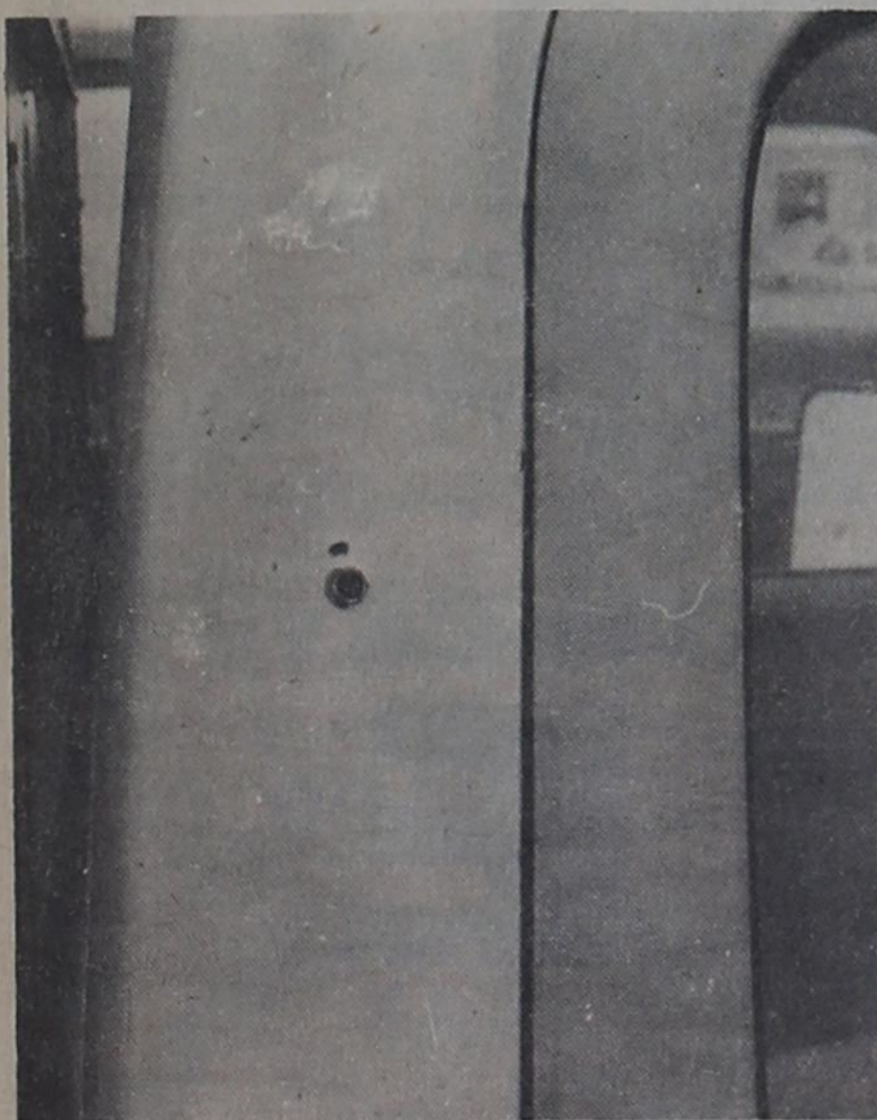

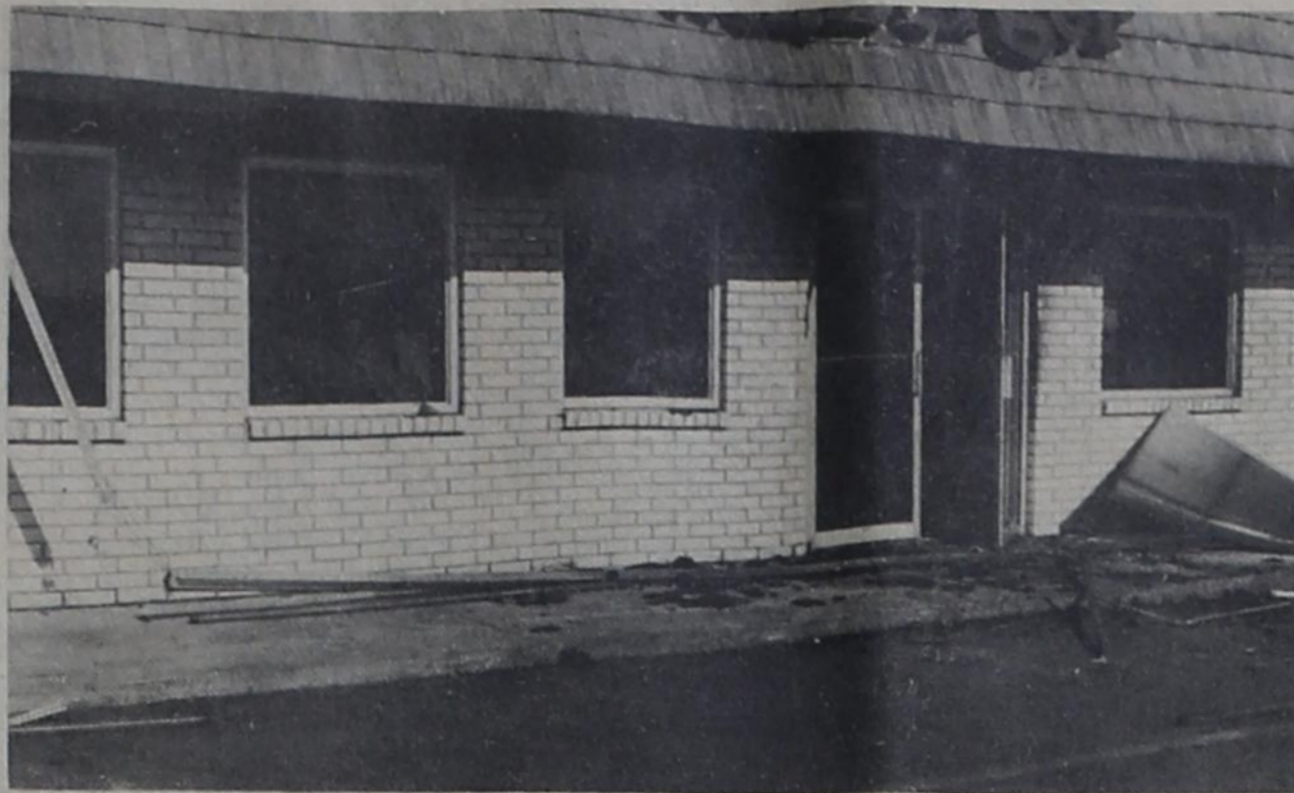
## Gun Accident Wounds Patrolman



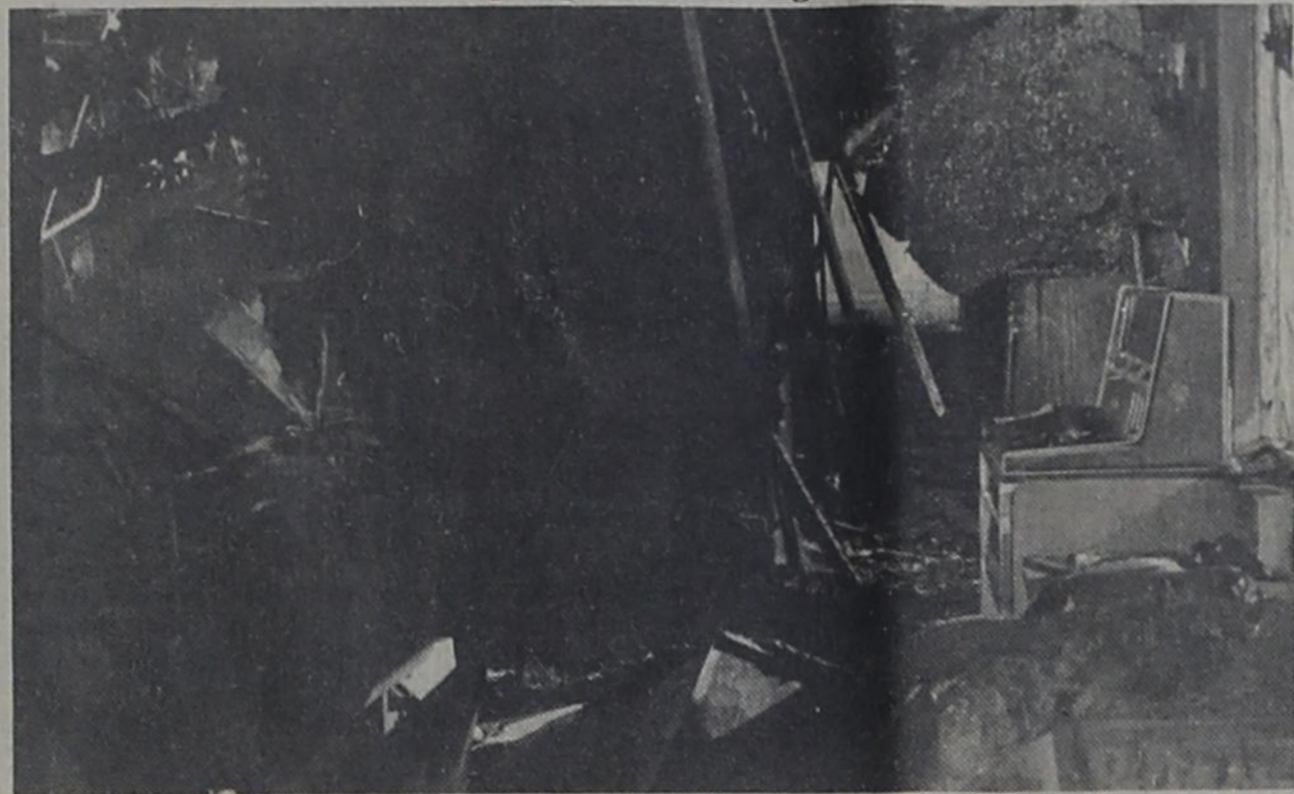
THE BULLET exited the truck cab on the right side without deforming

A freak gun accident Saturday afternoon sent DPS officer William "Doug" Wright to Northwest Texas Emergency Receiving Center with a shoulder wound.

The incident occurred in front of Allsup's Convenience Store when Wright was hit from a loaded 30-06 scope-sighted rifle as Jerry Pryor was attempting to

## Fire Destroys Mr. Burger

A midnight fire Saturday gutted Mr. Burger. The fast-food restaurant had been in operation for several months before Saturday night's fire destroyed the interior completely.

Eleven firefighters and four units from the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department responded to the 12:20 alarm. The fire had progressed to the roof and hampered attempts to get at the source of the blaze.

Firemen believe the blaze began in the kitchen area. Construction of the building hampered firefighters with the arrangement of partitions preventing direct use of water hoses.

The fire burned long enough before firemen arrived to engulf the roof. Dense smoke prevented firefighters from pinpointing the center of the blaze. Even with smoke masks the black smoke was too dense to allow firemen to detect the source.

When it became apparent the roof would collapse it was deemed dangerous to risk any further entry into the burning structure.

Fire Marshall Clyde Price explained firemen sought to contain the fire in the kitchen area by using hoses at the front entrance of the

restaurant. Directional winds forced the firefighters to keep the rear exit door closed during hosing from the front because of smoke billowing into the fire units, obscuring vision.

To obtain water, firemen were forced to put down some 750 feet of two inch hose from a plug near the football field across Highway 287 to fight the blaze.

Sheriff's Department and City Police personnel stopped traffic on the highway to prevent rupture of hose lines as firemen battled the blaze until 3:30 Sunday morning.

At one point City Policeman Danny Hill narrowly missed being injured by a truck passing the scene of the fire.

The interior and roof were described as totally destroyed. Jo Burton, manager of the restaurant, was unavailable for comment and exact figures for the loss were unavailable at press time pending an investigation by insurance adjusters.

Firemen returned to the building to check for any further signs of fire. A few spots were soaked again before firemen returned units to the fire station.

## Amarillo Stock Show Events

Clarendon College and West Texas State University host a livestock judging contest in conjunction with the Amarillo Stock Show January 24. Jerry Hawkins, Clarendon College agriculture instructor and Bob Lee of the WTU Animal Science Department will be superintendents for the event.

The judging contest is slated to be held in the coliseum on the fairgrounds with sixty judging teams the Panhandle expected to compete in this newly established event.

Classes of sheep, cattle and hogs will be judged. Entries are closed now for lambs, barrows, steers and heifers. By Friday, January 14, 2096 head of livestock had been entered.

Flip Breedlove will serve as superintendent for the Argus and Hereford Heifer shows. Entries to January 14 showed a marked increase in numbers over the 1976 numbers.

This is the first year there will not be an open cattle competition however. Quarter horse youth and adult entries are not complete at this time. Entries in these departments are accepted until show time.

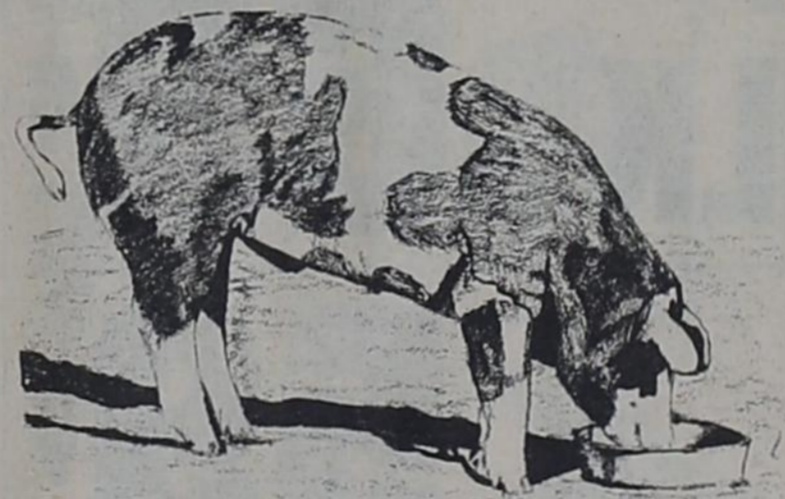
The incident occurred at approximately 4:45 Saturday afternoon with the ambulance responding within minutes of a phone call to Schooler-Gordon-Robertson.

Richard Gilkey MD, arrived at the sight and administered first aid until the ambulance arrived and accompanied the victim to Amarillo for assistance enroute.

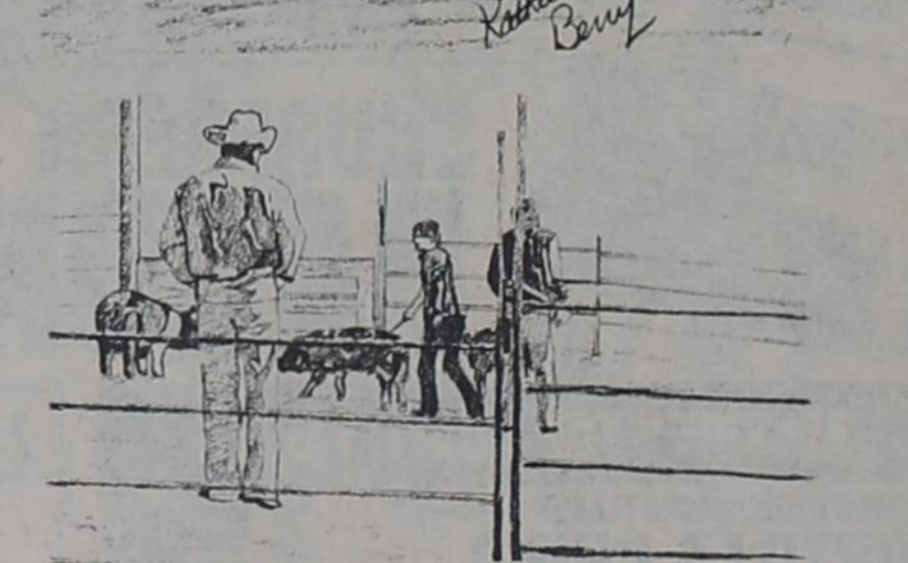
In examining the exit spot of the bullet from the cab the bullet had not deformed in piercing the metal. Wright had been standing approximately five feet from the cab when the gun went off.

## Estlack explains WTU hikes

Two of the most popular topics of conversation the last few weeks have been cold weather and high electric bills. The two go hand-in-hand according to Allen Estlack, of West Texas Utilities here in Clarendon.

"This early winter experienced in West Texas was a major cause for most December bills being higher than usual," says Estlack.

Estlack sees as another reason for the cost hike the jump in the price WTU paid for natural gas.

"Combined, the weather and the fuel cost caused most bills to go up noticeably, resulting in a flurry of complaints to the WTU office," says Estlack.

"Our local office was literally swamped with calls from people inquiring about their bills," continued Estlack.

The fuel costs are passed on to the customer through the fuel adjustment clause, which has been in effect for some years. But what made the December billing period unusual was that a portion of the fuel adjustment was the result of a retroactive cost adjustment by Lone Star Gas Company, which furnishes most of WTU's generating fuel.

Estlack stated recent generating fuel costs have been the highest WTU has ever paid. Much of the increased cost was a catch-up adjustment caused by a delayed approval by the Federal Power Commission

for a gas price increase covering several months.

The resulting gas price increases mean the average customer's electric bill went up 10-15 percent over the previous month's bill.

Estlack blames the weather as the ultimate culprit though. Frigid temperatures caused a marked consumption in electricity during the period compared to other December periods.

Estlack urged all customers to examine the kilowatt hour consumption figures on their electric bills. This shows how much electricity is used and enables the customer to make his own monthly comparisons.

Weather Bureau, which has developed a formula for measuring the amount of cold weather in terms of "heating degree days."

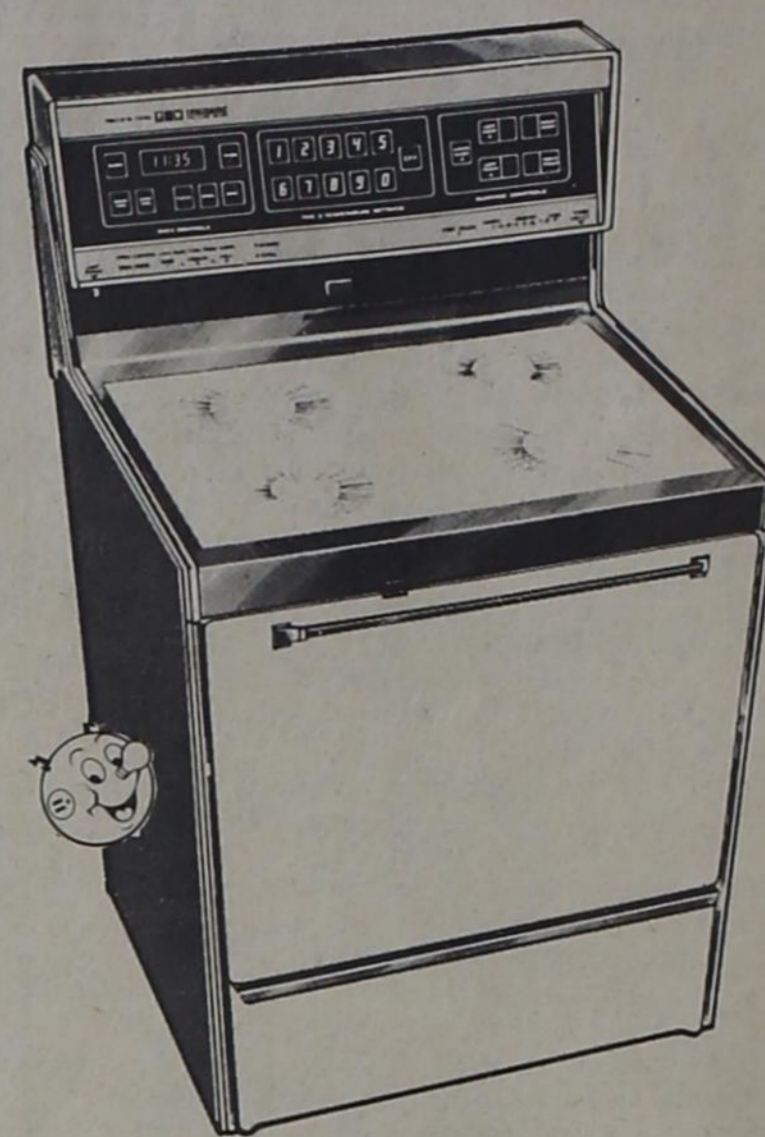
Through December, there had been 1,552 heating degree days this season, 550 more than normal.

Estlack acknowledged that even with cold weather and higher fuel costs WTU still found it hard to provide people with acceptable answers to complaints with costs continually rising.

Estlack pointed out that WTU had no price hike in rates since 1973, when all cities in the system were granted a six percent hike.

Allen explained the rate hikes were not designed as a profit-making device but rather a means to stay current with increased cost for generating fuels.

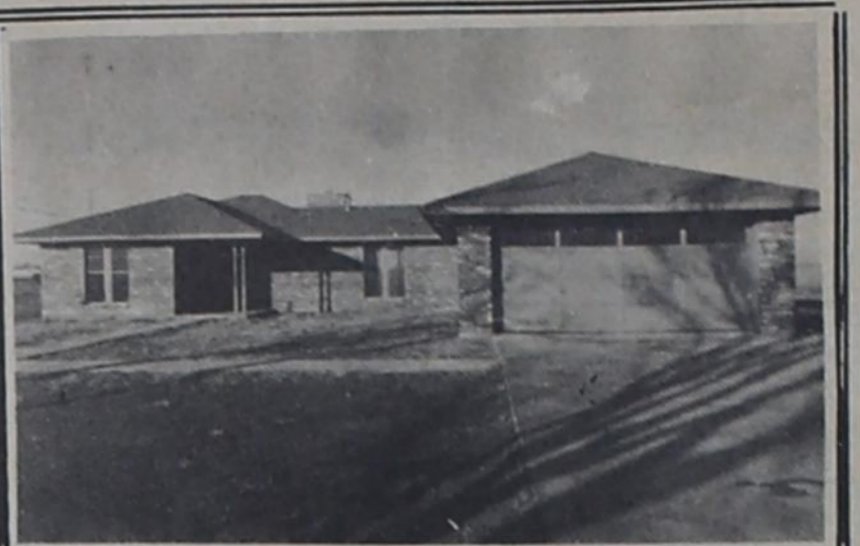

Little League baseball team to fourth place.

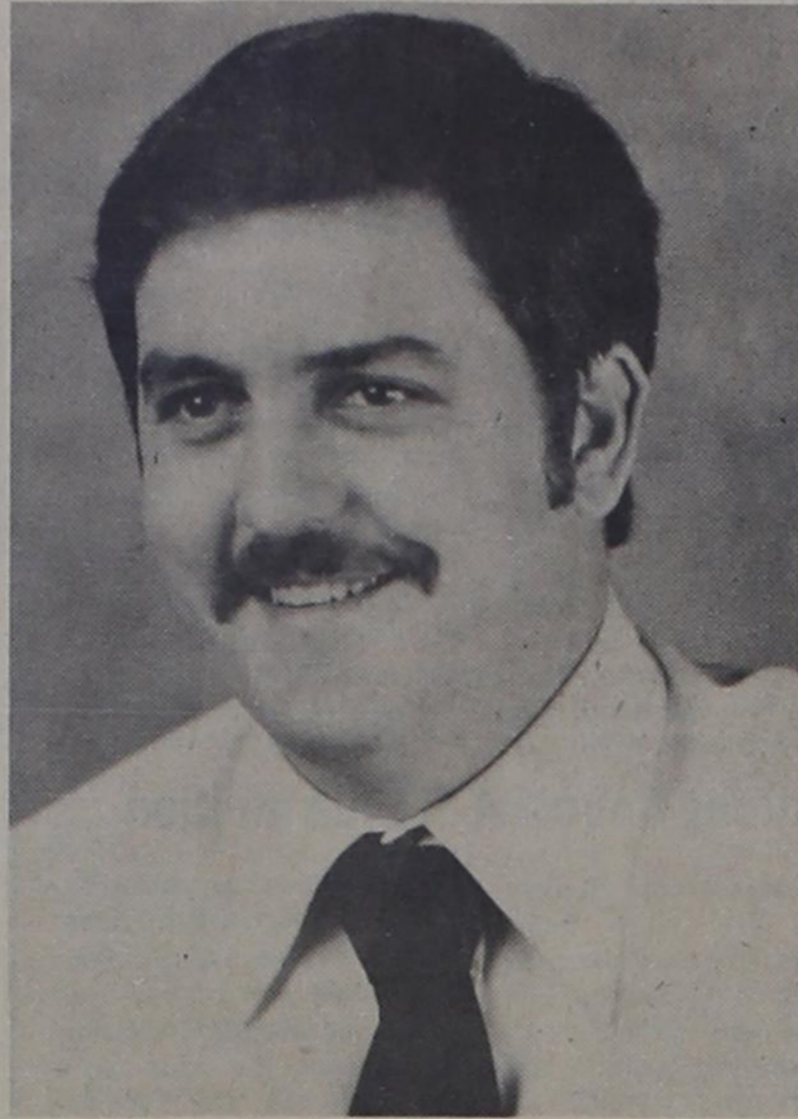
In his new position as Eastern Panhandle area supervisor, Daffron will work with the four other West Texas area supervisors.

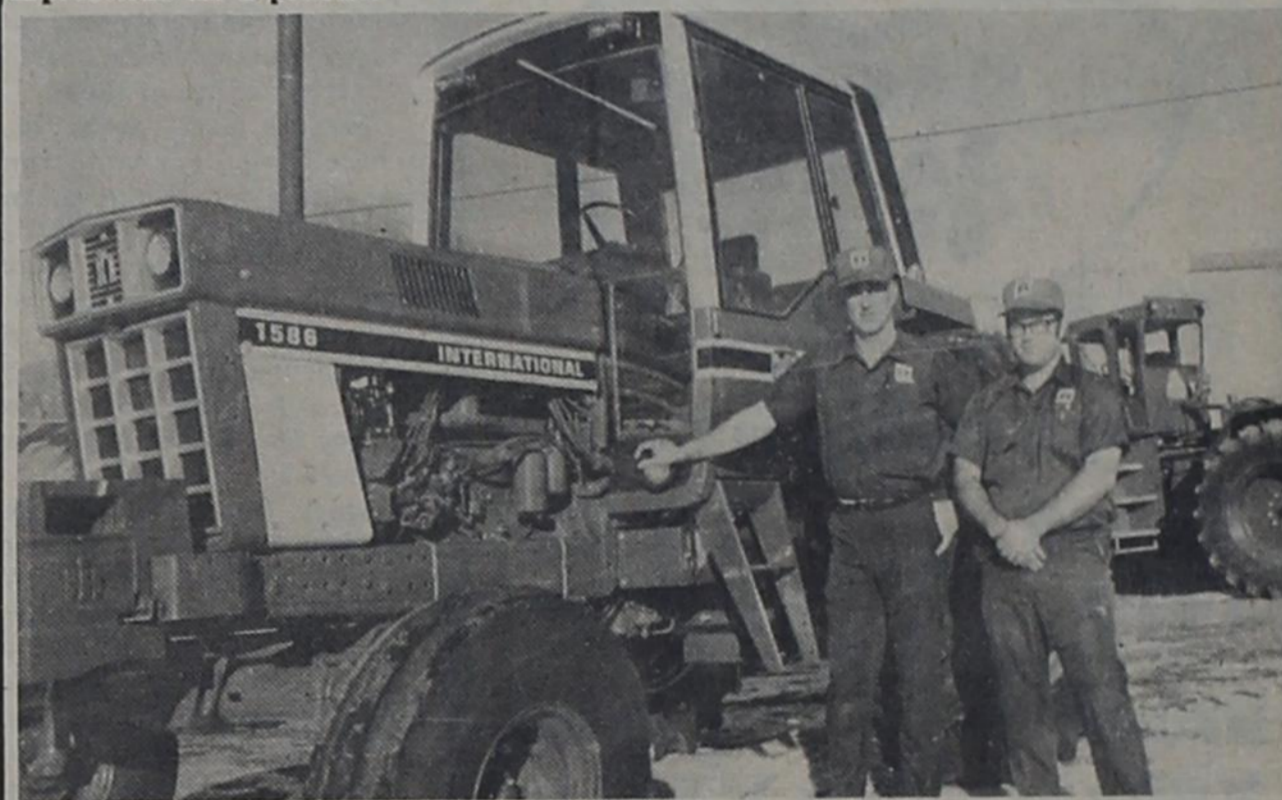

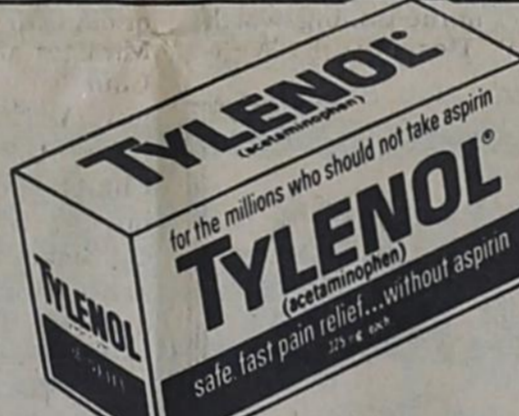

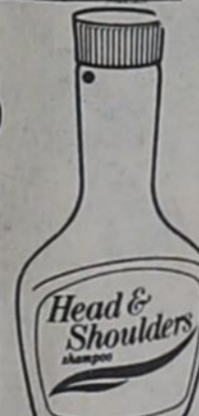

## Inaugural invitations for two Clarendon women

When Jimmy Carter takes the oath of office Thursday two local women will have a special interest in the ceremony.

Mary Cooke, long active in Democratic politics, received her invitation several weeks ago. First grade teacher, Nova Little, received an invitation as a result of a bulletin board project on the election she planned for her children during the presidential campaign during the fall months.

For Mary Cooke, Carter's inauguration culminates a personal involvement through her role as Democratic County Chairman, a position she's held since 1960 and the Kennedy-Nixon campaign experience.

"I can't remember when I wasn't involved in politics," says Cooke. "Our family was always like that."

Nova Little's first graders learned about the election campaign by participating in some of the ritual themselves. The first grade teacher sent for photographs of President Ford and

Governor Carter in the fall. Little wrote directly to Plains, Georgia for Carter's picture explaining the bulletin board project.

"The children became so involved as the campaign progressed. We duplicated ballots and each child voted with his X for Ford or Carter. I explained that what they were doing now was play but that it was a duty they would have later when they grew up," said Mrs. Little.

The mock election went heavily for Carter and Nova explained to the crushed Ford supporters they should be good losers too because Mr. Ford was.

"I received the invitation to the inauguration several weeks ago. I'm sure they don't know me from Adam and that it was surely the bulletin board project that brought me to their attention," Mrs. Little concluded.

## Texas stockmen working on screwworm eradication

If everyone does his part this winter stockmen will have the best chance ever to eliminate screwworms from Texas ranges, says Ronnie Gooch, local County Extension Agent.

"Cooler than normal weather in November and December in aiding the program to eradicate screwworms. Mexico produced sterile flies are being released in that country south of the Texas border," says Gooch.

Gooch says the 171 laboratory confirmed December cases from Texas ranges brought the year's case total to 29,241. This is exceeded only by 90,980 cases in 1972, and 49,484 in 1962.

Only 20 cases were tallied the last half of December. Armando Cantu collected the Starr County case on E. W. Schader's Cenizo Ranch northwest of Roma. Mrs. Frank Smith of Pearsall submitted a screwworm case from Frio County. The last

case identified in 1976 was collected by Dan Butler on the H. Yturria Ranch in Willacy Co.

The other 17 cases came from the Cage Ranch in Brooks County.

Screwworm are larvae of the screwworm fly. Adult females of this species deposit eggs on wounds in

warm blooded animals. As eggs hatch the tiny maggots enter the wound to feed on living flesh.

The program is based on the fact female screwworm flies mate only once in their lifetimes. Millions of artificially reared and sexually sterilized screwworm flies are released among known wild populations.

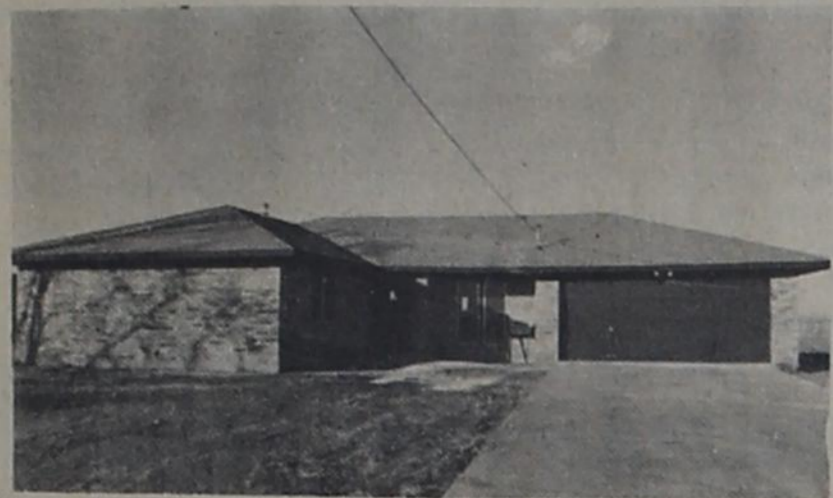

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## Extension Urges Cooperative Boer eradication

An area entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that producers interested in controlling the devastating southwestern corn borer insect ought to band together in an all-out attack against the pest.

"It takes a community-wide effort to be effective," he adds. "Adjacent infested corn fields could become a source of reinfestations in clean fields."

The larvae of the southwestern corn borer overwinter in the tap root of the old corn stubble, and if left undisturbed, has an excellent change of surviving the winter. Corn stubble that is broken out and exposed results in nearly 100 percent mortality of those overwintering larvae. If one is planning to graze his stalks, he can break out the stalks as late as February and still expect enough cold weather to cause mortality of the overwintering larvae.

Grazing itself will not reduce overwintering larval survival nor will stubble burning, the entomologist adds. In those areas where

the soil has a tendency to "blow" if disturbed too much, a producer may have to plant a cover crop such as wheat or rye to hold the soil after the stalks have been broken out.

"The use of insecticide to control the southwestern corn borer is a difficult task, aside from being expensive," he says. "The timing of this insecticide application is very critical, for if the critical time frame of two to three days is missed, any insecticide applied is wasted. Most producers do not have the extra time required in monitoring their fields to determine this critical period for insecticide application. As a result, much of it is applied at the wrong time. With the cost of insecticide, plus environmental concerns, a producer cannot afford to apply insecticides that do him no good."

Patrick emphasizes that area-wide stubble management for southwestern corn borer control is by far more desirable and effective. He urges communities to organize in this effort.

When the entire high school has but seventeen boys to pick and choose from for a basketball team you have to operate on a unique philosophy. That's how Coach Troy Lemley sees his Hedley's Owls win record over the past five years.

"We simply feel like we'd rather be good at what we do and strive for excellence on the court," says Lemley. The team's record this year seems to bear this motto out with a tidy fifty-three percent shooting record.

With a 20-3 record so far the Hedley Owls seem to be in the position of spoiler to larger schools in the district.

"We're a small-sized team and we try to make up with quickness and ball-handling ability when we play, regardless of who we play. Right now I suppose our leading rebounder is Stuart Messer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Messer. And by points I would say John Lemley is at the top in scoring. These two seniors lead the team right now."

The games with Memphis point up the strength of this small school's basketball team. In the first encounter Hedley easily defeated the Cyclones 71-45 on Memphis'

home court. The second encounter ended with a 57-45 Owl victory at Hedley. Memphis did manage to take the Owls to the White Deer Tournament by eleven points, 59-48.

In the two district games of the season the Owls overpowered Estelline 80-40 and Samnorwood with a 43-26 win.

Lemley felt that Samnorwood would be the toughest game in the district all season and was well pleased with the team's showing.

"The kids have a good attitude about this game. They love to play and I think that they play well. I hope I've instilled some of that love of the game in them but I can't take too much credit. They have to want to play well to start with."

Prospects for maintaining the level of player skill and ability in the next few years look good and Lemley remains confident.

"I'd say they are super frankly. The juniors and sophomores that we have coming along now are good. They don't weigh a hundred and thirty-pounds apiece but they show good hustle. I can see the program continuing much the same for another four years. Beyond that who can say with certainty?"

Lemley credits his team's record with their general strong academic ability. Lemley feels good students

make good athletes and finds his team easier to coach because of this.

"They know what's going on most of the time. Sometimes they understand before you can tell them when we practice."

Lemley feels his top six players come evenly from the senior, junior and sophomore classes. Messer and John Lemley as seniors, Bob White and Mike Darnell as sophomores and Joe Lemley and Randy Woodward are ranked high for the Owl effort in district this season.

Hedley's Owls like a basic man-to-man defense but Lemley acknowledges the team does run patterns.

"It's a basic sort of game for us. On offense we do like to get the ball down court fast and get the ball up," sums up Lemley.

Apparently the plan works for the Hedley Owls. In the past five years the record stands at over 150 games won and thirty-five lost. The strong tradition for winning on the basketball court continues at Hedley. A team some consider the spoiler in the district.

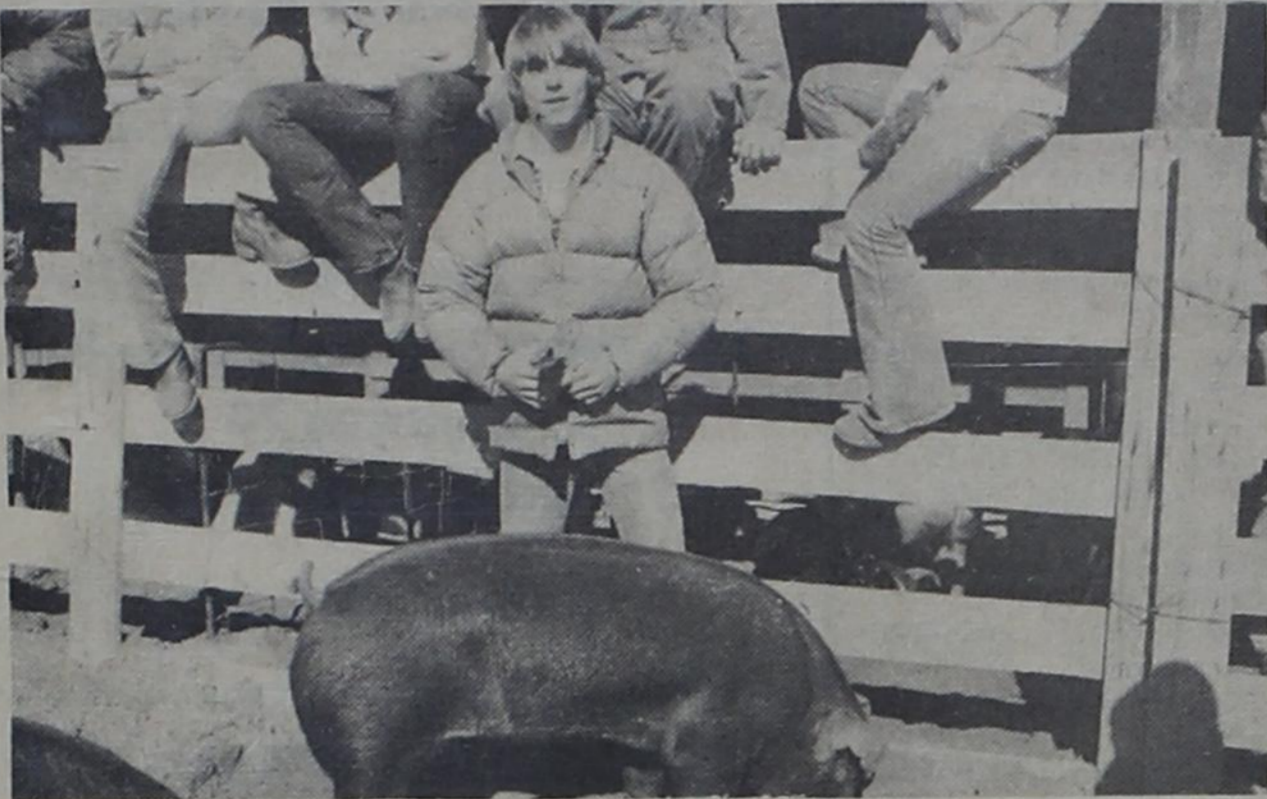

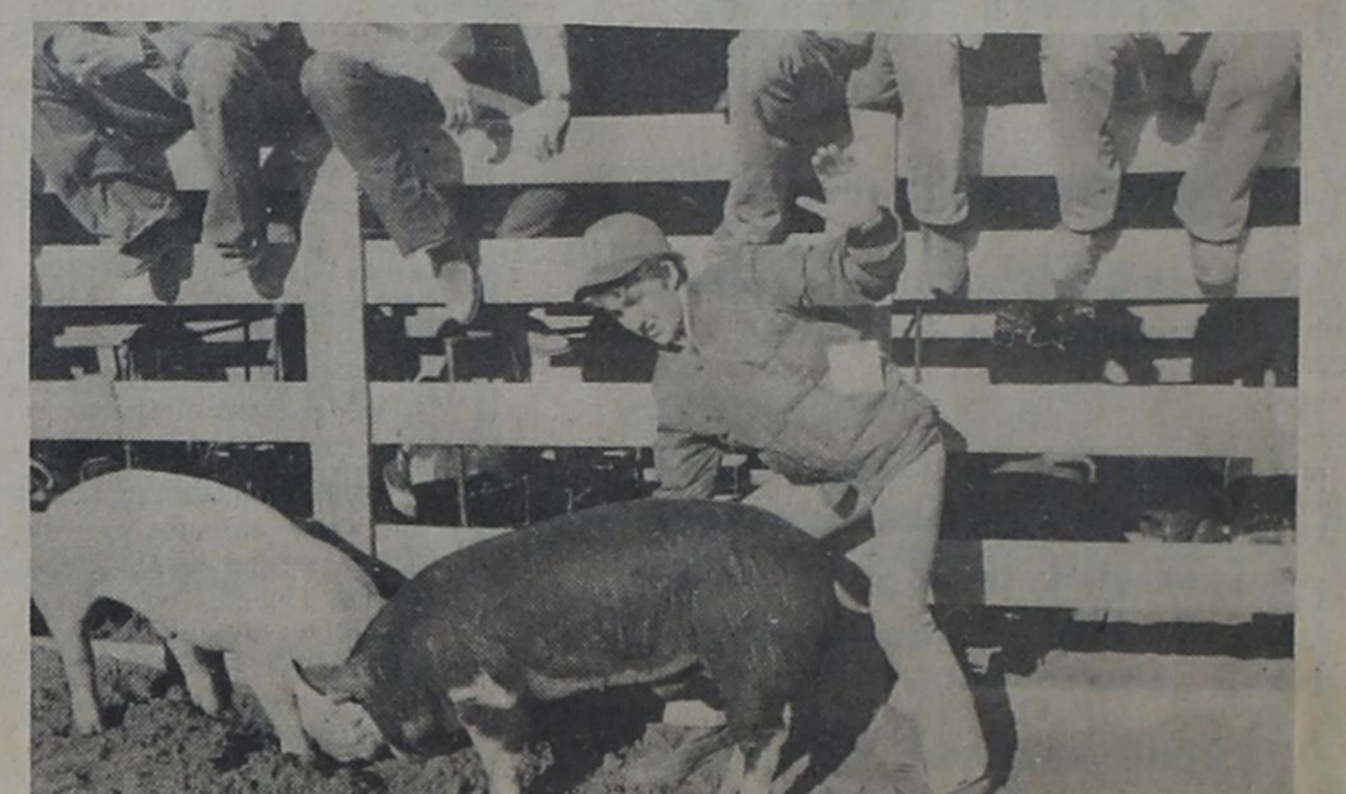

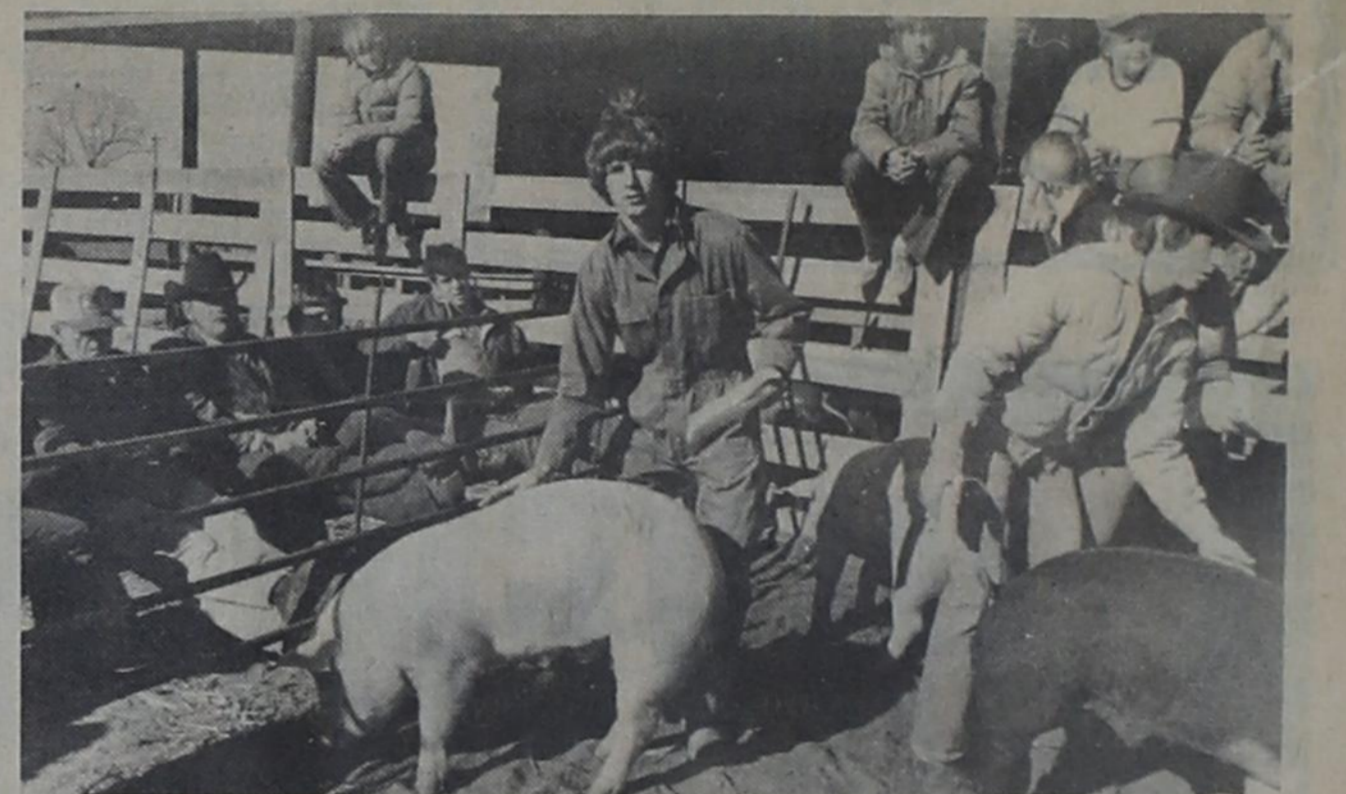

A balance diet is the key to good eating habits. A balanced diet is the daily selection of a variety of foods that fulfills the body's needs for essential nutrients - protein, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins and minerals.

With heart disease being the number one health problem in the U.S., doctors have recommended a diet that reduces the intake of saturated fats and cholesterol but still provides all the essential nutrients. This is important in lowering blood cholesterol levels, and reducing the risk of atherosclerosis, the disease underlying most heart attacks and strokes.

A low saturated fat - low cholesterol diet, sometimes called a "modified fat diet" is really a plan that calls for reasonable changes in selecting certain types of foods. Simply decrease the amount of saturated fat and cut down on foods high in

cholesterol. Here are some general rules to follow in modifying the fats in your diet.

USE:

- Salad and cooking oils, margariners with liquid vegetable oil as the major ingredient, and vegetable shortenings low in cholesterol fat
- Lean meat of poultry and fish
- Lean cuts of beef, lamb, and veal, cooked to dispose of saturated fat and eaten in moderate portions
- Low-fat and fat-modified dairy products
- Organ meats (e.g. liver) and shellfish in moderation since they are higher in cholesterol than muscle of red meat, chicken and fish.
- fat modified baked goods
- Grains, fruits, vegetables, legumes

AVOID:

- Fat cuts of meat, addition of saturated fat when cooking meat, large meat portions and processed meats high in saturated fats.
- High saturated fat dairy products
- Butter, shortenings and margarine high in saturated fat
- Candies high in saturated

fat

- Egg yolk, bacon, lard, suet

Recipes for Low Saturated Fat Diet

TANGY CHICKEN SALAD

1/2 c. plain low-fat yogurt

1/2 c. mayonnaise

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. curry powder

1 Tb. skim milk

2 1/2 c. dices cooked white chicken meat

1 cup slices celery

2 Tb. chopped onion

1/2 c. slivered almonds

Mix together yogurt, mayonnaise, salt, curry powder and milk. Add chicken, celery and onion. Toss well. Chill. Just before serving mix in almonds. Serve on lettuce leaf.
