ABOUT HENRY FORD

AND THE C.I.O.

From the Moore County News:

Never has this country witnessed so great an inconsistency as the present one, wherein defense heads cry for speed and more speed and then for political reasons, ignore valuable sources of

A low bid on critically needed defense material, recently made by Henry Ford, was rejected, even when the rejectors knew he could speed its completion as perhaps no other industrialist in the

Mr. Ford happens to be the big objective of the C.I.O. He never has let that organization run his business and apparently, does not intend to do so.

So the C.I.O. infested National \$200. These prices do not include son, Mr. J. N. Riley of Sunnyview. Relations Board whispers in the ear of Sidney Hillman, co-head from \$12.50 in some places to \$25 of the Defense Commission, that Ford must not get war contracts. This is the same Hillman who hails from Russia, and is a C.I.O. big shot.

Thus, while Britain bleeds, Ford must remain idle; C.I.O. strikes continue to threaten key plants; C.I.O. leader Hillman continues his grip on the Defense Commission; C.I.O. sympathizer "Madam" Perkins continues to remain as Secretary of Labor and a National Labor Board honeycombed with C.I.O. influence, continues to nag at the heels of industry.

Where is the housecleaning said to have been promised by President Roosevelt, to close constituents, before election time? From The Canyon News:

Henry Ford is an onery old cuss, so far as labor leaders are concerned. Henry has always paid a higher wage scale than the unions demanded; has always treated his men so well that he has no strikes; has encouraged home ownership, and has given his employees every advantage. Yet he does not fit into the plan of the labor radicals, who demand that he submit his personal ideals of a successful business to the whims of this group. As a result, the largest single manufacturing plant in the world is deprived of government contracts for national defense, because Henry will not adjust his idea to those who seek to dictate his business. We are wondering whether it makes any difference to those oppressed Englishmen whether Henry Ford is making munitions, or that the munitions are manufactured exclusively under the direction of CIO. Should American boys be forced into battle with Hitler, we are sure that none of them will look at the labels on the shells, guns, tanks or trucks to see who make which, and under what labor contract. No nation has ever been so kind to labor as the United States, and now under the pressure of preparing to save civilization some labor unions are seeking to dictate the whole labor program. The people of the United States are not interested in whether CIO shall crush AFL, or




