseased, it could be.

Experts on bats encourage people not to kill the little animals wantonly. Most are NOT diseased. Bats generally avoid humans when possible and are harmless to people, despite ignorant superstitions to the contrary. Furthermore, bats do a tremendous service in consuming thousands of tons of insects in Texas each night. Since many of the insects that bats eat are potential disease carriers, the tiny flying mammals may actually contribute to public health.

Unfortunately, many Texans still believe old wives' tales about bats and destroy them. Yet each bat in the area is worth several dollars to farmers because of the insect pests that the bats consume.

Wildlife experts suggest that the state may have to classify bats as "threatened" in most of the state, and some varieties will probably soon be classified as "endangered species".

### **State Forces Tax Increase**

Decause of the passage by the 71st Legislature of Senate finance, the Clarendon School District is faced with the problem of raising local ad valorem taxes. Senate Bill 1019 mandated that in order to receive full allotment of school aid, school districts must make a local tax effort of at least the state average of \$0.70 per hundred dollars of valuation.

The 1988 tax rate for the Clarendon School District was \$0.64961. However, with state funding in jeopardy, the District will need to raise the tax rate by at least an 8% increase for 1989 in order to show a good faith effort to meet the requirements of Senate Bill 1019. The District receives 80% of its operating money from the state, and officials believe it would be unwise to give up \$8.00 of state funds for \$2.00 of locally-generated funds.

The Clarendon School District has been able to maintain a low tax rate for the District for many years. But with the minimum tax requirements of Senate Bill 1019, the local District must make a substantial effort to meet the \$0.70 state standard or face the loss of a large amount of the total state-allowed entitlement. Therefore. Clarendon's school officials are proposing a rate of \$0.69217 for the next year.

For comparison purposes, the Clarendon School District's proposed rate of \$0.69217 will still be considerably lower than that of area schools of comparable size. Some area schools and their tax rates are shown as follows:

Shamrock \$1.05 Wellington \$0.99 Memphis \$0.95 Quanah \$0.9439 Canadian \$0.915

Other area schools are also having to raise their tax rate to meet the requirements of Senate Bill 1019. Groom will have a tax rate in excess of \$1.20 for the coming year. Hedley is proposing to increase their tax rate to \$0.77 for 1989.

Although the 71st Legislature vowed that there would be no new state taxes, they have forced the local school districts, through the mandate of Senate Bill 1019, to raise local taxes.

The Clarendon School District officials solicit your support in this matter so that we can give our local students the same educational opportunity to prepare for the future as other school districts are providing for their students. As Thomas Jefferson said, "The bulwark of democracy is education."

### The First Day For A New **Teacher**

Keeping school in Texas she noted during the 1850's was no 20 years. simple task, especially for teachers newly arrived in the state. Fortunately one such lady, whose identity now is unknown, left us an account of her first day in a Texas school which subsequently was

The Clarendon Press published in the August 1853 Putnam's Monthly Magazine.

> The anonymous teacher described her schoolhouse as a rough log cabin set in a grove of oaks, a pleasant location "were it not infested with legions of gnats, whose bite for venom would do credit to larger insects." The building had a doorway and a single window without sash or glass. Lack of light or ventilation presented no problems, the gaps between the logs admitting fresh air in larger quantities than desired.

Entering the classroom for the first time, the schoolmistress rang her handbell to summon her child scholars. "They came with a whoop and halloo, twenty-five in number," she noted. They ranged in age up to

The pupils thronged around the teacher, for new people in the com-munity were considered oddities. Some of the boldest of the girls fingered her dress, wanting to know the price she had paid for the

calico. "Others plucked the artificial flowers from my bonnet," the teacher wrote, "and arranged them into bouquets for themselves."

The teacher found the names of her charges to be more than surprising. "I was struck with the love of the high sounding and romantic manifested by the parents," she wrote, noting such names among her pupils as Cleopatra Aletha and Phedora Constantia.

No sooner had the class day begun than a swarm of a dozen or so wasps swooped down from a rafter. Teacher and children. precipitously fled the cabin. "The wasps not finding anyone to molest, soon flew away, and we returned to our places," she later wrote.

Back in the classroom, the new schoolmarm began observing that the children were paying more attention to a rafter above her head than to her lesson. Looking up, she spied "an enormously long snake, coiling and uncoiling himself with

the utmost sang-froid." Terrified by the reptile, "flight was our only alternative," she wrote. "Setting the example, I was followed by my twenty-five pupils, leaving his snakeship and the nest of young wasps undisputed monarchs of the

By now it was noontime, so teacher and children took a lunch break while a man dislodged the serpent using a burning piece of cotton attached to the end of a long pole. In their lunch pails, the pupils found the ever-common Texas cornbread and bacon, quenching their thirsts with drinks from a nearby spring. After their meal, one group of children began playing by imitating the behaviors that they had seen among their elders at a recent camp meeting. " Their shouts, groans and amens made the primeval forest echo," according to
