Game Preserve For Each County. J. W. Wheeler, state game commissioner, hopes to interest the Illinois leg-Islature in his plans to establish a state game preserve in each county in Illinois. He thinks a group of landowners in each county could get together and agree to protect game birds upon their tracts, prohibit hunting thereon and

also feed the birds supplied by the game farm in Sangamon county. It is desired to secure a tract of not less than 1,200 acres in each county for these branch preserves. The plan, it is said, has been worked successfully in California after a thorough trial, and It is believed it will work just as well in Illinois. Such protection and such propagation will greatly assist the state game department in the efforts to restock the fields and forests of Illinois with quail, prairie chicken, pheasants and other species of game birds.


