With three seats available in the City of Hedley, Jim Lollar and incumbent Bruce Howard have filed for the board of aldermen.


In Howardwick, Billy F. Woods has filed to run for mayor. Mike Rowland and Dewey Linley are running for the board of alderman

Don't worry, be happy; 2038 will never get here

We can all rest easy now due to a great report from our nation's capitol. It seems Social Security and Medicare are doing just fine and dandy and will be solvent even longer than we thought.

Yep, the SS won't run out of cash until 2038, a whole year longer than previously expected.

I'm reminded of an old Jerry Seinfeld routine in which he lampooned car dealer and department store advertisements that promise the buyer he won't have to pay anything until next June.

"June," the comedian said. "That'll never get here!" Much like consumers who overextend themselves with the promise of delayed payments, this nation is cruising for trouble when it comes to Social Security. Our leaders think 2038 will never get here. Besides, if it does get here, a lot of folks will be dead by then, and it will be someone else's problem. Therefore we just shouldn't worry about it.

Well, frankly I am worried. I plan to be alive and working in 2038. I don't presume that I'll be getting any benefits from SS, but I think I'm safe in the assumption that I will darn sure be paying through the nose as the baby boomers become the retirees of tomorrow.

The Medicare system will face a dose of reality prior to all this. It's going to run out of cash in 2029. The new estimate is six years further down the road than was previously thought. Democrats love the latest forecast.

"This shows that there is no need to condition passage of a prescription drug benefit this year on passage of radical changes to the underlying Medicare program," Sen. Ted Kennedy said, according to a Reuters story.

Does that make any sense at all? The program is going to become bankrupt, but because we've got six more years, Sen. Kennedy thinks the system can handle paying for everyone's drugs.

This is insanity. It's worse than rearranging chairs on the deck of the Titanic. It's more like boarding more passengers on the Hindenberg after the fire has already started and giving each one an extra bottle of hydrogen.

I haven't read anywhere how Kennedy and his accomplices propose to pay for this giveaway. But then, he's not going to be around when the bill comes due so what does he care?

It cannot be denied that Social Security and Medicare have benefited the people who receive those services. In fact, some people depend on SS for their very existence. But it also cannot be denied that both systems are fundamentally flawed and that neither can be maintained over the long term as they currently exist.

To avoid the pending disaster, our leaders must have the courage to make radical changes. This will be difficult. For starters the Democrats will steadfastly resist anything that might alter their sacred cows. Secondly, current beneficiaries and those near retirement would balk at any decrease in payouts. And third, employers and employees will revolt (and rightly so) against any attempt to raise the payroll tax.

The solution, I believe, is a phase out of these socialist programs. It is time we consider weaning the American people off the federal dole.

Those getting SS payments now and people who are near retirement would continue to get their checks. Those in the middle would have an option to stay in the system. These benefits would be paid for by the sale and/or development of government lands in the Western United States. (I think the feds own about 80 percent of Nevada now. Let's put the place up for auction.) Younger workers, under my proposal, would be freed from the shackles created nearly 70 years ago and be told to fend for themselves and plan their own retirements.

Medicare could be phased out in a similar manner. I believe the only way health care and prescription costs are going to go down in this country is through the reintroduction of true market forces to those industries. (Lawsuit reform would help also.)

In doing this, America would honor the promises made to older generations and restore the birthright of freedom and personal responsibility to today's young Americans and to posterity.

Will this happen? Of course not. No one in Washington today has the guts to even propose it. After all, 2038 will never get here. Right?

Instead of doing something important, our lawmakers are busy defiling the United States Constitution. Once again they have introduced a Constitutional amendment to give Congress the authority to curtail freedom of speech by prohibiting desecration of the flag.

As President Bartlett once said on The West Wing, "Is there some epidemic of flag burning that I don't know about?"

This amendment would open the door to other amendments designed specifically to curtail the liberty of people who are unpopular. You don't like Muslims? Public notice bills would threaten tradition

Texas has for decades worked to fully inform its citizens by requiring that public notices be printed in local newspapers.

Several bills now before the Legislature threaten that tradition of publishing important notices while allowing exclusive publication on the Internet, at the option of state and local governments.

There is nothing wrong with using the Internet at the option of state and local governments.

There is nothing wrong with using the Internet to expand public notice. That's already happening without much prompting by the state. However, for the foreseeable future, newspapers remain vital to the process of public notice.

The bills are SB 872 by Jon Lindsay (R-Houston) and SB 853 by Sen. Chris Harris (R-Arlington). Lindsay's bill would allow for Internet posting of public bid notices. Harris' bill is more sweeping and would allow publication on the Internet of all public notices required by state law.

In both bills, electronic publication could be instead of, not in addition to, publication in newspapers.

Let's say up front that newspaper publishers likely would lose revenue because of the change. However, for most daily newspapers, legal advertising represents a small percentage of revenue, usually much less than five percent. The percentage for weekly newspapers is higher.

The real losers if this legislation passes would be the public.

In this debate, it is essential for all to understand the underlying purpose of such advertising; it is not just functional, aimed only at public officials and contractors who do business with the government. It is for everyone.

All citizens have a right to information about public bidding, meetings, tax foreclosure sales, and adoption of new tax rates and budgets.

The fact is, not enough Texans have Internet access or use what they do have at least not yet. A 1998 US Department of Commerce study set Texas's statewide rate of access at only about 24.5 percent. Admittedly, that likely is somewhat higher

However, there remains an undeniable digital divide between those who have access to the Internet and those who don't. It appears obvious that those without Internet access are the most economically disadvantaged among us. Access also is much lower in rural than in urban areas.

The best data available seems to be a June 2000 report title "Government Services and Computer and Internet Use in Texas," compiled by the University of Texas. It concludes that about half of all Texans have at least limited Internet access, but fully half the polling sample agreed "the Internet is insufficiently available across the state to rely on it for providing government services."

Simply put, allowing Internet-only posting would put such information offlimits to all who do not possess the money the skills and training, the hardware or software to surf the net. That's a bad idea.

It's an even worse idea when one considers how newspapers still may serve in this area.

Habit is an important part of what newspapers offer. The state of Texas has invested millions over the years in training citizens to look for public notices in their local newspaper. We should not toss this aside without a great amount of planning and thought.

Further, a majority of Texas newspa-

pers already have their own Internet presence. The Texas Press Association reports that more than half of the state's 550 newspapers have Internet editions. Of those, 111 Texas newspapers currently are posting legal notices to the Internet.

In many cases (including The Galveston County Daily News), legal posting on the Internet is a free service offered to enhance the value and reach of legal advertising published in the paper.


Surely there is a way to harness the power of a print-Internet partnership to serve the people of Texas better.

Some in the Texas Legislature may relish the notion of taking a small amount of revenue away from their local newspa-

Others may sincerely believe the state should make more and better use of Internet technology. It is hard to argue with that notion. It's also logical, however, that expansion onto the Internet should be phased and appropriate to the growth in genuine Internet access and use.

The bills on the table today could essentially end access to huge quantities of public information for all but our most technologically advanced - and wealthiest

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
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
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

sprouting weeds grow through. They are killed by the product as they try to grow through it. For best season long results, I would apply another application in early July as the product tends to give out resulting in some annual grass problems in late season.

Perennial grassy weeds are our hardest weeds to control in the lawn. It is usually necessary to sacrifice a portion of the lawn in order to kill the perennial grass. Our lawn is a perennial grass as is this weedy grass. Most herbicides that kill the weedy grass will also kill our lawn grass. Determine the problem and time the kill so that you will be able to replant and have the replanted lawn come back quickly. Roundup is the herbicide to use. Give the product at least two weeks to work it's way through the grass for a complete kill. Once you are satisfied of the kill, till the soil and replant. Remember, warm season lawn grasses do best planted in late spring while cool season grasses do best when planted in early fall.

Always read and follow label directions when using any herbicide, insecticide, or fungicide.

Weeds in the lawn can be controlled. Just keep in mind that weeds are usually the result of another problem. Healthy, thick lawns are less likely to have weed problems than lawns that are not managed properly and therefore do not compete with the weeds to keep them out.

A little planning and understanding of lawn care can go a long way in having a "Great Looking Lawn."
