Quail Tornado Victims Dig Out

By LOWELL CARLSON

"It looked like a bomb hit the building from where I was standing," said Marvin Blevins as he recounted last week's tornado that smashed into the school buildings at Quail. "I was never much for going to the cellar but it made a believer out of me."

Blevins, whose land adjoins the school property, watched the funnel approach the buildings, saw the wind strip each tree of its leaves and float tin roofing out across a field like sheets of paper.

"They say you can hear them; they sound like an approaching freight train. This tornado could have hit us and I wouldn't have thought it was anything but a bad sandstorm. I couldn't hear a thing yet people ten miles away say they heard the noise," explained Blevins. "It was headed straight for our farm house and then turned."

The irony of the destruction and no loss of life isn't lost on Quail people. It was report card day and classes had been turned out at 2:30 p.m. The school grounds were deserted except for six girls who were painting in what's known as the Home Economics Cot-

Observers who first saw the funnel approach the little farming and ranching community recalled it looked like a blue cloud.



goldfish, we have found that the pineal does have an effect on the reproductive system," deVlaming said. "We removed the pineal, and then treated the fish with melatonin. This caused the reproductive system to become inactive. This is the same as in nature. When day

length gets shorter during winter, fish and other seasonal breeders, don't breed. During the spring, when day length gets longer, less melatonin is secreted, and they start breeding.

"The pineal gland is important in regulating biological rhythms," de-Vlaming said. Whether the gland itself is the biological clock, I don't know. But I think it is involved in 'clock' functions. It may be one of the cogs." DeVlaming's research may

lead to more knowledge about how environmental factors such as seasons and day length affect human's behavior. Beyond this, it also may

shed some light on what happens when the biological "clock" is out of kilter.

Melatonin, or some other pineal chemical, might be used in controlling the symptoms of Parkinson's Disease and epilepsy. Treatment with melatonin of patients with these afflictions calms them, and makes them more at ease and comfortable. Some scientists also are attempting to relate sleeping habits to the pineal.





'The front door and windows were open along with the damper on the chimney," said Brenda Chamberlain. "I do think people would be wise to open up a house in the path of a tornado because water and hail damage is better than having the house literally explode due to pressure





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
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Terri Sullivan Revival Planned for

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



The Bereans **Did Their** Own Thinking

Not many of us think for ourselves when it comes to matters in religion. We prefer to leave religious subjects and Bible issues to those supposedly trained and skilled in this field—the priests, theologians, pastors, and ministers. Sometimes we get the idea that the Bible cannot be understood by common people. Some religious leaders even teach and encourage this view.

Does the Bible say anything about the ability and the responsibility of the average person to understand its message? Most certainly it does.

The Jews of Berea, for example, are described in the New Testament as "noble." Yet, they were not famous, nor were they rich or powerful. In fact, they were somewhat obscure. The description of their nobility is recorded in Acts 17:11:

"These were more noble than those in Thessalonica in that they received the word with all readiness of mind and searched the scriptures daily, whether these things were so."

This reference to the Bereans is significant because it is plainly a tribute to a religious people. The Bereans were noble in attitude. They were noble because they were eager to be taught the truth-they were sincerely truthseekers! Although ready to receive religious teaching from others, they were at the same time very careful to examine such teaching in the light of the scriptures.

Unfortunately, this attitude of the Bereans -the spirit of independent, personal investigation-does not prevail widely among religious people in the twentieth century. It is a sad commentary on our lack of love for the truth (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12). Man is in a pitiable state when he possesses neither the intellectual vitality nor the spiritual interest to study God's will for himself.

The New Testament abounds with evidence that harmonizes with the attitude of the noble Bereans. The apostle Peter insisted that Christians should know what they believe and why

they believe it, "ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15).

The apostle John places the responsibility directly upon every Christian to follow the pattern of the Bereans and prove every teaching to be sure it is from God: "because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 John

By revelation John commends very highly the favorable characteristic of the church of Ephesus of being ready at ail times to check truth against error. They had "tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars . . ." (Revelation 2:2).

Members of churches of Christ today are simply trying to reproduce faithfully the church of our Lord as it existed in the first century-the same in doctrine, worship, name, organization, service, life and work. The Bible clearly teaches that the seed of the gospelthe word of God-will produce after its kind, pure and undenominational Christianity. The first century church was founded upon the basis of the word; it follows that the same word must serve as the blueprint for the twentieth century church.

We invite our friends to "search the scriptures" to see whether these things be so!

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

harvest.

The destruction to the school was complete yet inside the rubble strewn shell of the building the superintendent's office remained intact as did the trophy case down a corridor.

Inside a storm cellar located near the superintendent's home the students, superintendent and his wife and the janitor and his wife along with a nearby neighbor huddled as the funnel demolished buildings outside. Pressure from the cyclone pulled on the door while the superintendent and janitor held onto a length of rope from the inside.

The only injury occurred when the janitor's hand was cut in the futile effort to hold onto the door as the tornado pulled it from the hinges. So terrified were the students following the ordeal that rescue workers had to carry them out of the shelter. "Within thirty minutes

after the tornado hit, Carrol Daves of Carrol's Drive-In over at Wellington had 200 sandwiches over here," recounted Marvin Blevins. "The City State Bank supplied us with food and soft drinks. People have been very good about dropping what they were doing and

The wreckage was high. The tornado destroyed two school buses, five, perhaps 6 cars were wrecked along with two pickups. The school's drivers education car was demolished under heaps of rubble and trees.

"Someone might have been killed here if Memphis law officials had not been driving some backroads around here," explained Blevins. "They alerted authorities and put the warning out on the radio. Some kids ran from house-tohouse and warned people to take cover."

Bizarre examples of the tornado's might could be found the next day. A tractor's cab was pushed completely forward smashing it onto the hood. The tractor had been attached to a planter and the outfit had been forced out into the field as though planting without a driver. A chisel plow had been picked up and periodically dropped back to earth breaking off points as it fell to the ground each time.

Life goes on though. School graduation was scheduled for Tuesday, May 17 and that's what Quail did. Inside the Baptist Church parents and children gathered like refugees in their own town.

"It started to cloud up of thunder came I just couldn't sit still anymore," recounted Marvin. "A bunch of us left to go outside just to see what was going on; we Monday."

Mrs. Bridges, Inez's mother, visits the women often and helps out with chores in the kitchen when time is short on Tuesday.

The women are completely responsible for ordering, preparing and serving the food and the Lions let them plan the menus. Most of the kitchen supplies are purchased through a wholesaler. For the last year the women have been in charge of the kitchen.

'Sometimes we get caught short when members bring more guests with them for dinner and then we have to hurry to put on another pan or two of food," explained Lucille.

Some improvement in cattle prices this spring and summer appears not only possible but highly probable, says a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas

Dr. Ed Uvacek points out that the improved outlook is a result of lower beef production, some decrease in pork output, and further increases in population and disposable income.

"Price rises for fed and feeder cattle should continue to be rather healthy through the second quarter of the year and into the early part of the third quarter," believes Uvacek. "However, there will be some weakening of prices into the fall and winter."

The specialist expects fed cattle prices to top out in July but to generally remain strong throughout the summer months.

He also points out that such strong fed cattle prices this spring could lead to increased feedlot placements and an oversupply of fed cattle by the end of the year.

"Total cattle slaughter was down 4 per cent during the first three months of this year, even though fed cattle marketings were up," notes the Texas A&M University System specialist. "This means considerably less cows and nonfeds are being slaughtered than a year

"Feedlots intend to market about six million head during the second quarter--April through June," notes Ulvacek. "Since there is some indication that some cattle may have been marketed early, second quarter fed cattle marketings may even be lower than originally anticipated. Even the original estimate, though higher, would still produce only about 1 per cent more fed beef than a year ago. With further seasonal reductions expected in the slaughter of nonfed cattle The Sanctuary Choir of the and cows, beef production First United Methodist during this quarter could easily run 3 to 5 per cent below the same period a year May 11, 1977 after choir ago," points out the specialist.

> "Fed cattle marketings during the third calendar quarter should total 5.8 to 5.9 million head. This, coupled with lower pork and nonfed beef production, could sharply reduce total red meat supplies by the third quarter to levels below a year ago," adds Uvacek. "That's really encouraging and should keep price strength firm."
