An explanation of the fact tha the cost of living bas advanced so rapidly is given by an official, who says he has made a close study of the subject for years. He attributes it to the increase of gold pro duction within the last decade and a half-to a glut of gold. The supply of money has increased at E rate greater than the supply of ne-
cessities of life. Money being cessities of life. Money being
more plentiful, people will pay more for an article than it would bring years ago, when the per capita of money was not nearly so great. It is said that the annual production of gold in the world from 1800 to 1850 was only $\$ 16$, 000,000. From 1850 to 1890 it was $\$ 120,000,000$. From 1890 to 1900 $\$ 210,000,000$. From 1900 to 1905 the yearly production increased to $\$ 320,000,000$, and last year it was $\$ 379,000,000$. It is believed that the total gold production of the this year. The gold crop is not consumed. It remains in the world as per:uanent stock, to increase the world's supply of money. For every dollar in circulation in this country ten years ago there are nearly $\$ 2$ today. The per capita circulation of the United States is estimated at a little more than $\$ 32$. This means that if the entire stock of money in America was divided equally among the citizen equally among the citizens every man, woman and child in the coun
try would have more than $\$ 32$.
