Of Interest to Teachers. A law passed by the recent legislature which takes effect June 10,1911 , is a complete revision of the certificate laws of Texas. Teacher's certificates are second grade, tirst grade, permanent primary, and permanent. Agriculture is added to the list of subjects in which teachers are required to be examined and school law is omitted. County second grade certificates may be issued one time to the same applicant; city certificates continue as under the present law. The holder of a certificate may build to one of higher grade by taking an examination in one or more of the additional branches at any one examina. tion. Second grade and first grade certificates are valid for four or six years and always expire with the scholastic year. Under certain restrictions, life certificate from other states may be recognized. A second grade or a permanent primary certificates entitles the holder to teach in any public school of issued to persens under 16 years of age. The regulations for the issuance ot certificates are con. siderably simplified and are more uniform than they have been under existing laws.

All retuse which tends in any way to ermentation, such as bedrag, slaw, dispored of or covered with lime or kitl ene oil.
"Screen all "ood whether
the house or exposed for sale. "Keep all receptacles for garbage carefully covered and the the cans cleane
with oil or lime.
"Keep all stable manure i vault or pit,... screened sprinkled with lime, oil or or cheap preparations, such os are sold by a number of reliable manufacturers.
"See that your sewerage is in good order; that it does not leak, is up-to-date and not exposed to flies.

Put kerosene into the drains. "Sury or surn all table refuse. especially in the kitchen especially in
dining room.
'If you see flies, you may be sure that their breeding place is in nearby filth. It may be behind the door, under the table or in the cuspidor.
"If there is no dirt and filth there will be no flies
"If there is a nuisance in the neighbornood write at once to the bealth department.
