At Amarillo Tuesday night the frame residence on Pierce street, owned by Miss Louise Moore, was totally destroyed by fire. Loss, \$1,800; insurance \$800.

Mrs. R. M. Miller, wife of the station agent at Honey Grove, suicided Monday by crawling under the house where she lived and taking carbolic acid.

At Glenrose several days ago, after making four unsuccessful attemps to take his own life-by poison, knife, blows on the head and eating ground glass-Charles Scarlock, a horseshoer by trade, has been adjudged insane and taken to the asylum at Austin.

At Sulphur Springs the singing anniversary in honor of the 103d birthday of J. F. Youngblood will be held at the First Baptist church on Dec. 7 and 8. There will be a program and the pastor, Rev. C. T. Alexander, will preach. Addresses will be made by singers, former pupils of Mr. Youngblood.

At Amarillo Tuesday E. C. Jeffries, formerly of Dallas, was arrested on a charge of illegal voting. Jeffries recently bought an interest in a firm there. Proceedings were brought against him by the prohibition leaders. He waived examining trial and made bond. His case will be taken up by the grand jury now in session there.

In the case of the state against the Pullman company, for ouster or payment of \$100,040 tax, a continuance was announced at Austin owing to the crowded condition of the docket. The case had been set for Wednesday. The suit is to compel the company to take out a permit to do business in Texas and to pay tax on its capital stock, \$100,-000,000.

The body of D. R. Rankin, casher of the Merchants and Planters bank of Lawton, Ok., which failed Nov. 8, and who has been missing since that time, was found by an Indian boy Tuesday in Cache creek, two miles north of Lawton. The boy reported his discovery to the officers at Lawton, who immediate ly identified the missing cashier. It is supposed that he committed suicide, as that has been the theory from the first. It has developed that Rankin owed the bank \$3,100. He carried life insurance to the amount of \$25,000.

In Federal court at Ft. Worth this week Edwin Thompson, age 15, who robbed the postoffice at Channing a few months ago, was given five years in the cormatory at Washington, D. C., and fined \$100. Bynum Russell, aged 17. was sent to the pen for a year and and a day for theft of a mail pouch. Leslie B. Brinson, of Arlington, aged 19, was fined \$100 and 60 days in jail for theft of letters while a clerk in the postoffice at Ft. Worth. C. Clendenen was fined \$50 for opening a letter. R. J. Jennison was sent up for two years for sending an abscene letter through the mail.

The Posident's Cape. President Roosevelt's distinguished looking military cape is one of the characteristic "clothes" in Washington. It is probably more familiar here than

anything else the president wears, not even excepting his conventional frock coat. Nothing is known outside of the capital about the military cape. It is seen only here. According to tradition, it was made for the president when he was merely a lieutenant colonel of cavalry in the Spanish war. However, if this is true

A Napoleonic Garment.

No ordinary garment is the president's military cape, but an imposing, a formidable, an almost imperialistic piece of apparel. Designed on Napoleonic lines of architecture and constructed of impressive black cloth, its only touch of color is the royal purple lining, which flaps aside in the wind now and then with grand effect, giving to the whole an appearance of mingled royalty and democratic simplicity.

White House China.

Mrs. James A. Garfield, widow of the twentieth president of the United States, has given to the White House several pieces of china which were used by President and Mrs. Garfield long before they came to the White House. The gift consists of a large dessert bowl on a standard, a fruit compote and a dinner plate, each dish bearing a large letter G in old English script. The edging of each piece is of gold, with an inch wide mauve border, a scroll and leaf in gold and bronze A bunch of bright colored autumn leaves and berries decorates the center of the compote.
