be held on Wednesday, July 25th. at the same places as the Summer Normal Institutes. The Senators make the appointments of State Students from their respective districts.

In his show-window yesterday he had a real live baby, not a stuffed or wax one, strapped into a machine. On and after July 3, 1883, a single domestic money order may be issued for any amount from one cent to one hundred dollars, and the fees to be charged as follows:

For orders not exceeding \$10, 8 cents.

For more than \$10 or less than \$15, 10 cents.

For more than \$15 or less than \$30 16 cents.

For more than \$30 or less than \$40, 20 cents.

For more than \$40 or less than \$50, 25 cents.

For more than \$50 or less than \$60, 30 cents.

For more than \$60 or less than \$70, 35 cents.

For more than \$70 or less than \$80, 40 cents.

For more than \$80 or less than \$100, 45 cents.

Not more than three orders can be sent in one day from the same remitter to the same payee, payable at the same postoffice.

The Panama Ship Railway. The New Orleans Time Democrat says of the Panama ship railway:

"The proposed route of this great enterprise over the isthmus is, in round numbers, about 150 miles long and leads in a direction nearly north and south, or from the Pacific side north to the Gulf coast. As there are two rivers flowing along the line, Mr. Eads will utilize them for some fifty miles; thus the actual length for the proposed ship railway will not be more than 100 miles. On the Pacific side the water is sufficiently deep to admit the approach of vessels of any draught, while on the Gulf coast a fine port may be easily constructed with but little expense to the company.

Remarkable Relics found in New Mexico. The statues of two mountain lions, carved from a volcanic rock, in situ, form the cap of the summit of the great mountain, Potrero de Las Vacas. The images are inclosed in a rude and almost circular stone wall, in a space fifty feet in circumference, three feet in height, with an entrance projecting 18 feet toward the southeast, three feet wide. The lions are each six feet in length, and represent a puma, or mountain lion, in the act of crouching for a spring. The heads of these statues are almost wholly destroyed, showing plainly the marks of the pious hammer that sought their overthrow. The legs, bodies, and tails of the animals are better preserved, and constitute the remains of the most remarkable stone images set

The Grand Jury System.

The News took occasion, one year ago, to say a few things in regard to the Grand Jury System in the administration of justice.

There is no plea that can be introduced that will justify the Grand Jury System, in a government like ours.

Twelve men are selected, perhaps by an interested or influenced officer. They are brought together in the jury room and sworn to the strictest secrecy as to all that shall be said or done there.

The inditement is published in the newspapers. He suffers from the reproach from one term of court to another, and finally has to hire a lawyer, transport witnesses and attend court, at great expense, only at last to show that he was entirely innocent, and the whole matter one of malice.

The same enemy can institute proceedings with the next Grand Jury and so, an innocent man can be worried to desperation and driven from the country and his business ruined.

The Grand Jury System encourages cowardice. In many states the Grand Jury System is done away with, and if a citizen knows any crime committed by another, he can swear out a warrant, and the District Attorney is bound to prosecute.

In the trial of a case under an inditement, witnesses receive no compensation from the county.

In a country such as the Panhandle of Texas, nothing could be more unjust, oppressive or dangerous to the rights of individual citizens.

Any one, with a grain of sense can see that, where large monopolies prevail the dangers of the system are immensely augmented. The reasons we need not detail.

The State of Texas should hasten to wipe out this blotch, this reproach from her judicial system.

John Edmondson, who came to town, sick with fever, May 15, 1883, died on the morning of Friday, June 29, at one o'clock. The disease of which he died, typhoid fever expended itself about ten days before his death, and he was in a fair way to recover. Mr. Koogle, for whom the deceased had worked for some time prior to his death, was present and attended to all the detail of arrangements for the funeral.

Very little could be learned of the history of the deceased, beyond the fact that, he was born in Georgia, and had lived in Tennessee. He was supposed to be about thirty years of age.

He seemed slightly averse to answering questions about himself, and was very quiet and patient all through his sickness.

He seemed to enjoy the confidence and respect of all who knew him.

Mr. Koogle will communicate to his friends the intelligence of his death.

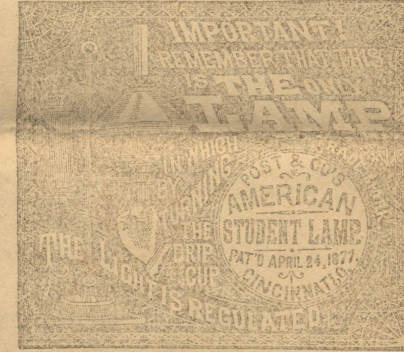

Stock Notes.



It requires no very prophetic eye to see that in the not very distant future ordinary stock cars will be used very little for the shipment of beefs. The meat will go dressed in refrigerated cars.—[Live Stock Journal.]

—Abilene Reporter: Number of California sheep men are en route to Texas with their flocks because of the superior lands and grasses for grazing. Texas has millions of acres for sheep, millions for cattle and millions for agricultural purposes, and the mountains left for the mineral prospector.

—The profits on cattle raising in this state have averaged 100 per cent, in the past five years, while in some cases they have reached 500 per cent. The profits for the first year are nominal, the second year it averages 10 per cent, the third year 30 per cent, the fourth year 50 per cent, and the fifth year 70 per cent. The average loss by disease and casualty during the same period has been 15 per cent, or 3 per cent annually. The extension of the railroad system of Texas is expected to increase the profits of the business, as it does away with the great risks involved in long drives.—[Exchange.]

One of the largest ranches in the Pan-Handle has paid 68 per cent a year, and we know a smaller concern that has paid one hundred per cent a year from the first year of the investment.—[Ed.]

Mr. Charles Goodnight on the head waters of the Red river in this state has a stock ranch of 700,000 acres, which is about 20,000 acres larger than the entire state of Rhode Island.—[Fort Worth Gazette.]

Phosphorescence in Animals.

According to Radziszewsky, the luminous animals like Pelagia noctiluca, Berce ovatus, etc., owe this fact to a peculiar fat that they contain.

These little animals do not give light when at rest, but when stimulated give a quick flash of monochromatic light resembling lightning. The author separated some of the fat and found it was a thick, pale yellow, neutral liquid, easily saponified by alkali. It gave a flash of light when shaken with caustic potash. The animals themselves have an alkaline reaction.

Land and Cattle.

The business of stock raising has an advantage which cannot be found in any other business requiring a large amount of capital, inasmuch as while one class of stock is maturing to be turned into cash, the other is compounding and increasing the capital. This is the reason that until lands become valuable and population becomes dense enough to limit the field of operation, that the stock business must be and cannot help being prosperous, and even in the most densely populated countries, stock raising is in the front rank of the remunerative occupations of life. In mercantile business immediate profits must be large to compensate for dead stock accumulating in spite of the best judgement in buying, and forced sales by reduction in prices, and another disadvantage is found as compared with stock raising in the increased working expenditure with every outlay of capital, which is not nearly so large in the favorite occupation of the west.

The chances of fluctuation in values are against the merchant and in favor of the stockraiser. The goods on the shelves of the former must deteriorate, while in the pasture there is nothing of this nature. The worst that can be felt by the stockman is a temporary reduction in the price of meat, which is more than compensated for in his being a purely cash business on a ready market.—[Texas Live Stock Journal.]

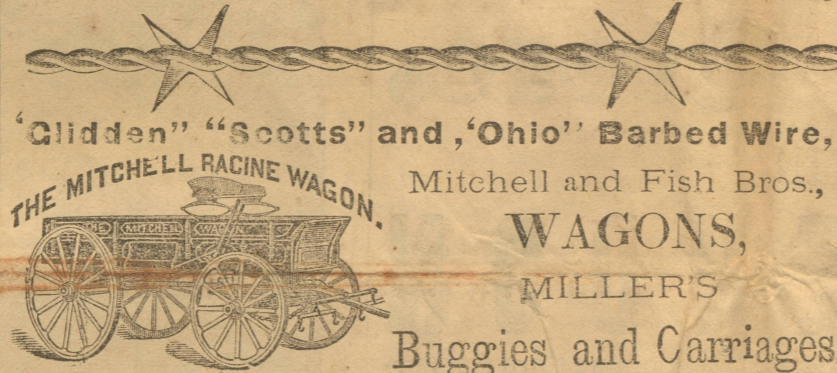

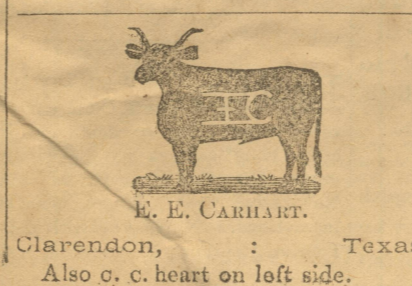
