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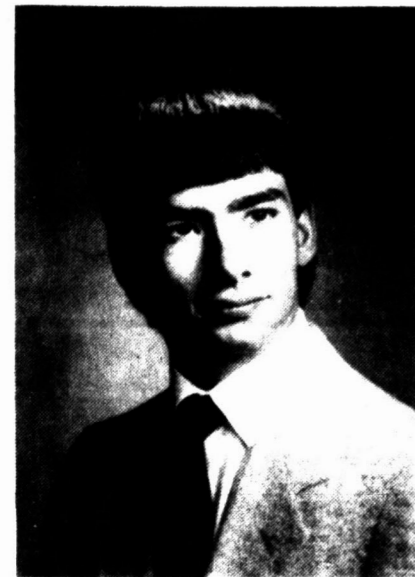

## Agriculture Sweats Out Global Warming

West Texas landscapes, with their thirsty soils and treeless horizons, could sweep across nearly all of the state if a recent study is right about global warming trends.

"Given current climate forecasts, by optimistic standards, agricultural land use in Texas would drop by 10 percent," said Dr. Bruce McCarl, an economist at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. "But at the other extreme, agricultural acres could drop by 40 percent."

McCarl, with a team of 10 scientists across the nation, examined suspected global climate change and U.S. agriculture. The research included regional implications for 10 of the nation's major agricultural production areas, speculating on changes if certain conditions happen within the next 50-75 years.

Temperatures around the world are going to become increasingly hotter throughout the 21st century, many scientists believe. This global

## State Economy Growing Local Economy Slightly Behind

Donley County's economy lagged slightly behind the state figures based on sales tax collections. State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported that state sales tax for May totaled \$84 million. "That's a comfortable jump ahead of last year's payments and another indication that our economy continues to grow."

Sales for the month of May were up by 9.63% statewide, and up 8.05% for year-to-date over 1989. Donley County figures were also up, but not by as much. Sales taxes in Donley County were up 7.28% in May 1990 compared to May of last year. Year-to-date figures were up 5.23%.

Area counties reported varied results. Armstrong County (Claude) was up 18.14% for May, but only 1.66% for YTD. Briscoe was up 11.09% for the month, 4.67% for the year. Carson County suffered a downturn of -13.77% for May, but still managed to gain 1.88% for the year-to-date. By Contrast, Childress was up 2.16% for the month, but down -1.09% YTD.

Wellington was down for May, -9.07%, but up for the year 3.13%. Gray slipped on both figures, -0.86% and -1.37%. McLean performed better than Lefors or Pampa for the month. All three towns were down for the YTD.

Hall County was off -3.08% for the month, -4.10% for the longer period. Figures were not available for the month for Lakeview or Turkey, but YTD figures for Estelline and Memphis were off sharply over last year (-12.74% and -5.99%) while Lakeview and Turkey were up (8.35% and a whopping +20.91% for Turkey). Turkey's performance over the past several months seems worth studying.

In Hemphill County (Canadian) the figures were pretty discouraging, sagging for May, -11.74, and for YTD, -4.13%. Motley's figures are depressing as well, off -31.36 and -3.15%. Both Matador and Roaring Springs declined in both periods.

Amarillo reported a mixed bag, but it was better overall. Randall County lacked a bit of reaching last year's May sales, -1.23, but is still ahead YTD by 1.56%. Potter performed much better, up 65.79% for the month and 17.39% YTD. If that continues, Jerry Hodge may make some money from his wager with T. Boone Pickens.

Wheeler declined in both categories, -5.42% and -3.22%.

How did Clarendon perform? That depends on whether the town is compared to the state or the area. Compared to the state as a whole, Clarendon should be graded "Needs Improvement". Compared to the recovering towns in the area, Clarendon is "Average". Compared to the declining towns in the area Clarendon's performance would be rated "Superior". Yet in the long run, Clarendon must compete not on a state-wide basis, but in a world economy. How are we doing?

Medicines for Asthma Symptom Relief

According to the Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs, as many as 7 out of 10 Americans experience asthma symptoms sometime during their lifetimes. Asthma is an obstruction or narrowing of the small air passages in the lungs. An asthma attack typically produces symptoms of chest tightness, breathlessness, wheezing (a fine whistling sound), and coughing.

Much asthma occurs as an allergic response to substances in the environment such as grass and pollen. Foods such as shellfish, chocolate, and eggs have reportedly caused asthmatic attacks. Running or other types of exercise may cause air passage constriction.

Asthma symptom prevention and treatment may be achieved with a number of prescription medicines. Theophylline causes muscles around the air passages to relax, improving the flow of air into and out of the lungs. Adrenaline (epinephrine) and adrenalin-like medicines such as metaprotorenol also increase the size of air passages and usually cause rapid improvement of air flow. Another group of medicines which can improve air flow are the steroids, which include prednisone, beclomethasone, and dexamethasone. Cromolyn sodium is sometimes given to chronic asthmatics to prevent asthma attacks.

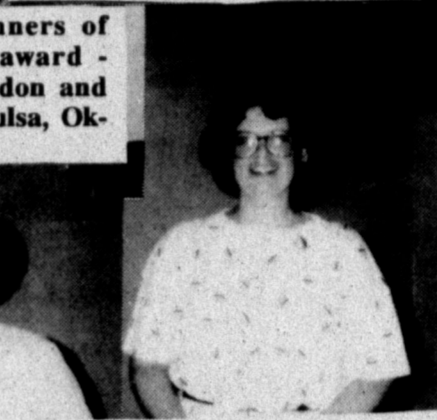

warming, if it occurs, is blamed on a buildup in the atmosphere of carbon dioxide and other gases that trap sunlight that normally would be reflected by the Earth.

For Texas, forecasts indicate that average annual temperatures could be about 10-13 degrees F higher, McCarl said. Added to an already semi-tropical to semi-arid climate, the increased temperature could have a major impact on Texas agriculture.

Adding 13 degrees to the annual average temperature of 57.5 degrees in the Texas High Plains, for example, would make that region more like the current climate in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. The Lower Valley's annual average temperature in 1988, the latest available figures, was about 73 degrees.

McCarl and his colleagues used models from atmospheric science, plant science and economics to examine the potential impact specifically for corn, soybeans and wheat crops.

"Dryland crop yields would decrease by up to 44 percent, and irrigated crop yields would decrease by up to 21 percent," McCarl said of the Texas figures. "Agricultural prices would increase."

Because of the increase in crop water demand and reliance on irrigation, he said, there could be a net increase of 5 percent on water use for crops.

"Agricultural benefits to consumers and producers would decrease by \$700 million to \$3 billion if crop varieties adapted to heat and dryer soil conditions are not available," he said.

Climate forecasts were derived from the NASA Goddard Institute of Space Studies (GISS) and the Princeton Geophysical Fluid Dynamics Laboratory (GFDL) models. These calculate likely climate changes under various carbon dioxide levels.

But carbon dioxide, one of the culprits in global warming, could have some positive results for crop production because it stimulates photosynthesis, the process that makes plants grow. Therefore, the researchers also considered two scenarios within each model: one included the expected growth stimulating benefits; the other ignored them.

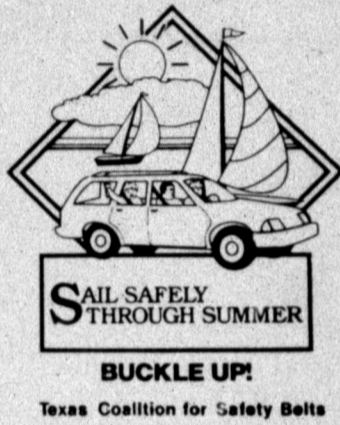
Using the GISS climate forecast without the beneficial implications of carbon dioxide, irrigated corn yields in Texas would drop more than 14 percent, but irrigated soybean yields would increase almost 13 percent. Winter wheat yields would remain about the same under irrigation and but drop almost 18 percent on dryland acres.

The figures are worse under the GFDL climate forecast without considering beneficial carbon dioxide. Under that scenario, irrigated corn, soybeans and wheat yields drop about 20 percent. Dryland wheat yields decrease by more than 40 percent.

Here is an invitation from Jesus Christ: "Come unto me all you that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).

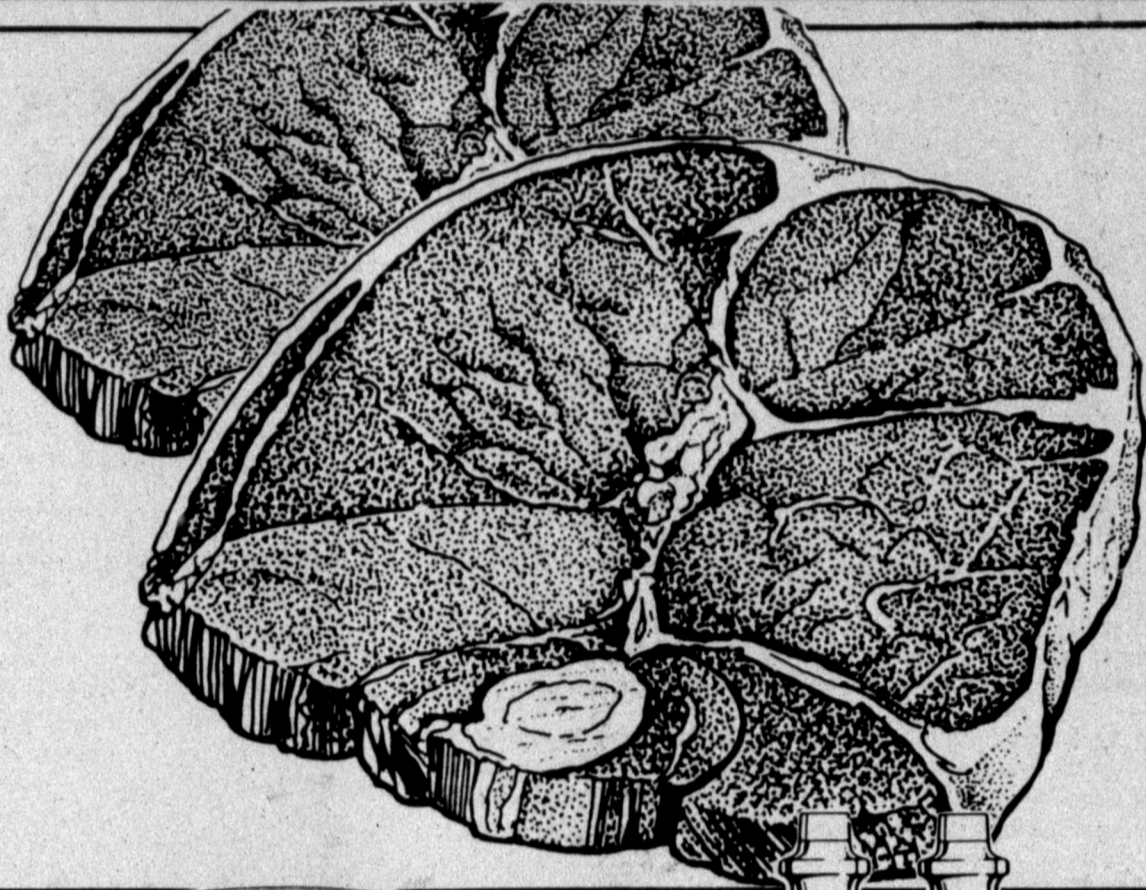
Responding to this invitation is a good place to start when disappointments come.

Others present: City Secretary Donna Edwards, John Deaver II, Dickie Johnson, Nancy Watson, Dianna Wiggs, Annette Osburn, Connie McAnear, Rhonda Aveni, Wanda Smith, Becky Lane, JoDec Mincey, and Vikki Laxson.

Motion was made by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, to approve the minutes of the June 26, and June 28, 1990, meetings.

Mayor James Sharrar then opened the Public Hearing for the purpose of presenting the project that was developed as a result of the First Public Hearing. The total cost of the project and the City's matching funds were discussed. Mayor Sharrar asked for questions or comments regarding the proposed project. All present signed the Attendance List. City Engineer Dickie Johnson explained in greater detail the change made in the location for the standpipe. When no further questions or comments were forthcoming, motion was made by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman David Pitts, to close the Public Hearing. Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith, to pass a resolution as follows:

## RESOLUTION OF THE CITY

**COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF A TEXAS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM APPLICATION TO THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE FOR COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUNDS; AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ACT AS THE CITY'S CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE IN ALL MATTERS PERTAINING TO THE CITY'S PARTICIPATION IN THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM.**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Clarendon desires to develop a viable urban community, including decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities, principally for persons of low/moderate income; and

WHEREAS, certain conditions exist which represent a threat to the public health and safety; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and in the best interests of the City of Clarendon to apply for funding under the 1990 Texas Community Development Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

1. That a Texas Community Development Program application for Community Development Funds is hereby authorized to be filed on behalf of the City with the Texas Department of Commerce.

2. That the City's application be placed in competition for funding under the Community Development Fund.

3. That the application be for \$194,700 of grant funds to carry out water system improvements and engineering costs.

4. That the City Council directs and designates the Mayor as the City's Chief Executive Officer and Authorized Representative to act in all matters in connection with this application and the City's participation in the Texas Community

Development Program. 5. That the City commit \$29,300 from its General Fund as a cash contribution to be matched with Texas Community Development Funds to be used for water system improvements, grant management costs and audit costs.

Passed and approved this 10th day of July, 1990.

He further explained the true intent of a paragraph in the agreement that the City had questioned. The Board will have the City Attorney look over the document.

Bills for the month of June 1990 were presented, and upon a motion by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, said bills were ordered paid. Motion carried.

Clarendon Fire Department Receipts and Disbursements for the month of June 1990 were presented, and upon a motion by Alderman Steve Smith, seconded by Alderman James Kuhn, said Receipts and Disbursements were approved. Motion carried.

There being no further City business at this time, motion was made

by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, to adjourn. Motion carried.

# County Petitions District

A petition requesting that Donley County become a part of Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District #3, signed by 67 persons and carried by Jenks Boston and Jack Moreman, representatives of the Donley County Steering Committee, was approved by the Board of Directors at a Board Meeting on June 26, 1990.

Public hearings will be held within Donley County and also in the present District in the near future. If the Board of Directors so desire, after hearing all testimony, they may call for an election for the people of Donley County to ratify their joining the District. This election would probably be held in January 1991.

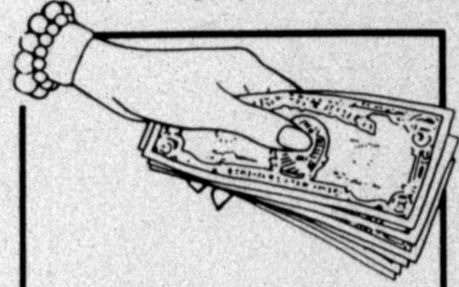

There will be classes for children ages 3 years and up, with stories, games, and crafts.

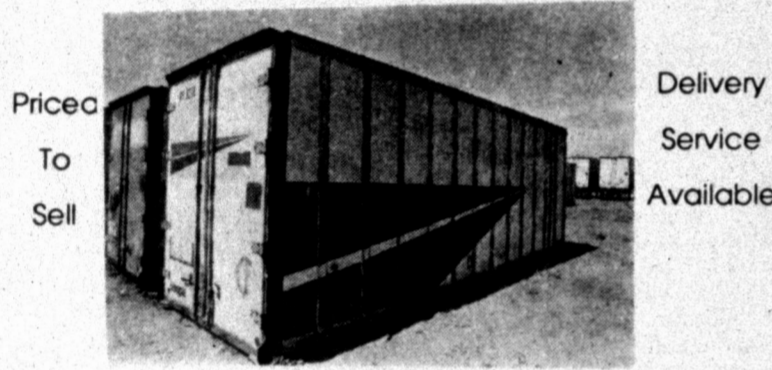
