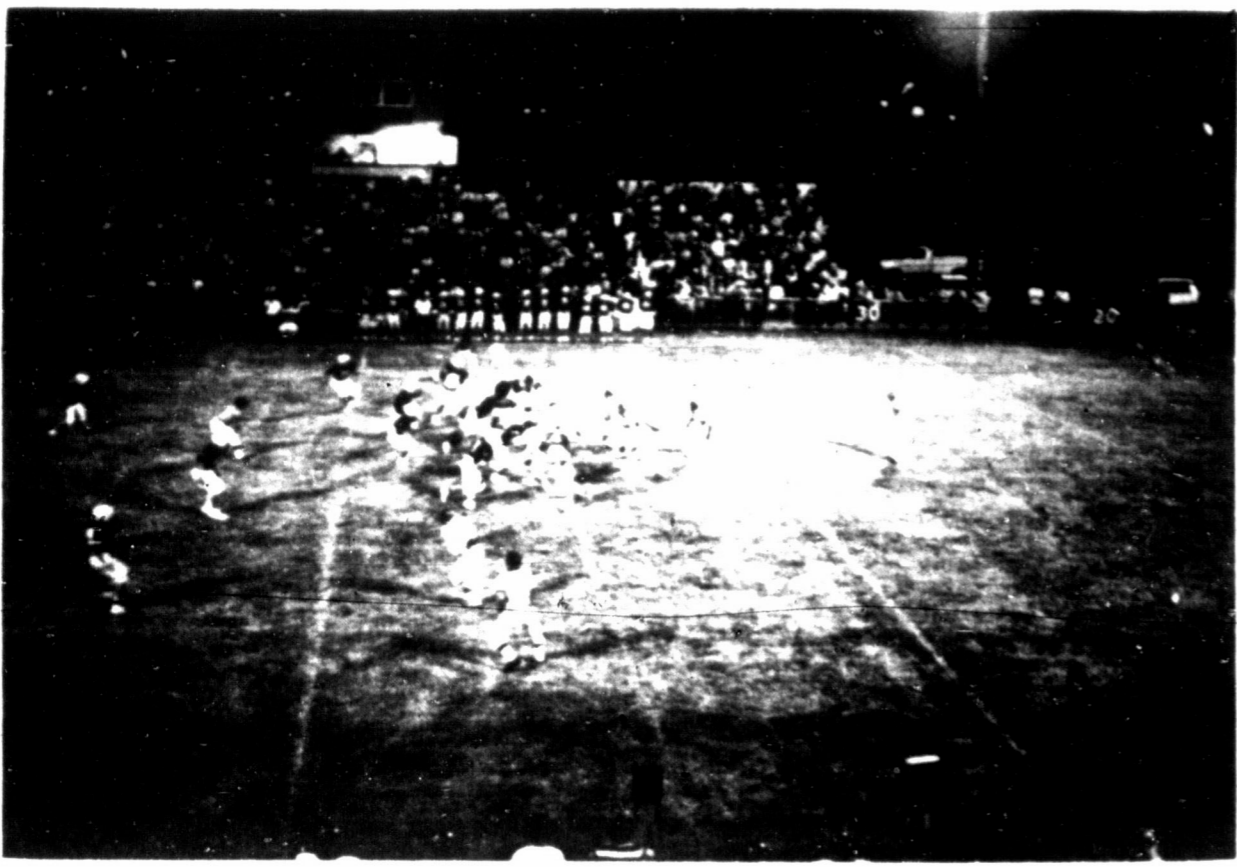

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Green Thumb program means greenbacks

The Green Thumb program is bringing in a few extra greenbacks for nine local senior citizens. Delighted to have the opportunity of employment Mrs. Beulah Carlile, who just turned eighty said, "This will help me pay my taxes and utilities and help get us through Christmas."

The Green Thumb program is a public service employment and training program, which officially went into effect in Clarendon Sept. 2. This program is sponsored by Nat'l Farmers Union under contract and grant with the U.S. Dept. of Labor, Employment and Training Administration. The purpose of the program is to employ 100 low-income rural persons to carry out community betterment and conservation projects. This program is designed to strengthen existing community services and to provide special services in helping the aged shut in and handicapped.

To qualify for employment on the program, a person must be at least 65 years of age, have an annual income below the Federal poverty line, pass a medical examination, and have a high school diploma or GED. Information concerning application for employment may be obtained by contacting Mrs. Ruth Mills, coordinator of the local Senior Citizens Center, 200 S. Main St., Clarendon, Texas. She has been allocated funds for hiring only ten people for each of these positions, but been

filled. Mrs. Mills would like to have more men in the program and two million dollar loan for \$2.50 per hr. would be welcome.

The program is to provide a 24 hr. work week for these employees receive time paid holidays plus their medical and two weeks annual leave.

Local citizens presently employed Green Thumbs are Mrs. Della Brown, age 80, works as city library assistant Mrs. Justice stated she hopes to continue the

books in the city library. She will work with Ida Smith, city librarian.

Mrs. Rhina Ketchum, age 71, plans to work in the city office at Hedley.

Mr. Raymond Hinkle, age 77, provides transportation for the employees to and from work, he delivers meals to senior citizens and shut-ins, he drives senior citizens to and from the Senior Citizens Center, he does heavier type work at the Center such as handling the tables and chairs, and closes the Center when Mrs. Mills is not available.

Mrs. Mary Mann, age 66, works as Kitchen Aid and assists as hostess at the Center.

Mrs. Norma Corgill, age 68, provides telephone reimbursement to shut-ins and senior citizens, and to those without transportation to the Center. She calls senior citizens each day at a certain time, and if she receives no answer she sends someone to see about that person.

Mrs. Beulah, age 80, serves as recreation assistant and nurses aid at Donley Co. Medical Center.

Mrs. Inez Skinner, age 72, also serves as recreation assistant and nurses aid at Donley Co. Medical Center.

Mrs. Quata Phillips, age 76, works as Kitchen Aid and assists as hostess at Senior Citizens Center.

Farmers must report acreage

IMPORTANT!! Additional 1977 acreage reports needed!

We have been advised that it is necessary for farm operators to report ALL crops and land use acreages for the 1977 crop year in preparation for the 1978 farm program.

Even if you have already reported your wheat, cotton and feed grains, it is necessary for you to come in and report land use on the rest of your cropland as soon as possible. This could be very important to you under the 1978 farm program.

At the time you reported your wheat, cotton and feed grains, we had no way of knowing the other crops would have to be reported.

Farm storage and drying equipment loan program:

The following changes have been made:

1. Maximum term of loan is changed to 8 years from 5 years.
2. Maximum number of installments is changed to 7 from 4.
3. Borrower may obtain loan for less than maximum term.

Loan rates:

Corn - \$2.08 per bushel.
Grain Sorghum - \$3.36 per hundred.
Cotton - \$44.65 per lb. SEM White 1-1-16.

Loans are available at the Donley County ASCS Office.

Failed acreage:

If you have cotton or feed grain acreage that fails due to natural disaster and you are not going to harvest for lint or grain, that acreage must be appraised before destruction of the crop in order to receive failed acreage credit for that crop.

Farmers Home Administration

A more liberal formula for determining the amount of grant funds, supplementing loans available for improvement of rural community water systems affected by drought, has been put into effect in Donley County by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). The agency's County Supervisor, Robert

A. Keown, announced this week.

Donley County has been made eligible for FmHA emergency loans and grants under President Carter's drought assistance program to help communities having

diminished water supplies, resulting from drought conditions, in designated drought areas. Applications for projects approved must be made in time for funds to be obligated by Sept. 30,

1977. County Supervisor Keown said the revised regulations will enable FmHA to apply a formula on grants similar to that used by other federal agencies that help to finance drought emergency water system projects.

In calculating a community's ability to repay an emergency loan for water system improvement, FmHA previously has taken into account existing indebtedness only for water facilities. The new formula lets FmHA take into account the applicant's existing indebtedness for all purposes. This is expected to increase the grant portion of FmHA funding of many projects.

The new regulation also provides that some projects, previously not eligible for grant assistance, may receive FmHA grants of up to 20 percent of total eligible

project development costs, if they are needed to safeguard public health and safety. A larger proportion of grant funds, up to 50 percent, may be provided if justified through the formula for determining the community's ability to repay a loan.

Application of the revised formula has been made retroactive to May 6, 1977, except where loan and grant funds have been delivered to the borrower. Financing of projects previously approved but not yet undid will be adjusted to the new formula, Keown said.

In addition to the Sept. 30, 1977, deadline for obligation of funds, the drought emergency program imposes an April 30, 1978, deadline for completion of projects. Communities of up to 10,000 population may be included in the service areas of water

system receiving FmHA loans and grants. Loans are made for terms of up to 40 years, at an interest rate of 5 percent.

Mr. Keown said information on project assistance can be obtained from FmHA's Donley County office at Agriculture Building in Clarendon.

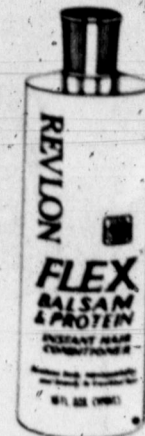
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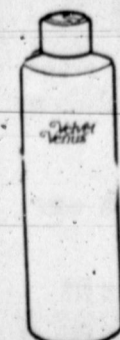

Hazel reported that J.R. spent a bit of time worrying about the equipment, but that she just enjoyed the trip and had a real nice time.

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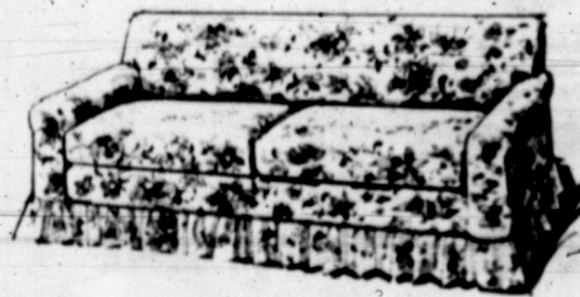
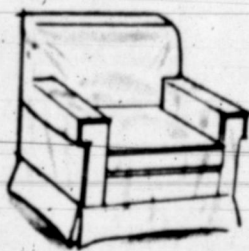
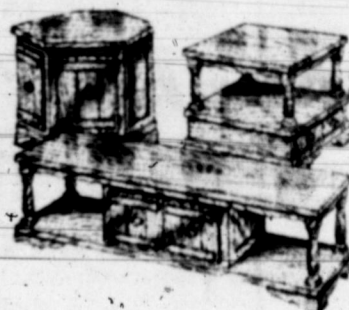
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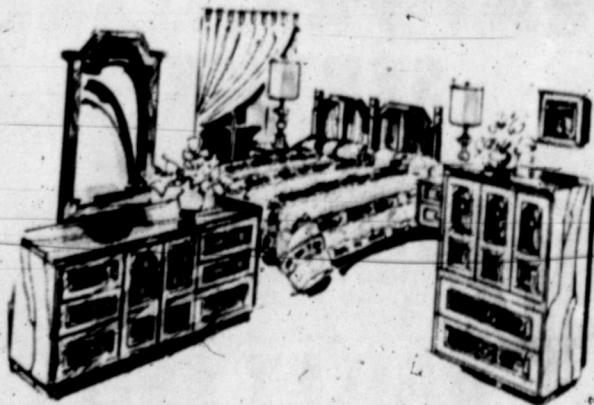
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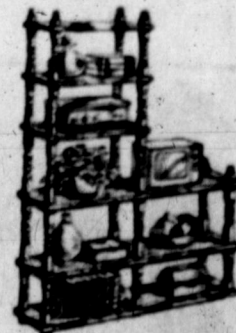
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FAITH ONLY WILL NOT SAVE

A popular religious doctrine of our age is that all one has to do to be saved is to believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. Can such a doctrine, while comforting, actually be supported by the sacred scriptures?

That faith is essential to salvation, no serious reader of the Bible could deny. The Hebrew writer declares, "Without faith, it is impossible to please him; for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him" (Hebrews 11:6).

The question, then, is not whether faith is necessary to salvation, but whether faith alone is sufficient. The plain and simple Bible answer is "No." The Bible teaches that faith will save, but it must be a certain kind of faith. It must be an alive, active, obedient faith. A dead faith cannot save. The New Testament contains a number of examples of people who believed, who had faith, who even believed in the divinity of Christ—but who were not saved.

The Chief Rulers

"Nevertheless among the chief rulers also many believed on him; but because of the Pharisees they did not confess him, lest they should be put out of the synagogue. For they loved the praise of men more than the praise of God" (John 12:42,43). Let us remember, in this connection, that Jesus said: "Whosoever shall deny me before men, him will I deny before my father which is in heaven" (Matthew 10:33).

Jews on Pentecost

When Peter preached the first gospel sermon on the day of Pentecost, thousands of Jews became believers as the Word of God was spoken. But they were yet unsaved believers for they asked, "What shall we do?" Peter answered those believers, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38).

The Devils

Even the devils believe, according to the Bible, but they are not saved. "Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well: the devils also believe, and tremble" (James 2:19).

These examples prove conclusively that a person can believe on Jesus Christ as the Son of God and still be eternally lost. It takes more than "faith only."

Finally, the Bible teaches clearly that faith will save (Ephesians 2:8), but it must be a "faith which worketh by love" (Galatians 5:6). Jesus said: "If ye love me ye will keep my commandments" (John 14:15).

First United Methodist Church boasts a proud heritage

First in a series commemorating Clarendon's Centennial

CLARENDON METHODIST in 1890

In 1876, Henry Lewis Carhart, an enthusiastic young Methodist minister from Sherman, Texas made his first trip to the Plains of Texas. About this time, he began establishing a "Christian Colony", and by the early 1880's the colony was well developed and could boast a Methodist Church building of adobe. This church served the early settlers well until the townsite of Clarendon was moved in 1887 with the coming of the Fort Worth & Denver railroad.

In 1887, the Rev. J.T. Hosmer, circuit riding Methodist preacher out of Vernon came to Clarendon and held services, but the

Church was not organized formally until 1888 under the leadership of Rev. Isaac L. Mills, with fifteen charter members, among whom were: Mr. & Mrs. P.A. Buntin, Mrs. M.O. Rogers, Miss Susie Rogers, Mr. & Mrs. Frank E. Caraway, Mr. & Mrs. J.H. Roberts, Mr. & Mrs. A.M. Beville, and Harwood Beville. Rev. Mills continued as pastor of Clarendon Mission, including Clarendon and surrounding points, until the fall of 1890. During the year 1890 the first frame church building was erected. This building was located at the southeast corner of Kearney & 4th Streets. (The present site of the Day Care Playground). Within about two years the growth of the congregation made it necessary to enlarge the building, so an addition was made which very greatly changed the appearance of the building. In this building the congregation worshiped until the new brick building was erected in 1910 under the pastorate of Rev. O.P. Kiker at a cost of approximately \$40,000. These necessary funds were raised by popular subscription and by 1920 the church debt was paid.

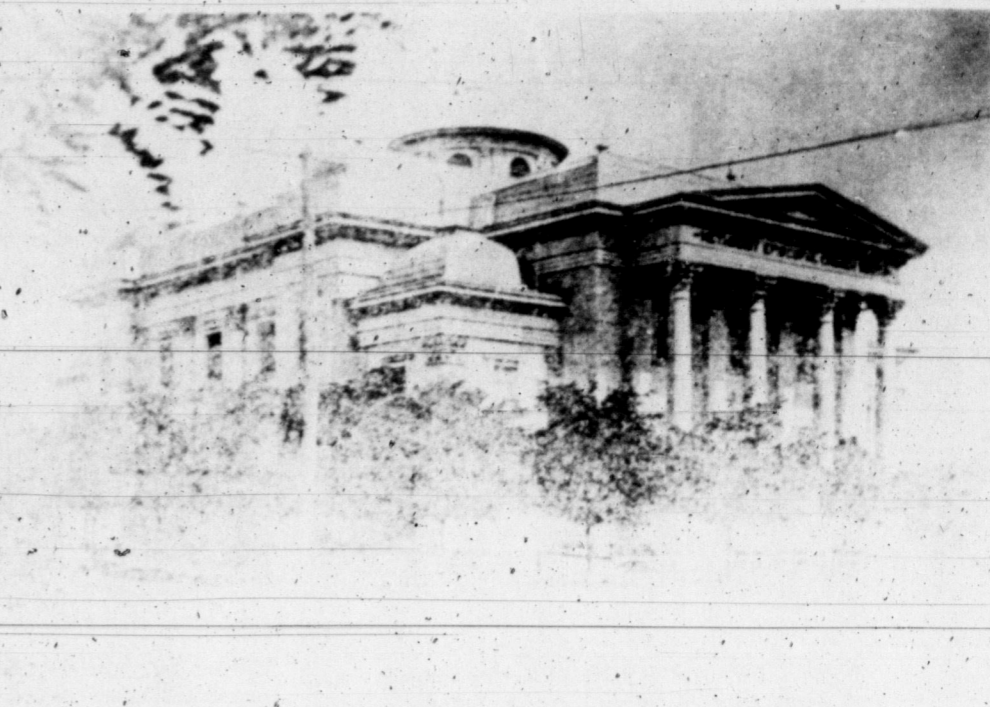
According to a post card dated Dec. 1910 "published reports say the First United Methodist Church of Clarendon, Texas is the largest and costliest Methodist Church in the United States in a town that is no larger than Clarendon." In 1910 the population of Clarendon was approximately 6,000.

The first service held in the new church was the annual meeting of the Northwest Texas Conference. Since that occasion the Clarendon Church has hosted the conference meeting several times.

For many years the roof of the church building, with its beautiful dome that was admired by all, often leaked after heavy rains causing inside damage. Great expense and effort was entailed in trying to keep the roof in proper repair. Finally during the pastorate of Rev. John English (1949-1952) the building was reroofed and thus completely took on a new appearance.

Some outstanding people who have served the church or who grew up in the church include: Bishop Kenneth Pope; Bishop Gaston Foote; P.W. Walker, author of "Of Hounds and Men"; Stewart Hamblin, song writer, "It Is No Secret"; Dr. Eby Stocking, professor Okla. State University.

Today, the church is pastored by Rev. Robert W. Brown Sr. and is faithfully served by the following church officials: Chairman of Administrative Board - Jerry Courtney; Lay Leader - Bill Porter; Chairman Board of Trustees - Luther Butler; Chairman of Finance - Willard Skelton; Church Treasurer - Viola

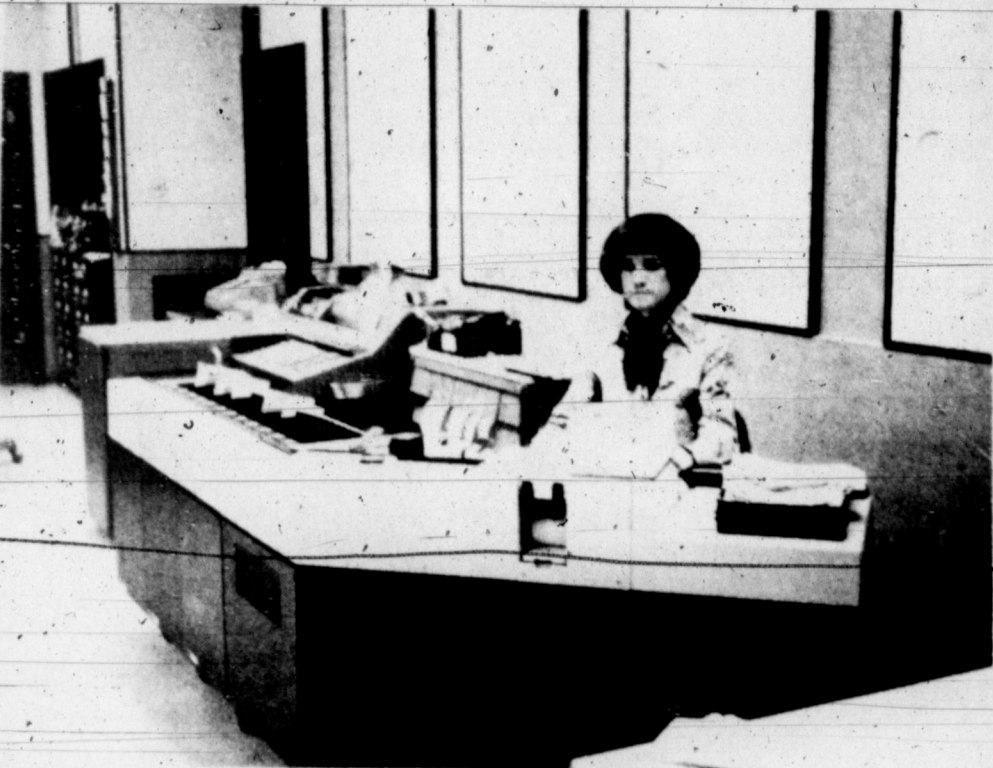

34,943.4 acres of cotton in Donley County

With an increase of more than 11,000 acres of cotton planted in the county this year the total acres for Donley County is 34,943.4. At present prospects look good for the cotton farmer. While cotton acreage increased, grain sorgham planting dropped by at least 33 1/3 % over the previous year to approximately 15,000 acres. High production costs and low market prices influenced planted acreages.

For the first time in a number of years area orchards weathered the freezes, hail and other natural phenomenon posing hazards. Record crops of peaches provided a cash summer crop this year. In addition to peaches, apples, grapes, pears, and melons, watermelons and cantaloupe did well.

It is an anxious time for some of the farmers from the time they lay by, until crops are at the elevator or gin, for market prices may change drastically or the elements prove fickle.
