Nearly a Million Texas School Children.

Saturday the Texas educational department gave out a summary of urday. the scholastic population and apportionment of the school fund for the scholastic year, beginning Sep.,

The summary shows the total number of children in Texas of the scholastic age of 7 to 17 years to be 869,829, which is an increase of 71,154 over last year.

Out of the total number this year 686,865 are white and 182,-964 colored children. The per capita this year is \$5, the total state apportionment for the scholastic year 1906-07 is \$4,349,145, against \$4,192,043 for last scholastic year. This remarkable increase in children of scholastic age in Texas is due principally to the of male children enumerated is is doubtful. 441,892 and female 427,937.






