Of Interest to Teachers.

A law passed by the recent legislature which takes effect June 10, 1911, is a complete revision of the certificate laws of Texas. Teacher's certificates are second grade, first grade, permanent primary, and permanent. Agriculture is added to the list of subjects in which teachers are required to be examined and school law is omitted. County second grade certificates may be issued one time to the same applicant; city certificates continue as under the present law. The holder of a certificate may build to one of higher grade by taking an examination in one or more of the additional branches at any one examination. Second grade and first grade certificates are valid for four or six years and always expire with the scholastic year. Under certain restrictions, life certificate from other states may be recognized. A second grade or a permanent primary certificate entitles the holder to teach in any public school of Texas. Certificates can not be issued to persons under 18 years of age. The regulations for the issuance of certificates are considerably simplified and are more uniform than they have been under existing laws.

War on the Fly.

The following rules for dealing with the fly nuisance have been issued by the Merchant's Association of New York City:

"Keep the flies away from the sick, especially those ill with contagious diseases. Kill every fly that strays into the sick room. His body is covered with disease germs.

"Do not allow decaying material of any sort to accumulate on or near your premises.

"All refuse which tends in any way to fermentation, such as bedding, straw, paper, waste and vegetable matter, should be disposed of or covered with lime or kerosene oil.

"Screen all food whether in the house or exposed for sale.

"Keep all receptacles for garbage carefully covered and the cans cleaned or sprinkled with oil or lime.

"Keep all stable manure in vault or pit, screened or sprinkled with lime, oil or other cheap preparations, such as are sold by a number of reliable manufacturers.

"See that your sewerage is in good order; that it does not leak, is up-to-date and not exposed to flies.

"Put kerosene into the drains.

"Bury or burn all table refuse.

"Screen all windows and doors especially in the kitchen and dining room.

"If you see flies, you may be sure that their breeding place is in nearby filth. It may be behind the door, under the table or in the cuspidor.

"If there is no dirt and filth there will be no flies.

"If there is a nuisance in the neighborhood write at once to the health department."

Don't Do It.

We have been dubbed the "tree crank" and we rather like the appellation. We admit our love for trees. Our efforts in helping to secure the trees that now stand along our business and resident streets we count as the most important of our very few achievements.

It is just as important to protect these trees as it was to have planted them. There is now a very prevalent practice among our people to hitch horses to these trees and as a consequence many of these trees have been barked almost to the point of killing some of them.

We do know that a few years ago that there was an ordinance against hitching horses to any of the trees. We do not know whether the new ordinances contain such provisions or not, but if it does not it should and if it does it should be enforced speedily. We also know that under the new ordinances provided a fine for the practice of hitching teams on certain streets and for awhile it was practiced but now it seems a "dead letter" and the trees at these prohibited places seem to be worse damaged than others.

Ignorance of the law excuses no one. These ordinances as well as all others should be enforced and we call upon our city council to instruct the city marshal to enforce the city ordinances.

Whatever else you may do or not do, please do not hitch horses to the shade trees on our streets.

M.

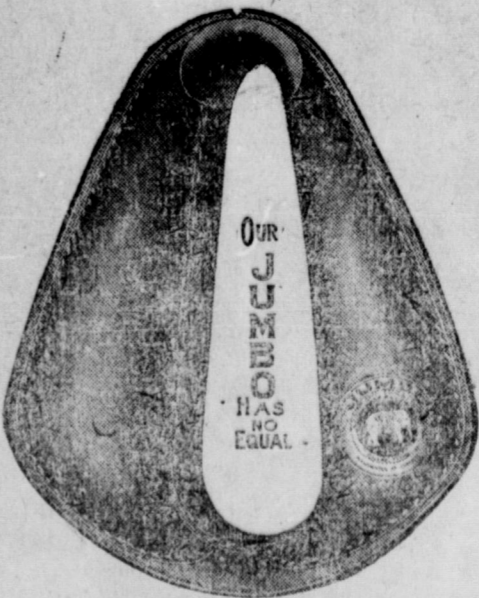

Crime Record in Amarillo.

Under this head last week we gave a clipping from an Amarillo paper showing about 170 indictments returned by the Grand Jury of which about one-fifth were felonies. A great many Clarendon people have commented on this to us.

Personally we are not very sentimental and in no sense do we ever care to comment about the affairs of our neighboring towns or neighbor home people, trying at all times to be tolerant.

Following this published crime record we noticed in an Amarillo paper that the officers in their dragnet operations in rounding up law violators imprisoned two girls from the walks of shame, who were but school girls of age, one the daughter of a poor but highly respectable widowed mother, who lived in the city. The details were but the repetition of the oft repeated story of man's deception. As we are not sentimental we will not go into words concerning these matters, though the subject is one that would and really does call for it; yet we make two observations. As to the two girls christian men and women secure their release from a hundred days imprisonment and our next observation is that wherever immorality and crime as court records show. We say to the people of Texas, what would you do with the saloons, the breeder and disseminators of nearly all crime?
