A Bluff or A Fight.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 8.—It is firmly believed in high places that a great battle will be fought at Liao Yang within a few days. It is said on what may be regarded as good authority that the Czar has informed Gen. Kuropatkin that the Japanese advance must be checked, and, for the good name of the empire, a battle must be risked.

Kuropatkin's enemies, and he has many among the officials, are endeavoring to undermine him in the good graces of the Czar, and are using the reverse in Southern Manchuria to bring about his downfall. It is believed they will be successful, as His Majesty has great confidence in the ability of the former War Minister to handle the situation.

The reason why success against the Japanese is desired now, even if it means greater difficulty in bringing about the ultimate successful termination of the war, is for the effect on the discontented elements at home. It is feared the abandonment of Mauchuria without a fight would have serious results in the disaffected portions of the empire.

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
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
