Betting on elections, or anything else, is of course a foolish business, especially the way they do it here, that is without any sense of knowledge.

I call attention to the betting odds in Wall street only to illustrate the point I have in mindthe well-nigh inexplicable inability of the average New Yorkers to gain even a small glimer of the true values in the national game of politics. Every other sort of game he understands and plays a pretty good hand at, but in national politics he is a child, a foreigner, an outsider, a tenderfoot, a chump, a ube a Jay, a soft one, an easy mark, a lobster.

THE FRUIT CROP.

Some Ideas Worth Putting Into Practice Next Season
