Lincoln, Roosevelt Bring Spirit Of Christmas to White House

The White House has seen all kinds of Christmases during the 140 years that it has domiciled the President of the United States. There have been rowdy, fun-loving Christmases during the Teddy Roosevelt administration, and there have been long stretches when Santa Claus wasn't quite sure whether to stop at 1600 Pennsylvania avenue

John and Abigail Adams, the first tenants of the "President's Palace" brought no children to it, and Mrs. Adams felt that New England was a much better place for the seat of the government.

There have been many other childless Christmases in the White House, such as the dull period between the Tylers and the Lincolns. But probably the two families which will go down in Santa Claus' memory for a really riotous holiday season are the Theodore Roosevelts, when Kermit, Archie and Quentin put a pony in the elevator and introduced the first electrically lighted Christmas tree; and the current clan of Roosevelts, who from Franklin Delano the First to Franklin Delano the Third have invoked the spirit of Christmas with equal abandon.

At Christmastide the population is less than a thousand souls and most of them are natives whose hardy ancestors built their log cabins along Bethlehem streets where the palatial hotels now stand.

For men in the army and navy the Christmas holidays are gala days. Army furlough privileges permit many men to visit their homes while active field training is suspended. Railroads last year cut their rates drastically for the men in uniforms, and it is expected the same will hold true this Christmas season.

For those who remain in the camps special Christmas dinners, religious services and holiday festivities will be arranged. The same arrangement will be made for men in the fleet, few of whom will be able to spend the holidays at home.

Christmas Observance



Chef Describes How to Carve **Turkey Properly**

Fine roast turkey reigns supreme over the American Christmas table. But no matter how large or small it may be, the obstacle of carving the bird must first be overcome before it can be enjoyed.

Since carving is almost an art in itself, a few expert suggestions are made by Maurice Gonneau, chef at a downtown hotel in New York.

Before starting to cut the turkey, sharpen the carving knife with the steel. The correct way to sharpen

the knife is to hold the steel securely in the left hand, passing the far side of the blade against the

far side of the steel with a quick stroke toward the left hand. When the knife is sharpened, remove the second joints by putting fork between second joint and drum-

stick. Insert knife between carcass and second joint and cut, then with the fork pull the joint free from the carcass. If turkey is properly cooked this will be easy. Next remove the wings by cutting very carefully, inserting knife toward the joints and pull out as with the second joint. Take care not to cut into the breast.

With the breast of the turkey facing you, slice the white meat with a downward stroke and away from the bone. Next cut the drumstick free from the second joint and slice the latter. Then cut the tail with lower back meat and cut out the "oyster" which is a small amount of dark meat on the back which is always in demand because of its delicate flavor.

Serve the meat with the stuffing, giblet gravy and cranberry sauce. Spoon out the stuffing which is placed first on the plate. Cover with one piece of dark and one piece of light meat, unless there are special preferences, and cover with giblet gravy. Place helping of cranberry sauce on the side.

Lighted candles hold no fears for the young lady trimming her Christmas tree, for it has been sprayed with a non-inflammable wash.

Christmas trees are still a hazard. Electric lights may have short circuits; and some folks are careless with cigarettes and matches.

To fireproof the tree, first get it from four to six days before you intend to decorate it. Then weigh Artificial Wreaths, Spruce Roping the tree and buy one-fourth as many and seasonable cut flowers. pounds of ammonium sulfate as the tree weighs. This chemical is available in most stores that sell seeds and fertilizers.

For each pound of ammonium sulfate use 11/2 pints of water to make the fireproofing solution. Mix the solution in something tall and narrow that will hold the tree upright. Then saw off the end of the tree diagonally so as to give a large cut surface. Set the tree in the solution in a cool place, away from the direct sunlight, and leave it there until most of the solution is absorbed. The foliage will stay green if the temperature of the room is from 55 to 65 degrees Fahrenheit.







Celebrations Mark Christmas in China

In China the Christmas festival among Christians is known as Sheng Dan Jieh, the Holy Birth festival. This celebration has gradually penetrated inland.

Various paper decorations and evergreens adorn the churches and homes. Paper chains are made of green, red, yellow and blue and are suspended in interlocking festoons from the ceiling. On the white walls, large posters are hung. On them are elaborate characters meaning

peace and joy. No candles are used, but the trees are decorated with paper flowers, colored paper chains and cotton

There is usually an early service. The church is kept dark except for lanterns carried by the worshipers. Carolers wend their way along the road before dawn, singing the Chinese words to such melodies as 'Hark, the Herald Angels Sing." The service consists of reading the Christmas message from the Bible, music, dramatization of the manger scene, and an offering for the poor.

Gifts are distributed to the children. The packages contain such things as tangerines, peanuts, pretty picture cards (sometimes used cards sent from America), candy and western lead pencils.

> These candles are more brittle and less greasy than those made from tallow. They are translucent green, and when the flame is extinguished, the resulting odor is as sweet and pungent as incense.

Cover the berries with water and boil for an hour. The oil comes to the top but it is often soiled with leaves and small twigs, so it should be strained through a cloth. When this wax becomes cold, it will form a cake at the top of the water. It should be heated again, preparatory to molding the candles. If you have You also can shoot darts with candle molds you will, of course, use them, if not, you may fasten planes, or, if you're the kind that several wicks to a piece of wood, which can be dipped into the hot wax, using a tall container of small diameter. Each coat should chill and become hard before dipping again, and the dipping should continue until the desired diameter is obtained.

3,500 Tone of Steel In Tacome Narrows Bridge to Be "rescued" for Defense

Approximately 3,500 tons of scrap steel, originally scheduled to be thrown into Puget Sound, will be salvaged and eventually routed into the Nation's defense program, OPM announced.

The "rescue" of the steel, which became scrap as a result of the Tacoma Narrows Bridge collapse in November 1940, was accompanied through the joint efforts of several branches of OPM cooperating with the State of Washington Toll Bridge Authority.

Carlton S. Proctor, chairman of the committee on steel conservation and reclamation of the Engineers' Defense Board, on November 13 notified OPM officials of a decision to drop the damaged bridge structure and cables into Puget Sound. The decision had been reached, it was said at that time, because the cost of reclamation exceeded the immediate scrap value of the metal. Enough for 100 tanks.

The scrap iron and steel division of OPM, which had earlier been in communication with the Washington Toll Bridge Authority, immediately telegraphed municipal authorities at Tacoma, and were notified that the disposition of the bridge scrap was the entire responsibility of the Bridge Au-

"An insurance settlement has been made on the bridge. . . The Washington Toll Bridge Authority will offer for sale all scrap metal which can be made available.

It has been estimated that the 3,500 tons of steel scrap, when it is reclaimed, with an equivalent amount of pig iron, could be used in the production of 100 light or medium tanks, 200 four-ton trucks ,or 600 sixteen inch navy

Crayon, Lipstick Add Gay Colors To Yule Candles

Christmas candles for gifts or table decorations can be made at home from bits of discarded candles, and the whole family may have fun doing it.

There is no limit to the shape and size of mold to be used. Cardboard boxes such as salt packages or ice cream cartons are very satisfactory. The cartons in which buttermilk is sometimes sold are good for the tapered candles. Good results have even been reported with fancy gelatin molds of certain types and with jelly glasses.

The wick may be fastened through hole in the bottom of the cardboard containers, but in smooth-bot-



tomed molds, it must be kept in place by pouring in a little wax at a time around it, and then allowing it to harden.

Arrange two small sticks at right angles at the top of the mold and tie the wick in the center so that it will be held securely in place during the whole process.

Common string, the wick from an old candle, or commercial candle wicking sold at variety stores or in needlework departments may all be used for the homemade candles.

All wax to be used in a single candle should be melted in the same container, as it is difficult to match colors. Wax crayons are good coloring matter, and some women have used lipstick with success. As the wax cools in the mold, a hole will be formed down the center. Enough wax of the same color should be saved to fill this hole.

Lacking enough old candles to make the large ones now so popular, tallow candles can be made from these proportions: 10 ounces of tallow, ½ ounce of camphor, 4 ounces of beeswax and 2 ounces of alum. Melted paraffin, which is sometimes used, is hard to dye and breaks easily.

To make dipped candles, one end of the wick is fastened to a stick or pencil, and the wick dipped into the melted wax for a short time. As many candles as can be fully im-mersed at each dipping may be made at one time. If the surrounding air is cool, it is not necessary to dip the candles in cold water.

For a clear bright red candle, it is best not to use such dark colors as blue and green candles in the melting down process. However, very often the layer of color is just on the outside, and it can be scraped off and the rest of the candle used.
