"This will be true for the following reasons: Broom corn is as staple as cotton as a moneyed crop, broom corn can be raised in four or five months as compared to twelve to thirteen for cotton; broom corn is as certain a crop here as is any other crop and In Illinois they are raising it successfully on from two hundred to two hundred and fifty dollar land. You can be as certain of a crop here of broom corn as you can for kaffir or maize.

"The farmers here should combine in communities of one to three townships and buy a seeder and boiler, which will cost about \$450. oo for a first class rig without the power. This can be operated with a horse power or gasoline enine. When it takes only some four months to plant and harvest a crop of broom corn as compared to a year for cotton it is easily seen that farmer to plant.

In northwestern New Mexic, the deficiency was reported a short time ago as much as 9 inches since last August.

"It was hoped that our government might be interested to purchase the entire Pablo-Allard herd, and to establish a national range on the Flathead Indian Reservation in Montana where the herd had done so well for thirty years, The reservation was soon to be thrown open for settlement and Pablo, now well along in the sixties, despaired of being able to longer retain the immense herd.

"The Canadian Goverhment saw its opportunity to possess the herd that is responsible for more than half the buffalo alive to-day and quickly appropriated one hundred and fifty-seven thousand dollars for the purchase of all except ten cows and two bulls retained by Pablo, paying two hundred dollars a head for delivery on the range. 



How to Use the Stencil Brushes Suc cessfully.

Very artistic effects can be secured by stenciling a wall. It makes a break in the plain surface, and very harmopious contrasts and dainty colo schemes can be worked out by the use of stencils.

To use the stencil successfully start at one corner of the room, press the stencil firmly against the wall, have the material that you are going to stencil mixed up ready for use, dip the ends of your brush in this and simply rub it across the face of the stencil being careful not to get too much stuff on the brush so that it will run in back of the stencil and blur or blot, says Country Life In America. When you finish one section remove the stencil from the wall and carefully match it


for the next. An ordinary round paint brush is as good a stencil brush as any. The the bristles about halfway down, so that they will not spread, and in using just dip the tips of the bristles into the tinting material.

### How to Test Dress Goods.

Of the goods sold as "all wool" there is not one-tenth that is genuine. Gen erally the main component is cotton. The test for this is simple. All that is necessary is to pull out a few threads and apply a lighted match. Cotton will go off in a blaze; wool will shrivel up. To distinguish pure linen from counterfeit is even easier. The intended buyer need but wet her finger and apply it to the goods. If they are pure linen, the moisture will pass straight through. The spot touched will be soaked at once, and almost immediately one side will be as wet as the other. Frauds are more numerous in silk than in any other fabric, but here also the material of adulteration is cotton. Its presence can readily be discovered. Draw a few threads out. The pieces of cotton will snap off short when pulled, while the silk will stretch and permit a considerable pull before breaking.

FERNS FOR HOME USE.

How to Repot Them as Well as Rubber Plants. This is the time to repot ferns and rubber plants.

About two inches increase in the diameter of the pot is required. A compost can be secured from the

florist or made at home. A good garden soil mixed with barnyard or commercial fertilizer is all that

s needed Too little of the fertilizer is better than too much, which will burn the

roots Broken bits of crockery must be

placed over the hole in the bottom of the pot. Three inches of dirt is then placed

over this and leveled ready for the plant.

pot care should be taken that the leaves are not injured.

pot lightly, but firmly, with a trowel.

A sharp blow on the edge should cause the soil and root to come out together.

The mold is placed at once in the new pot and given a thorough wetting. The new compost is then put in

around it until the pot is filled. It must be remembered that the plant should always be placed an inch

should be kept away from the sun.







### How to Renovate Artificial Flowers.

Faded artificial flowers may be reno vated by the use of aniline inks, which slightly stiffen the petals as well as color them. The ink must be diluted with water and the flowers dipped in a many times as may be needed and dried a"er each dipping till the right shade is obtained. The ordinary red ink gives a pretty shrimp pink, excellent for renewing faded chrysanthe mums. They should be shaken occa sionally when drying to keep the petals soft and fluffy looking. Common purple ink may be used with good effect on violets that have become faded.

#### How to Freshen Leather Chairs.

Leather covered chairs and couches when dull and shabby looking may be greatly uproved in appearance by brushing the surface over with the white of an egg. Beat up the white until it is a stiff froth and then dip a piece of soft old linen into it and rub the leather thoroughly. Do not use too much force. Any leather articles ice. may be cleaned and freshened in this manner.

#### How to Remove Tree Stumps.

In the fall bore a hole in the center of the stump about eighteen inches deep and one and a half inches across Put in about two ounces of saltpeter and fill the hole with water. Plug up tight. In the spring take out plug, pour in eight ounces or so of petrole um, ignite, and the stump will smolder, but not blaze, to the extremities of the roots, leaving but ashes.

How to Make Eyebrow Tonic. If the eyebrows commence to fall out they will need a stimulating lotion. Make some strong sage tea, and to half a pint of the tea add one tablespoonful of alcohol. Apply this to the eyebrows with a soft brush once a day, taking care to follow the natural curve of the eyebrow. The sage tea will help also to darken them.


