DENVER \& FORT WORTH RAIIWAY:

The prospect of the early comple tion of the Denver and Fort Worth Ry. through the Panhandle is very flattering. The woik of grading is being pushed this side of Decatur with all possible speed and track laying will begin Jansary 15th, and according to the Henrietta Shield will be aceomplished at the rate of a mile and a half a day until it reackes the Ca nadian river.
At this rate the roal will be run ang through Doiley county within cight wonths. The point on the Ca nadian riverat which this road will cross will in all probability be about ton miles west of the mouth of the Big Blue. This difference of tet miles from the preliminary line will not materially change the route through this immediate section.

PINK ETE.
Is the so-called Pink-Eye to be considered as only a fleating contagion, or does it indicate a kind of disease to which our horses are tu be, in one form or another, periodically subjected? The disease, is in fact only a form of the iunuenza, and in many particulars is somewhat similar to the epizo stic. This late malady prevailed
only a year ago-in a mild form, it is tuue, but it poraile true, but it prevailed nevertheless,
This second consecutive season of This second consecutive season of horse sickness may portend nothing in particular, or may mean that our sorseflesh is likely to be troubled by the recurrence of this plague at intervals right along. This is the third winter in ten years in whish'a horse epidemic has raged, though the intervals between the first and second vis i.ations was eight years. It has eaol time origmated in a different form and each time was a wholly unez pocted development. Yat there is a degree of similarity throughout which cannot butatiract the atiention of the close observer. Should the winter of $188 \%$ bring a recurrence of the p plague the outlook will becone alarming indeed. Veterinary science should give this matter the closest attention and study, and determine just what there is in it.-Pitstburg Stockuen.
We spent last Siturday in Fort Worth, and learned all that we could about the railroad. The gradeng is completed to Decatur, and a big force of men and teams is at work between Decatur and Qucen'sPeak. A force of track layers will be organized about the 15 th of January, and the track will be laid at the rate of a mile and a half a day, and the aim of the company is to keep the grading forces ahead so that the roadbed will be ready for the track layers to work
steadily along. In fact, the design is to lay a mile and a half of track every day after the force is set to work, until they reach the Canadian river, at which point they expect to meet the forces from Denver. From this it is plain to be seen that within the next ninety days wo will have the iron horse charging through our streets and astonishing the natives.-Henrietta Shield.
