## Forks Of Creek **Decide Issue**

With twenty-four men in the race for the Senate to succeed the late Morris Sheppard, four men stood out in the first vote count a few hours after the close of the

polls Saturday. These four men were Johnson, O'Daniel, Mann and Dies with standing in the order named. Tabulations by the Texas Election Bureau through Sunday and Monday continued to show Johnson in the lead, but with a lesser chance of victory as the votes were reported from outlying districts. By noon Monday, Johnson's

#### O'Daniel Leads

Donley county cast her lot along with thirty-two other northwest Texas counties in giving Gov. O'Daniel a majority. The vote was tabulated by the county commissioners Tuesday.

Results of this official count shows the following votes received: Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel 375; Gerald C. Mann 265; Lyndon Johnson 211; Martin Dies 52; Sam Morris 7; Elvins, the only republican candidate, received one vote.

In conformity with the custom through the years, the election went off quietly Saturday. There was little or no persuasion used to change any one's mind. Each voter had long before made up his

lead over O'Daniel of a few thousand had dwindled from 5,152 to 701 votes. With the count completed in 117 counties, and careful estimates of the remaining 254 counties gave Johnson a lead of 301 votes.

Announcement at 4 p. m. Tues-day showed O'Daniel leading by 381 and a final tabulation late Tuesday night showed the "forks of the creek" had put the Governor over with a margin of 1,095

The nip and tuck race between Congressman Lyndon Johnson and Governor O'Daniel for the United States Senate recalls the closest race for a major office in the history of Texas.

It was the gubernatorial contest of 80 years ago, which Frank R. Lubbock won by a plurality of 124 votes out of 43,580 votes cast. It was a three-cornered contest between Governor Edward Clark,

seeking re-election; Lubbock and Thomas Jefferson Chambers, Lubbock's vote was 21,854, Clark's 21,730, and Chambers' 13,799. As in the present senatorial race, a majority was not required.

the high man winning. O'Daniel, twice elected governor of Texas without any political background except a hillbilly band and a pleasing radio appeal won in the first primary in each instance. This was an innovation

in Texas. Upon the death of Morris Sheppard, Gov. O'Daniel appointed Andrew Jackson Houston, 87, son of Sam Houston, hero of the battle of San Jacinto. He made the appointment on Independence Day. Houston died in a Baltimore hospital after serving in the U.S. Senate 24 days.

Lt. governor Coke R. Stevenson will automatically become governor when Gov. O'Daniel resigns, which will be at the completion of the official canvass of the vote July 14th.

#### Wonderland of Rocks



Down in Southern Arizona, just a few miles north of the Mexican border, lies Arizona's Wo Rocks. This area, the Chiricahua National Monument, lies near U. S. Observance of these simple rules by operators of all crafts, whether they be rowboats and canoes or larger boats, will do much in holding down the list of drownings:

Never overload a boat, nor allow occupants of a boat to stand

Do not use a motor of too large horsepower for the size of the boat. It is also unsafe to use a small horsepower motor on a large boat because in case of a storm the boat will be unmanage-

Every boat should be equipped with one life preserver for each person in it, fire extinguisher, ights and good oars or paddles.

Every outboard motor should be equipped with a chain or good rope because motors will frequently come loose and be lost at the bottom of the lake or stream. Never leave a motor unattended

while it is running. The motor may give a quick turn and throw you into the water. And most important of all: leave your bottle at home; water and alcohol do not mix.


