Anson will extend through De- us declared war on Japan within cember 18, 19 and 20th this time.

Congress voted a formal declaration of war on Japan Monday after President Roosevelt requested immediate action following Japan's "unprovoked and dastardly attack" on Hawaii. Congress acted quickly following the report of three thousand killed and the loss of two war ships and millions of dollars in damage to property in Pearl Harbor.

The Senate vote was 82 to 0. The House voted 388 to 1. Miss Jeannette Rankin, republican congressman from Montana, voted no just as she did in 1917 when a member of congress from Oklahoma in the first World War.

The air fleet of Japan swarmed in about 8 a.m. Evidently prepared ahead with aerial maps, they readily selected the soldier barracks, hangars, dry dock and other vulnerable points which they bombed with deadly effect.

The Jap-German planes bombed Wake, Midway and Guam islands, and the British island of Hong-kong off the coast of China, striking at about the same time.

The text of the war resolution introduced by Senator Tom Connally follows:

"Declaring that a state of war exists between the imperial government of Japan and the government and the people of the United States and making provision to prosecute the same.

"Whereas, the imperial government of Japan has committed repeated acts of war against the government and the people of the United States of America;

"Therefore, be it resolved by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled.
