Assistance Act Passed

Congress has passed and the President has signed the Disaster Assistance Act of 1989 which provides a program of disaster payments for crops for the 1989 crop year.

The crops eligible for payment are generally those which were eligible for 1988.

Recognized disaster conditions have been expanded to include, but are not limited to, drought, hail, excessive moisture, freeze, tornado, excessive wind or combinations thereof; also, related conditions which were brought on naturally as a result of damaging weather occurring before or during harvest.

Boy Drowns in Lake

Daniel Ramos Jr., 8, of Hereford, died Saturday, Sept. 2, 1989, at Greenbelt Lake. He drowned while swimming with his brother.

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson said the victim and his 10-year-old brother were swimming in the North end of Sandy Beach area about 11:25 a.m. when the accident occurred.

The victim's mother and father were at the lake during the incident, officials said.

Clarendon resident Doug Kidd, an employee of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, dove into the lake, pulled out the 10-year-old boy who was trying to save the 8-year-old who drowned in 25 feet of water, Thompson said.

"He first pulled out the 10-year-old boy who was trying to save his brother," Thompson said.

Kidd said he and a friend were fishing along the bank and were watching the boys playing along the shoreline.

"Suddenly I saw them off in the deep water and didn't realize they couldn't swim," Kidd said.

Kidd said he then rescued the 10-year-old boy, helped him spit water out of his lungs and dove back in the water with a family member to help find the other boy.

A diver from Clarendon and another from Memphis later recovered the victim's body from the depths of the lake, he said.

The Clarendon Press was informed in an interview this morning with Robbie Hill and Judge Christal that Panhandle Community Services still has many programs available to help the people of Donley County.

Ms. Hill stated that even though the Health Portion of PCS is being closed out effective September 29, 1989, the clients of those programs will be placed with another home health agency by Texas Department of Human Resources. We are sure that all of the clients will still receive the much needed help.

Judge W. R. Christal stated that even though Panhandle Community Services has had to remove themselves from Home Health Services, he has been working closely as a member of the Panhandle Community Services Area Board of Directors to assure everyone that the other programs will remain available to the citizens of Donley County.

Programs that are still available are the Section Eight Housing Program, which keeps those who meet the H.U.D. guidelines for eligibility with a portion of their rent.

Bollworms Exploding

Last week at this time the bollworm problem seemed to be limited in the county with some producers spraying. But now it looks like the bollworm population has exploded and many fields are being damaged before producers realize it.

Cotton producers will want to be checking fields closely, every three or four days to keep up with bollworm damage. Even though some fields have good beneficials and we are having hot weather, bollworm numbers may be building up fast enough to cause major economic damage to fields if they go unchecked and uncontrolled. Those fields that were planted late, after all the rains in late May and early June, are the fields that are the most susceptible to heavy losses because of the amount of small bolls present. Producers in the Hedley area began spraying about two weeks ago, and around Lelia Lake spraying began last week. I'm sure that there will be some spraying in the Clarendon area, and west of Clarendon this week, if they haven't already sprayed.

If we continue to get hot temperatures, then one spraying may be enough to carry through the

rest of the season, but cotton producers should be ready to put on two to four applications. Producers can generally expect five to seven days residual with use of synthetic pyrethroid insecticides which will control bollworms, tobacco budworms and boll weevils. After spraying, then frequent scouting of fields will be necessary to determine when and if spraying again will be needed.

Clinic Announced

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for September. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, and mumps.

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

Clarendon's clinic will be Monday, September 25, 1989 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Texas Department of Health Office on the 2nd floor, 300 S. Sully.

Clarendon ISD Figures Released

School budgets have been increased by 50% since the school reform HB 72 was enacted five years ago. A total of \$13.5 billion was approved by school trustees in 1,055 Texas school districts last year. To pay for it, officials levied local property taxes totaling \$5.6 billion. The state provided \$4.9 billion. The remainder came from school lunch and other fees, federal aid, bond sales, interest, and other revenue.

The figures come from the latest issue of *Bench Marks 1988-89 School Districts Budgets in Texas*, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,384 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$288 for repayment of debt and \$464 per student for capital outlay.

Clarendon ISD's budget provided \$3,471.64 per student for current operations, \$244.04 for debt service, and \$2,521.49 per student for capital outlay based on the 557 students enrolled in the fall semester of 1988.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Clarendon ISD in 1987-88 was \$23,677 plus supplements for the career ladder.

In Clarendon ISD the average salary for administrators was \$40,225, and \$27,845 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$2,757 per student as compared to \$2,722 in Clarendon ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 13.6 students in Clarendon ISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 17.1 to one. Because of the existence of small classes, especially at the high-school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many other classes have more than the average number of students.

To fund higher school budgets with a declining tax base, school trustees in most districts have raised tax rates. The average school district imposed a property tax at the rate of 91.2 cents per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 96.5% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was 88.1 cents (91.2 times 96.52%) statewide. Locally, the Clarendon ISD imposed a rate of \$.650 while property was appraised at 94.8% of its market value making the true rate \$.616 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value enables a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools. In 1988, the true tax rate exceeded \$1 in 336 school districts in Texas.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Clarendon ISD would have been \$516. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$484, and if







The Supplanter

by Jon Leggitt

The Supplanter. That's what the name "Jacob" means. To supplant means to replace. We know the story: Esau sold his birthright to his younger brother Jacob for a bowl of soup. "Two nations exist in your womb," the Lord told their mother, "...one stronger than the other, and the older shall serve the younger" (Genesis 25:23).

A number of other Bible personalities could well have been named "The Supplanter."

Judah gained pre-eminence over his older brother Reuben because of Reuben's immorality (Genesis 35:22, 49:4, 8).

"I have renounced him," the Lord said of Saul in I Samuel 16:1. Saul came to the throne of Israel with so much potential, but he simply would not obey the Lord, and he was replaced by David.

Shebna was the steward of King Hezekiah's household, but he evidently

came to think too much of himself and not enough of his responsibility. "...You are the disgrace of your master's palace," the Lord said to him (Isaiah 22:18), and supplanted him with Eliakim.

In an especially bloody chapter of Israel's history, Joab and Abiathar supported Adonijah, the half-brother of Solomon, in his attempt to seize the throne. Joab, upon Solomon's instructions, was killed and replaced as commander-in-chief of the army by Benaiah. Abiathar was banished from Israel and replaced as priest by Zadok (I Kings 2).

The traitorous Judas was replaced by Matthias as an apostle (Acts 1:23-26).

The Jews were, in a sense, replaced by the Gentiles (Romans 11:11).

A supplanter to the church at Ephesus is not named, but Christ warns them in Revelation 2:5 that, if they do not repent, "I shall come to you and remove the lampstand from its place." I do not think it is too much to infer that their place will be taken by another church.

You can probably think of other individuals and other groups in the Word who would not live up to God's expectation of them, and were replaced by those who would. God in His great love and mercy entrusts every person and every church with a responsible job in His

kingdom's work. What a tragedy if we find that our sins have rendered us useless to Him, and we must be supplanted. How very much better to be found able and willing to respond to His call to labor in His vineyards.





Agricultural News By Tim Trimble

Fertilizer now will help put your landscape fruit trees in good shaper for winter.

Caution and common sense are the watchwords for this process, but many trees benefit from a boost before cold weather comes, said Tim Trimble, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Make sure the tree is not actively growing as added fertilizer will promote more growth resulting in severe freeze damage.

Trees under three years old should not be fertilized now as they are most likely to begin new growth. On mature trees that are not actively growing, apply one cup of ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) around

the dripline. The dripline is the edge of the tree's canopy and is usually the edge of the tree's root area.

For trees that look to be in poor health, two cups should be added, Trimble said.

Higher rates than those suggested could cause freeze damage, but the correct amount at the right time will make the trees look healthier and bloom better next spring.

Consciences Cleaned

Some churches sprinkle infants. Other churches practice immersion, and that only for adults, or at least older children. Perhaps it is natural for the former to ask the latter, "Why?" In fact there are several answers.

First, that practice is universally acceptable. Virtually all churches in all ages have recognized immersion. It is unquestionably the most oecumenical practice. Every Christian group should accept a person who has been immersed and is trying to live a Christian life, and most do.

Second, immersion is historically valid. This was the practice of the early church. Only later—centuries after the death of the apostles—were other initiation rites substituted.

Third, immersion is biblically correct. There is no such word as "baptize" in the New Testament. Our English word is a transliteration of the ordinary, everyday Greek word for "dip" or "plunge" or immerse. Some translators (such as those into Japanese) have translated the word rather than transliterating it, and there is no controversy over "modes" where the translators used the honest modern equivalent for the ordinary ancient word.

Fourth, immersion is in keeping with the imagery intended. In Romans 6:3 & 4 and in Colossians 2:12 the apostle Paul wrote that those who were buried through immersion—just as Christ was buried—were raised just as Christ was raised. And Ananias added a further symbolic meaning during Saul's conversion when he said, "What are you waiting for? Get up! Be immersed and wash away your sins!" [Acts 22:16].

Finally, there is a very personal reward for those who are immersed. For in submitting to this rite, they can obtain a new, clean conscience, [1 Peter 3:21]. It is a wonderful feeling!
