Home Economics

The Home Economics students were honored on February 4, 1942 with the presence of Misses Eudora Hawkins and Virginia Blair, representatives of the West Texas Utilities Company in the Home Service Department. They furnished, cooked, and served food as a demonstration of the new Hot Point Electric Range in the Home Economics Department.

In addition to the actual cook ing, they gave facts and reasons why cooking electrically is an advantage. They also stressed the importance of retaining food value. They completed this idea by using less water in cooking the food; thus, not having so much to pour out. Three meals were cooked during the demonstration; namely, an oven meal, a thrift cooker meal, and a regular meal. The oven meal consisted of roast, green beans, squash, baked potatoes, apple pie. The thrift cooker meal was small, but well balanced. It was prepared to show that odors of different foods, even though in the same vessel will not be absorbed. It consisted of English peas, salmon molds, and upside down cake. The regular meal, and the largest one, consisted of: meat balls and spaghetti, rice, hard boiled eggs, hot biscuits, chocolate cake.




