Texas Gardening.

The following statements in regard to shipping vegetables and the profits on their culture are taken from the address of Mr. Tone, made before the North Texas Horticultural Society, at their exhibition just held at Denison:

We simply say to ourselves an I to each other that we have here in Grayson county, of North Texas, an element of wealth in a horticultural way, which, if developed, will make ourselves and our children independent, and at the same time cause our country to be known as the garden spot of the State. We have gone to work on that idea. We have advertised by issuing circulars in the shape of choice fruit, which we scatter broadcast over ten States of the Union. We have a special issue for nearly every variety of fruit and vegetables that grows, and our list for the present year thus far has embraced in their order, radishes, onions, strawberries, lettuce, beets, peas, beans, cucumbers, potatoes, green corn, cabbages, peaches, apples, plums, blackberries, apricots and grapes. What it will yet include before the season is over is beyond conjecture, for the yield, the demand and the returns have been a surprise to everybody, including the shippers themselves.

The present year is an extraordinary one. Mother earth has yielded bountifully of every crop, and the trees have bent and broken beneath their load of luscious fruit. It has been such a season as was never known before.

And what is still more to our interest, prices have remained remarkably high considering the yield; and returns to those who have carefully gathered and marketed have been astonishing and wonderful.

Two years ago no member of the society would have believed that \$250 per acre could be realized from so insignificant an article as wax beans, and yet it has been done by half a dozen of our members. To have told us then that \$500 could be realized from an acre of cabbage would have subjected one to a charge of lunacy, and yet that figure has been reached and surpassed the present year.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas.

To be Submitted to a Vote of the People on the Second Tuesday in August A. D. 1883.

JOINT RESOLUTION

Amending sections 4 and 6, of article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That sections 4 and 6 Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 4. The lands herein set apart to the Public Free School fund, shall be sold under such regulations, at such times, and on such terms as may be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall not have power to grant any relief to purchasers thereof. The Comptroller shall invest the proceeds of such sales, and of those heretofore made, as may be directed by the Board of Education herein provided for, in the bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties in said State, or in such other securities, and under such restrictions as may be prescribed by law; and the State shall be responsible for all investments.

SEC. 6. All lands heretofore, or hereafter granted to the several counties of this State for educational purposes, are of right the property of said counties respectively, to which they were granted and title thereto is vested in said counties, and no adverse possession or limitation shall ever be available against the title of any county. Each county may sell or dispose of its lands in whole or in part, in manner to be provided by the commissioners' court of the county. Actual settlers residing on said lands, shall be protected in the prior right of purchasing the same to the extent of their settlement, not to exceed one hundred and sixty acres, at the price fixed by said court, which price shall not include the value of existing improvements made thereon by such settlers. Said lands, and the proceeds thereof, when sold, shall be held by said counties alone as a trust for the benefit of public schools therein; said proceeds to be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties in said State, or in such other securities, and under such restrictions as may be prescribed by law; and the counties shall be responsible for all investments; the interest thereon, and other revenue, except the principal shall be available fund.

SEC. 2. That the Governor of this State shall issue his proclamation ordering an election to be held on the second Tuesday in August A. D. 1883, at which time the foregoing amendments shall be submitted for adoption, to the qualified electors of this State.

SEC. 3. That those voting for the adoption of said amendment to Section 4, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 4, Article 7 of the Constitution;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment to Section 4, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 4, Article 7 of the Constitution," and those voting for the adoption of said amendment to Section 6, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 6, Article 7, of the Constitution;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment to Section 6, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 6, Article 7, of the Constitution."

Passed March 21, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

JOINT RESOLUTION TO AMEND SECTION 9, ARTICLE 8, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas, That Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

ARTICLE 8.

SECTION 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not to exceed fifteen cents, for roads and bridges, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of this amendment, and for the erection of public buildings, street, sewer and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the hundred dollars valuation in this Constitution otherwise provided.

SEC. 2. That the Governor of this State be, and he is hereby required to submit the foregoing resolutions to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the second Tuesday in August, 1883.

SEC. 3. That those voting for the amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution;" and those voting against the adoption of Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution."

Passed March 23, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

JOINT RESOLUTION TO AMEND SECTION 3 OF ARTICLE 7, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be

so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 3. One-fourth of the "revenue derived from State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of one dollar on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and, in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed twenty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, as, with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year; and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all or any of the counties of this State, by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and may authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such school districts for the further maintenance of public free schools and the erection of school buildings therein; provided, that two-thirds of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year twenty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

SEC. 2. That the Governor of this State shall issue his proclamation ordering an election to be held on the second Tuesday in August A. D. 1883 at which time the foregoing amendment shall be submitted for adoption by the qualified electors of this State.

SEC. 3. That those voting for the adoption of the amendment to Section 3, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution, school tax;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to Section 3, Article 7 of the Constitution, school tax."

Passed April 6th, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 5 OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION DIMINISHING THE NUMBER OF TERMS OF COUNTY COURTS.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State shall be amended by adding thereto another section which shall read as follows:

SECTION 29. The county court shall hold at least four terms for both civil and criminal business annually as may be provided by the Legislature, or by the commissioners' court of the county under authority of law and such other terms each year as may be fixed by the commissioner's court provided the commissioner's court of any county having fixed the time and number of terms of the county court shall not change the same again until the expiration of one year. Said court shall dispose of probate business either in term time or vacation under such regulation as may be prescribed by law. Prosecutions may be commenced in said courts in such manner as is or may be provided by law, and a jury therein shall consist of six men. Until otherwise provided the terms of the county court shall be held on the first Mondays in February, May, August and November and may remain in session three weeks. SEC. 2 This amendment shall be submitted on the 2nd Tuesday in August A. D. 1883.

Passed April 11, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

Baines, Secretary of the State of Texas, do hereby certify that the foregoing are true copies of the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas, passed by the Eighteenth Legislature and published by the direction of the Governor, in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State.

It is the almost universal testimony of returned missionaries, and travelers in heathen countries that the children are remarkably polite, whilst every one knows that nothing can exceed the impudence of the average American child.

The heathen is full of salams whilst the average business man or American official will curse in conversation and profane the name of God on the slightest provocation. Many Americans will curse in the presence of ladies.

Christian America boasts of her benevolent institutions and of her humane enterprises, but the following from the Fort Worth Daily Gazette of June 11 carries us back to the days when Torquato Tasso languished in jail for no crime save that of insanity.

"A proper place should be provided for poor creatures devoid of reason. Hayes and Glass have been adjudged insane more than four months, and yet they linger in the county jail Sheriff Maddox feels this more keenly than anyone else, and yet, he is no more to blame than any other citizen of Texas. He handles the unfortunates who are placed in his care with as much kindness as the nature of his position will admit of."

In the same paper, under date of June 6, we have an account of one Milburn, who, adjudged insane, was confined in the jail at Galveston, where he hung himself in his cell, with a pocket handkerchief.

In this free? Christian? Country, the terrible misfortune of insanity is adjudged a crime and the insane are looked up in the common jail.

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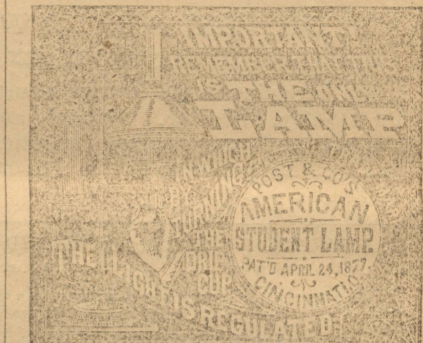

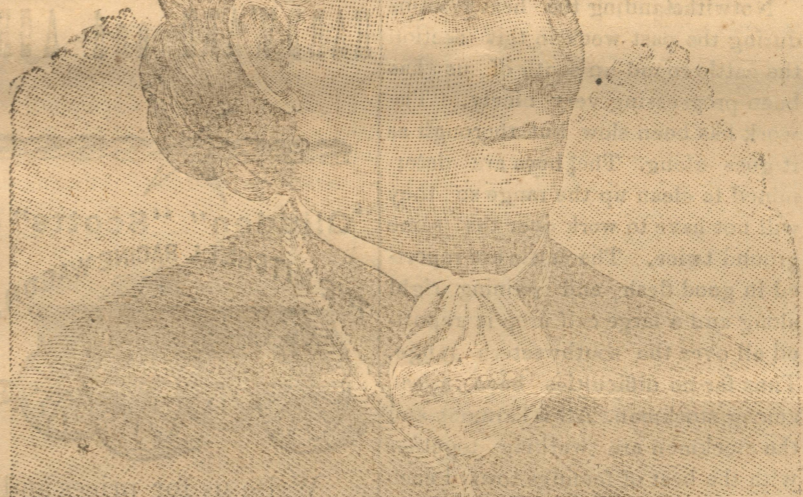

From the Range South of Dodge.

Notwithstanding the heavy rains during the past week in this section the cattle round-up south of us has been progressing very nicely. The work has been slow but thorough as it goes along. The boys are determined to clean up the range so they will not have to work over the same ground twice. The cattle are reported in good flesh and gaining right along and a large calf crop is reported all over the southwestern range. Thus far no difficulties have arisen among stockmen. All is harmony and the stockmen are working together with the best of feelings toward each other.—[Ford county (Kan) Globe.

A New Shipping Point.

Redfork, at the terminus of the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad, is now claiming attention as a favorable point from which to ship cattle. It is situated just south of the Arkansas river, in an open country, where the grass and water are everything that could be wished. The country is open and unobstructed by fences, which fact renders it easy of access by drovers. The railroad company has just built very extensive and convenient stock pens here and have had built four hundred stock cars 34 feet in length. The run from here to St. Louis will be made in from 20 to 24 hours and without the trouble of unloading at any point on the route. We understand that the rate will be \$35 per car to St. Louis, and that the company will use extra-ordinary care and precaution in handling of stock as they expect to ship most of the cattle coming from the Territory, the Panhandle and a great portion of the more southern counties of Texas. The open country from various stock raising regions to this point, the various accommodations arranged by the railroad company for shippers and for making rapid and safe transits, the good grass and water on which to hold cattle awaiting shipment and the reasonable rates made by the company all entitle this new candidate for shippers favors to consideration. The arrangements have been completed and cattle will be received at once.—[Live Stock Journal.

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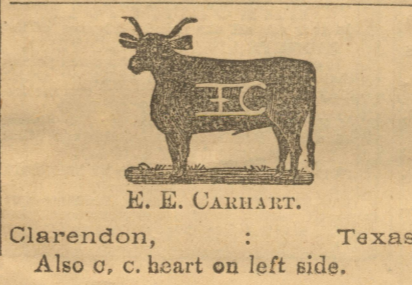
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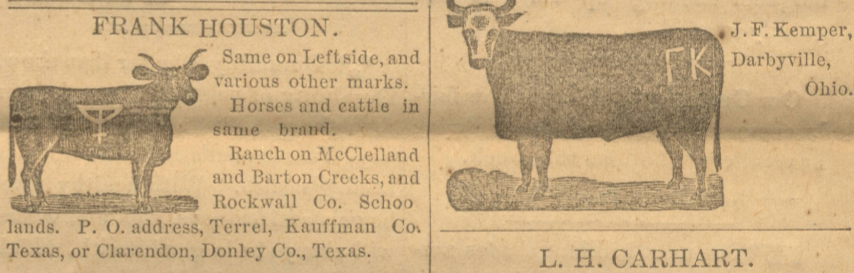
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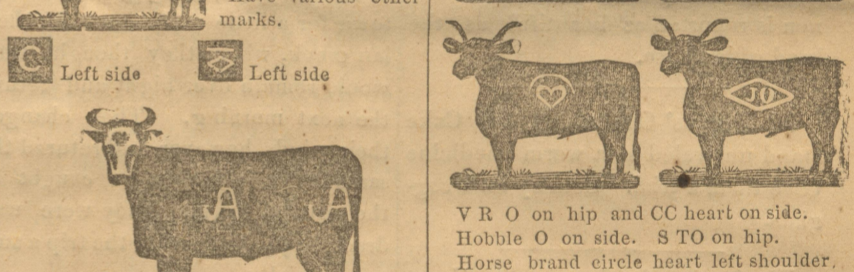
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
