

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



## Pesticide applicator workshop scheduled

commercial and noncommercial agricultural applicators of pesticides has been scheduled for June 30 and July 1 at the Science Building, West Texas State University, Canyon, Texas, according to County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

The educational workshop, though not a part of the official certification process, is being conducted by the Extension Service to train commercial and noncommercial applicators in three categories of agricultural pest control. These are field crop pest control, fruit and vegetable pest control, and weed and brush control. The workshop is being limited to an audience of 150 persons on a first come, first serve basis.

The first session of the workshop will include general subject matter applicable to all categories of commercial and noncommercial categories. Sessions that follow will deal with category specific subject matter.

A certification examination is to be conducted on July 1 by the Texas Department of Agriculture at the same location.

Persons planning to attend the workshop must preregister by writing to Carl D.



#### Newspaper editor grows daily bread **By Helen Woody**

What started as a Bicentennial project last year has become a means of providing the Carlson family with flour for whole wheat bread. Clarendon newspaper editor Lowell Carlson grew several plots of wheat as an experiment to learn first hand how traditional hand harvesting methods worked and also harvest enough wheat for Mrs. Carlson who bakes all the bread and pastries the family eats.

"Because Brenda bakes such a wide variety of breads it seemed only natural to try to produce the wheat ourselves too," said Carlson. Carlson had several local blacksmiths modify an old garden tractor mower so that it would bunch the grain as the mower cut through the

wheat. The tractor is an old 1946 Planet Jr. given to Carlson along with a line of implements. "The most fun is cutting

the grain," said Carlson. "Listening to the sound of the sickle sections cut the straw reminds me of being

back on the farm in Iowa." Carlson is less enthralled with the actual flailing and cleaning of the grain describing it as just plain

that a good wind is indespensible to clean the grain by winnowing.

good experience for anyone. It makes you more appreciative of what you have to eat and makes us proud to know that we raised the grain that goes into the bread Brenda bakes," explained Carlson.

Last year when Carlson first flailed wheat he had a problem with broken flail sticks and finally solved the problem by attaching an oak stick to the end of an old mop handle.

"You learn a rhythm when swinging the flail. The best way to learn how early farmers threshed wheat by hand is to do it. I thresh several bunches of wheat on the canvas before finally winnowing the grain from the chaff," said Carlson.

Describing themselves as not being food fadists but simply interested in growing as much food as they can themselves, the Carlsons use a small grist mill to grind the wheat for flour. It takes two grinds to get acceptable flour and they cautioned that it would be well to refrigerate the flour once ground because everything from the grain is still in the flour-oils, bran and all.

Mrs. Carlson admits the family's tastes don't run to bread that's all whole wheat and she uses some bleached flour to make a lighter loaf of bread. Using family recipes Brenda bakes bread and rolls using the home-grown grain. "I can't honestly tell you the last time we had store-bought bread in the house. We just don't eat
