The pistol law is doing some good anyhow. Clarksville dealers report that not a single pistol sale has been made since the enforcement of the new law providing for an additional tax of 50 per cent. Other varieties of firearms are sold as formerly but all stock of pistols were closed out before the new law became effective.

Ridgely, after consulting with Cortelyou, has proposed to the national banks of the country that they substitute other securities for government bonds on deposit in the treasury and use the bonds thus re leased for taking out additional circulation. It is stated from \$15, 000,000 to \$20,000,000 additional circulation may thus be obtained immediately which notes are now actually in the treasury vaults.

According to a bulletin by the agricultural department at Washington, in the state of New York there are 12,000 abandoned farms, representing an area of 12,000,000 acres and capable of caring for a population of 250.000. It is stated that farm lands in that state have decreased \$170,000,000 in value in the last 20 years. One cause of this is perhaps the desire to try the "get-rich-quick" schemes and the moving to cities. Another is that the actual farmers are moving to the more productive lands of the west and south. The man who does not secure a good home now is missing an opportunity he will regret more and more as time passes and the home-seekers become more numerous.

To forestall the market hunter, the law prohibits the transportation of game by railroads and express companies, except where the hunter who killed them makes affidavit to the effect he is taking not more than 25 birds home on the same train on which he travels. The one exception is that 65 ducks may be shipped, but they must be on at birth as to be almost despaired man. the same train with the man who of will rapidly take on flesh and killed them, and he must make affidavit that he killed them in three consecutive days and not more than 25 on each of the three

Another provision against the border market or professional hunter is the provision which reads: "Whenever in this act the profession of any bird is prohibited, said prohibiton shall apply equally to a bird coming from outside the state as to one within the state." This prevents killing game in Texas and claiming it was shipped from Mexico or other outside points.

Cattle Feed Short In Oklahoma.

"In my judgment too many Texas cattle are being shipped into Oklahoma for wintering purposes in proportion to the amount of feed in the country, is the comment made by Inspector F. M. Canton in his weekly report to Secretary H. E. Crowley of the Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas. Mr. Canton has charge of almost the entire inspector in a position to know whereof he speaks. He says that a great many Texas cattle are now being shiped into Oklahoma.

There seems to be a great scarci ty of feed stuff in every section this year and although Oklahoma is probably better off than many other states, it is generally believed that the cattlemen of that section will not have much feed to spare after taking care of stock now on

Just what effect Mr. Cantan's statement will have will be watched with interest, as all Texas cattlemen are anticipating an unusually heavy movement of stock to Okla homa before winter sets in. It i argued that there is no feed to speak of in Texas, and that it will be just about as cheap to ship to Oklahoma and take the chances of a shortage as it will be to hold cattle here where it is known that feed will be hard to get and will command prices much higher than heretofore.
