insists that there's no reason anyone should ever be bitten handling snakes. Addy uses a specially designed snake catching tool and is careful never to assume anything about the snakes. She believes her water moccasin is the most aggressive.

"We feed them mice and baby chicks. During the year we order boxes of baby chicks and we raise our own mice here. Snakes are picky eaters in captivity," pointed

To supplement her income from the snake business Addy sells -snakes to customers along with snake skins which are widely popular now for hatbands. And she pitches the sale of color pictures of her golden raccoons kept in cages in back of the snake shop. A caged bobcat also makes up her small animal menagerie.



April is Peach Thinning Time

Donley County home owners and commercial growers have one of the largest crop of peaches in history, according to County Extension Agent Ronald

In order to have high quality peaches at harvest and healthy trees, your peaches should be thinned as soon as possible. Peaches should not be closer than four to eight inches apart on any single shoot. Short shoots less than 10 inches should have only one peach. The small fruit should be removed before they are the size of a Nickle, which is before pit hardening and the fruit is approximately 3/4 inch in diameter. The fruit can be removed by hand or with a short rubber hose attached to a broom handle. It is important to thin fruit as soon as possible because as the peaches mature less

Consequences of Cotton Replanting Serious This Year

COLLEGE STATION ---Texas cotton producers are able to get by with replanting cotton in some years, but this is not the year to give it a try, emphasizes a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

vice. Dr. Robert B. Metzer says that the consequences of replanting cotton this year are more severe than in past years due to a shortage of high quality seed. This shortage is being brought about by the increased cotton acreage along with the production of low quality seed in some areas last year. Texas cotton acreage is expected to be up about a million acres over 1976.

"Seed supplies of many recently developed varieties have been exhausted for several months," points out the cotton specialist. "Un-

less replanting is kept at a minimum, a critical shortage of good planting seed could develop. Any significant replanting could force producers to use lower quality seed and could limit their choices to less profitable

Be Careful With Lawn Mowers

Lawn mowing can be hazardous to your health, especially if you disregard safety when using a power mower, says Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

Most lawn mower accidents could be prevented with a few safety rules, contends Gooch.

The first rule in safe operation of a lawn mower is to become completely familar with your machine. Read the owner's manual carefully. Make sure everyone who will be operating the lawn mower understands the controls and knows how to stop the engine quickly in case of an emergency.

Before mowing, clear the entire lawn area of sticks, stones, wire and debris-anything that could be thrown by the mower blade. Then get pets and small children out of the mowing

Disengage the clutch and shift into neutral before starting the engine. Keep your feet away from the blade when starting the

Stop the engine whenever you leave the mower, if even for a moment. Always stop the engine and disconnect the spark plug wire if you intend to check or work on

Also stop the engine and allow it to cool before refueling. And use safety containers for gasoline.

Exercise extreme caution when mowing on slopes or wet grass and never pull the mower toward you.

Ettects of Higher Milk **Support Price** Aired

COLLEGE STATION ----

An increase in the government support price of manufacturing milk that is designed to help dairymen caught in the cost-price squeeze will bring some increase in consumer prices as well.

As of April 1, the support price for manufacturing milk is \$9 per 100 pounds, up 74 cents from the price that prevailed the past six

"The new support price, which is estimated at 83 per cent of parity, reflects the increasing production costs to dairymen and assures a level of income adequate to maintain productive capacity sufficient to meet anticipated future needs," points out Dr. Randall Stelly, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

From the consumer standpoint, prices of nonfat dry milk and cheese will go up about 5-1/2 cents per pound while butter will jump about 10 cents a pound. Fresh milk prices will likely increase about 1-1/2 cents per quart.

The support level for milk is achieved through standing offers by the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to purchase butter, Americantype cheese and nonfat dry milk at announced prices, explains Stelly. Thus the CCC will purchase butter at an increase of 10 cents per pound and nonfat dry milk and cheese at an increase of 5-1/2 cents per pound. According to U.S. De-

partment of Agriculture figures, the new support price will increase annual cash receipts to dairymen by about \$3,000 per producer with a 40-cow herd. Although the price in-

crease appears on the positive side for dairymen, it could have a dampening effect by slowing domestic consumption of dairy products and could also aggravate the growing imbalance between milk production and the sale of fresh fluid milk, notes the economist. More and more milk is going into manufacturing channels due to increasing production and declining per capita consumption of fresh fluid milk. Consequently, milk used for processed dairy products commands a lower price than fresh fluid milk.

Is a man an American citizen just because he claims to be? Or is a man a General in the United States Army

simply because he says so? Should a man who claims to be a Doctor of Medicine be respected as such purely on the basis of his claim?

Does a man's claim to be a Rotarian make him one? Ridiculous questions, you say? You are right. These are foolish questions because all recognize that it takes more - much more - than one's personal claim to make him an American citizen or a United

States Army general or a medical doctor or a member of the Rotary Club. Fulfillment of certain standards, which involve definite and specific obligations, determines who is an American or a general or a doctor or

The principle of employing standards is accepted universally except in religion. Strangely, it is only in religion that men have come to feel that standards are meaningless and may vary according to a man's wishes. Take the question "Who is a Christian?", for example. Since there are so many variations among the doctrines that men advance in the name of

Christianity, it has almost come to pass that the only definition that many would accept is this: "A Christian is one who says he is a Christian." While Christendom may endorse this broad, tolerant definition of a Christian, Jesus would not. He said: "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth

Christ's standard, and it alone, determines whether one is truly a Christian. One may have many Christian ideals and concepts, and one may do many Christian deeds but he still may not be a Christian in the New Testament sense of the term. Three fundamental principles constitute the determinants for making one a Christian.

A Christian Is One Who Believes In The Divinity

Jesus stated this requirement clearly: "For if ye believe not that I am he, ye shall die in your sins" (John 8:24). Christ made it plain that men must believe that he is the Messiah, the only begotten and divine Son of God. A man may believe truly in Christ's goodness and his great character and still not believe that necessary to keep him from dying in his sins.

A Christian Is One Who Does The Will Of God.

That which one does in order to become a Christian is the will of God. The will of God which one does in ng a Christian is revealed in the gospel (2 Thessalonians 1: 7-9). The gospel is something to be obeyed, not just believed (Hebrews 5: 8,9). A Christian is one who has complied with the terms of the gospel by obeying "from the heart that form of doctrine" (Romans 6:17).

A Christian Is One Who Abides In A Relationship With God, Definite And Specific Relationship Made Possible By Christ.

Apart from this relationship there is no approach to the Heavenly Father (John 14: 6). One enters this specific relationship when he enters Christ (2 Corinthians 5: 17), and one enters Christ in baptism (Romans 6: 3-5; Galatians 3: 27). One must abide faithfully in this relationship, walking "in the light" (I John 1:7), unto death (Revelation 2:10).

Christianity is not something vague, nor philosophically difficult, nor theologically mysterious. One becomes a Christian by believing something definite doing something definite, and abiding in a definite relationship with God. In no other way can we be truly Christians. Let us be clear and firm in our definition, for the original standard was set by Christ
