rental fees. The Amendment will be up a vote on November 2 in the general election and provides for the transfer of unneeded money in

This Amendment was recommended by the governor to the legislature and was co-sponsored by Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe and Rep. Bill Daniel of Liberty.

The 66-year old Capitol Building long ago burst its seams as far as office space is concerned. State agencies are housed in a 192-block area in the city of Austin at a cost of \$250,000 annually in rentals. The Supreme Court and State Courts in the Capitol Building are so crowded that the Supreme Court justices are located on separate floors and do not have an office large enough for a private conference. Lawyers in the attorney general's office are similarly crowded, and the State Library and Archives long ago resorted to putting valuable records in a moldy basement as the only available place to store them. The State Courts and the Library would occupy the State Courts Building and Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gibson and agencies now renting space outside the Capitol would go into the State Office Building.



EXCESS WHEAT, COTTON, AND PEANUTS FOR 1955-

Any person who knowingly harvests any basic agricultural commodity (wheat, cotton, and peanuts in this area) on any farm in which he has an interest, in excess of the 1955 acreage allotment for such basic commodity, shall not be eligible for any payment of cost shares whatsoever on that farm or on any other farm under the 1955 Agricultural Conservation Pro-

At this time we especially want to call the above regulation to the attention of persons who plan to plant 15.0 acres of wheat on farms with less than 15.0 acres (or zero) 1955 wheat allotment. The following will apply with respect to the 15.0 acre wheat exemption:

(a) If the 1955 harvested wheat acreage exceeds the 1955 farm allotment, those persons having an interest in the harvested wheat acreage cannot receive 1955 program aar assistance for

pairying out ACP practices such as terracing, tanks, etc. in any county or state.

(b) If the 1955 harvested wheat acreage exceeds the 1955 farm allotment, the wheat will not be eligible for price support, but will not effect the eligibility of other crops grown on that farm for price support.

(c) 1955 Wheat Marketing Quota Penalties will not apply to farms harvesting 15.0 acres or less of wheat,

TOTAL ALLOTMENT AND DI-VERTED ACREAGE PRO-

On Sept. 15, the Secretary of Agriculture announced that the so-called total allotment and diverted acreage program would not be in effect for 1955 because of the need for reed grain and the flexible price support program. This means that producers in this area may plant unlimited acreage of such crops as grain sorghum, oats, barley, and corn without affecting eligibility for price supports.

RELEASE & REAPPORTION-MENT OF 1955 WHEAT ALLOTMENT'-

November 5, 1954, is the final date for release of 1955 wheat allotment. Wheat allotment released for 1955 will be considered as having been planted on the farm which released it; except \$11.25 if 1955 is the third straight year that no wheat has been planted on the farm. The wheat allotment released will be reapportioned by the County Committee to other eligible wheat farms in the county. Forms for releasing wheat allotment and forms for making application for additional allotment from released acreage are available at this office. November 12, 1954, is the final date for filing for additional al-
