## RUSSO-JAPAI WAR HEWS

## Lose Heavily

Tokio, May 8.-Every supple mental report received from Gen Kuroki, commanding the first Jap anese Army, increases the Russia casualties in last Sunday's battl at Chiu Tien Cheng on the Yalu River. The Japanese have buried about 1,400 Russians and have 50 of the enemy's wounded in the field hospitals. It is estimated tha the total Russian casualties exceed 2,500 . Over 300 Russian prisoners are en route to Matsuayami, wher they are expected to arrive Wednes day.
