The outlook for the coming campaign is promising, for through tioning candidates the people's rule has already been re-established or is in the final stages of establishment in twenty-six states, while immigration, trial by jury or any nationally more than one-fourth the members of the National House are pledged. To continue the work and with increased power a National Initiative and Referendum Committee is being organized. It will question the candidates for Congress and the Presidency, and will co-operate with Initiative and Referendum State Committees and with the existing Leagues and Federation. The strategic feature chiefly relied upon is the fact that candidates who will not pledge for more power in the people cannot secure their votes. The questioning of candidates will prevent an evasion of the issue.
