Joe Terry Has Painful Injury

DRAGS HIMSELF SEVERAL HOURS IN SEARCH OF AID DURING NIGHT

While on his way home late Thursday night, Joe Terry, caretaker of the South Ward and Junior High school buildings, lost his way and fell down in a pasture southeast of the school buildings.

The fall resulted in a break to his left hip. He dragged himself Biggs. some distance and loudly called for help. John Henry Crawford, who lives east of where the injured man was found, responded to the call about 3 a. m. Terry is shortly after nine o'clock.

Mrs. Chas. M. Lowry heard the loud calls for help about the same hour and Mr. Lowry was among the first to reach Mr. Terry, whom he took in his car to Adair hospital as the victim appeared to be in great pain.

After some time, splints were secured from Tennessee, and the injury was set, the break occurring in the hip. It is said that the victim will be confined to the hospital some two months at

The final chapter in which Harry Paul Huckins was the local victim in the robbery of the 66 Station here the night of November 4, 1939, was written a few days ago when three men were taken to state prison from Hans-

OIL FIELD PRODUCTS A substantial reduction of railway rates in the transportation of gasoline, kerosene and distillate, introducing a great saving to shippers, was inaugurated today (Aug. 6) by all Texas Railroads, Paul P. Hastings, vice president of the Santa Fe Railway, an-

nounced. Based on mileage, the reduce tions range from two and a half cents per hundred pounds on a thirty mile haul to eight cents for two hundred miles. The Commission's authority was in response to the joint application of the Texas Railroads seeking to meet increased truck competition.
