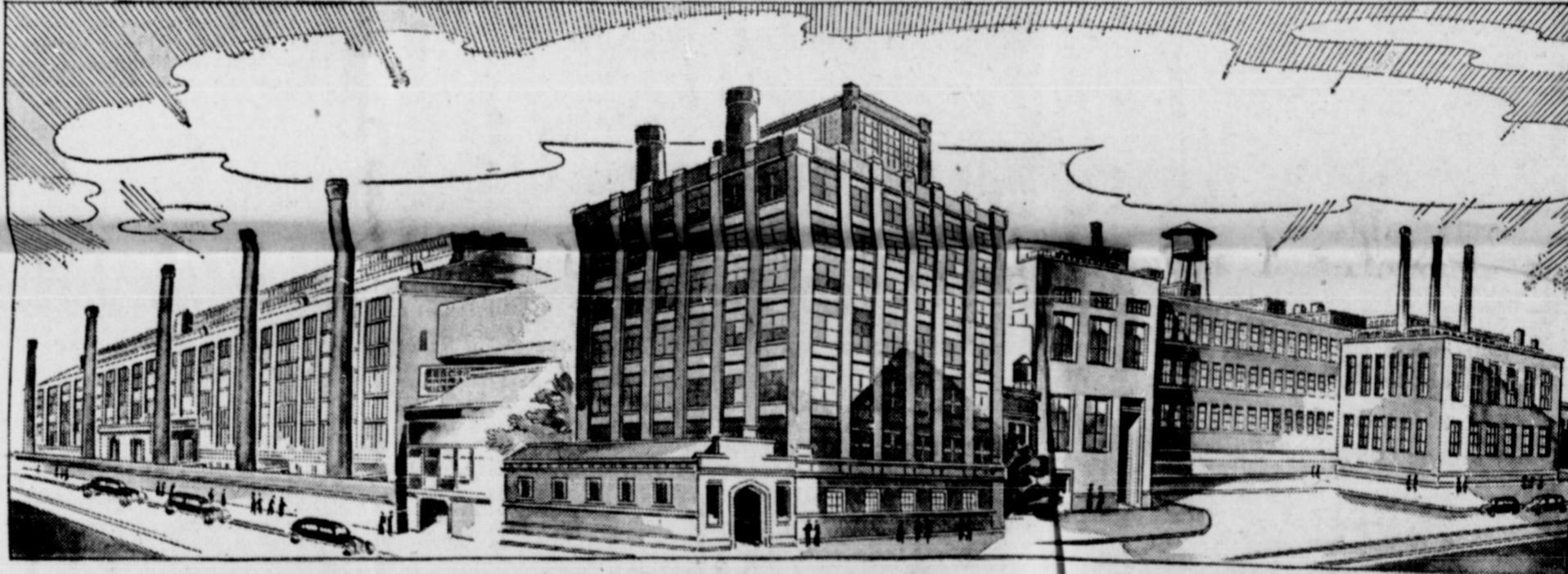

NEGRO WAITED FOR OFFICERS AS STABBED VICTIM DIES

There was a great time for the colored element in the southeast room of Lizzie Guthrie's home as her colored friends danced and drank late Saturday night, and into the small hours of last Sunday morning.

At about 2:15 a. m. Sunday, visiting negroes began to become nervous and dissatisfied. There arose a dispute between "Pappy Charley" Smith of Amarillo and Lorene Houston Wilson of Corsicana, all colored as was the crowd present.

Becoming incensed because of her attention to younger men, Smith seized Lorene Wilson by the hair of the head and stabbed her fatally in the neck and body. The killer so informed the sheriff's department when officers arrived.

As the officers went to the place of trouble, they saw cars driven by negroes going at great baste in all directions. Some rounded up later gave the same version of the murder as did the accused, who had waited for the arrival of the officers without any idea of escape. Some of the negroes knew Smith's reputation for being a bad negro when intoxicated, and suddenly remembered unfinished business elsewhere when Smith began his carving operations.

The accused was given an examining trial in the local jail at 2 p. m. Sunday. He was questioned by county attorney John C. Knorpp who gathered evidence of the affair. R. C. Weatherly, peace justice, denied the accused bond and he was remanded to jail to await grand jury investigation.

The dead woman had a burial insurance policy and a Corsicana colored mortician came for the body Monday.

Due to the fact that local law-abiding negroes were greatly incensed over the affair, the accused preferred to remain in jail for his personal protection.

It is visiting negroes who cause practically all of the trouble among the colored element here. Clarendon's colored folks, in the main, are very self-respecting.
