Like a battle report reads the Interstate Commerce Commission ac cident bulletin for October, November and December, 1906, so great is the list of killed and injured in railroad wrecks.

The total number of collisions and derailments in the three months passengers and employes killed was 474, an increase of 207 over the number reported for the quarter immediately preceding. Of these record for any quarter except that ending with September, 1904.

Money on Small Farm.

Some one hes said that the man who has one cow, two dozen chickens and enough land to support them, is not a poor man. It is sur prising the returns which can be received from a farm large enough to support one cow and a few dozen chickens. The writer was talking with a small farmer not long ago who had sold over \$600 worth of products from one cow and four dozen chickens in a year. This man owns four acres of land near St. Louis. Milk sells for 10 cents per quart in the section of the city near which he resides and from the one cow he sold in a year \$210 worth of milk; for a fat calf he received \$11; eggs, \$185; broilers, \$110; fruit \$91. The amount of circulation based on bonds was \$550,204,771, which is an increase for the year of \$45.781,-272 and for the month of \$2,571,-

The amount of circulation secured by lawful money was \$49,-709,069, an increase for the year of \$7,486,306 and for the month of \$130,069.
