Campbell system of dry farming is water contributing to the loss, which aptly explained by the Cimarron is covered by insurance. The esting yet simple experiment:

Take an ordinary piece of loaf insured. sugar and pile as much loose grantop. When it reaches the loose su stopped and the top of the loose sheriff is investigating. sugar will remain dry. The loaf represents the hard ground. The rapidly upward is called capillary loose soil on the top of the ground, made by harrowing. The loose soil both stops the 'water ladder' and prevents the evaporation by contact with the open air. This is the Campbell system.

Reports from various parts of north Texas say fruit growers fear loss or heavy damage to crops because of the extremely warm weather the last few days. Berries of all kinds and peaches are in bloom and a cold wave is certain to come before spring, killing the buds. Denison, Weatherford, Paris and Gainesville dispatches say farmers expect a loss of fruit.

The court of civil appeals, at Dallas Saturday sustained the constitutionality of the new jury law under which the names of jurors are drawn from a wheel. The case was that of the Northern Texas Traction company vs. E. A. Dan forth, from Dallas county. The court of civil appeals, among other reasons for affirming the finding in the lower court, says the court of criminal appeals, in a case involving s similar issue, had decided in favor of the law, and the civil district court of appeals would be governed largely by that fact. The case may go to the supreme court.

The Waters Pierce Oil company has been refusing to pay the state ty. its taxes until it owes about \$60, 000, which will now be collected. Some pretty rich fees are to be paid out of the penalty money. The county attorney of Travis county entered into a contract with J. P. Gruet, Sr., to give him one-third of all fees collected. As a result of this litigation Gruet gets \$130,000 and County Attorney Brady gets \$260,000 and he has to divide with the special counsel who were engaged to assist in the prosecution, consequently the state will get a total of \$1,233,000 as its share of the fine. This money, when collected, is to be deposited to the credit of the general revenue fund in the state treasury. It is said it will result in greatly reducing the state ad valorem which can be done under the automatic tax law now in effect.

The American squadron, composed of the battleships Missouri, Ohio, Louisiana and Virginia left Smyrna for Negro bay on the northwest coast of Morocco, where the entire fleet will rendezvous before proceeding to Gibraltar.

turn which is the invention of a Danish electrician named Knudsen, dispenses altogether with the use of a substance electrically sensitive o light, such as silenium, which is commonly employed in such appa-

The picture to be transmitted is previously so prepared as to raise he dark portions above the level of the lighter parts, forming a low relief. In the case of a photographic plate, for instance, a metallic powder, which will adhere to the damp er opaque parts and not to the transparent places, may be dusted

In the sending instrument a style travels rapidly over the picture and closes an electric circuit whenever he parts in relief. The current thus caused to flow actuates the wave generator, and the wave ulti mately reaches the distant receiving apparatus, where it so acts as o press down a pencil, making a black mark. As this receiving pencil has a motion precisely corresponding to that of the style at the ransmitting end, a mark will be made at all places corresponding to he raised or dark portions of the original picture, which will, hence, e exactly reproduced. This apparatus may be adapted to any system of wireless telegraphy. It will send a picture 10x22 inches in size in 15 to 20 minutes. - Ex.

The second White House reception of the season took place Thursday night when the Supreme Court Justices were the honored guests. These receptions are all so much alike that were a person introduced into the East Room during one of them he would have no way of judging in whose honor it was given except by observing the guests who were given precedence. There is always a struggle though, for the invitations to the receptions in honor of the diplomats and of the judiciary for as these are the first two of the season they are most largely attended and one sees at them the greatest array of distinguished men and gorgeously arrayed women. However the president's strained relations with congress may affect politics they do not seem to affect in any way his social relations with its members and there are only a few of those with whom he has come into direct conflict or whom he has assigned to the Ananias Club that absent themselves from his receptions and they're never missed in the great throng that crowds the White House on these occassions. The list of guests invited Thursday would fill seven ordinary newspaline of carriages that had assembled three city blocks.

The additions which have been made to the White House since President Roosevelt has presided there have greatly improved the facility with which invited guests can enter its doors but it is an expression not soon to be forgotten when one for the first time, with a possible fancy that the President and Mrs. Roosevelt will be waiting just inside the door to receive him, finds himself in the great pushing crowd that is moving inch by inch through the corridor and up the stairs to the main floor of the executive mansion. 
