## One Dollar a Year

A Thousand Killed, Millions De
stroyed in San Francisce At 5:30 Wednesday morning an earthquake devasted San Francisco, California, destroying property to lars and engulfing in the ruins 1,100 souls. The falling houses caught on fire, and as the earthquake shock broke the conduits in the ground the fire department was powerless to fight the flames. By 10 o'clock hundreds of acres, and citizens were blowing up whole blocks of buildings with dynamite in the path of effort to stop their progress. The shock destroyed all telegrap and telephone communication, except the postal, and the only detailed report of the dreadful situatio
came by cable from Honolulu.
