





warming, if it occurs, is blamed on a buildup in the atmosphere of carbon dioxide and other gases that trap sunlight that normally would be reflected

For Texas, forecasts indicate that average annual temperatures could be about 10-13 degrees F higher, McCarl said. Added to an already semi-tropical to semi-arid climate, the increased temperature could have a major impact on Texas agriculture.

Adding 13 degrees to the annual average temperature of 57.5 degrees in the Texas High Plains, for example, would make that region more like the current climate in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. The Lower Valley's annual average temperature in 1988, the latest available figures, was about

McCarl and his colleagues used models from atmospheric science, plant science and economics to examine the potential impact specifically for corn, soybeans and wheat crops.

"Dryland crop yields would decrease by up to 44 percent, and irrigated crop yields would decrease by up to 21 percent," McCarl said of the Texas figures. "Agricultural prices would increase."

Because of the increase in crop water demand and reliance on irrigation, he said, there could be a net increase of 5 percent on water use for

"Agricultural benefits to consumers and producers would decrease by \$700 million to \$3 billion if crop varieties adapted to heat and dryer soil conditions are not available," he said.

Climate forecasts were derived from the NASA Goddard Institute of Space Studies (GISS) and the Princeton Geophysical Fluid Dynamics Laboratory (GFDL) models. These calculate likely climate changes under

various carbon dioxide levels. But carbon dioxide, one of the culprits in global warming, could have some positive results for crop production because it stimulates photosynthesis, the process that makes plants grow. Therefore, the researchers also considered two scenarios within each model: one included the expected

growth stimulating benefits; the other ignored them.

Using the GISS climate forecast without the beneficial implications of carbon dioxide, irrigated corn yields in Texas would drop more than 14 percent, but irrigated soybean yields would increase almost 13 percent. Winter wheat yields would remain about the same under irrigation and but drop almost 18 percent on dryland acres.

The figures are worse under the GFDL climate forecast without considering beneficial carbon dioxide. Under that scenario, irrigated corn, soybeans and wheat yields drop about 20 percent. Dryland wheat yields decrease by more than 40 percent.

Seeking the cause of disappointment is a major step in meeting life's disappointments. Accepting disappointments without worshipping them is vital in getting on top of disappointments. It is possible to make a god out of a shattered

Moses met his disappointment by keeping his eyes on God. When disappointments come, they can become a means to have an appointment with God. People can disappoint, but Jesus never fails. Jesus Christ never disappoints. The Bible never disappoints. When disappointment seems to be the end of everything. they can become the beginning of something when focus is kept on Jesus.

God's work must be seen from the vantage point of eternity. God's work is larger than man's littleness. God's work is larger than man's disappointments. Moses missed the promissed land, but he expienced knowing the Lord "face to face".


Here is an invitiation from Jesus Christ: "Come unto me all you that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).

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
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

COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, **AUTHORIZING THE SUBMIS-**SION OF A TEXAS COM-MUNITY DEVELOPMENT PRO-GRAM APPLICATION TO THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE FOR COM-MUNITY DEVELOPMENT **FUNDS; AND AUTHORIZING** THE MAYOR TO ACT AS THE CITY'S CHIEF EXECUTIVE OF-FICER AND AUTHORIZED REP-RESENTATIVE IN ALL MAT-TERS PERTAINING TO THE CITY'S PARTICIPATION IN THE COMMUNITY DEVELOP-MENT PROGRAM.
