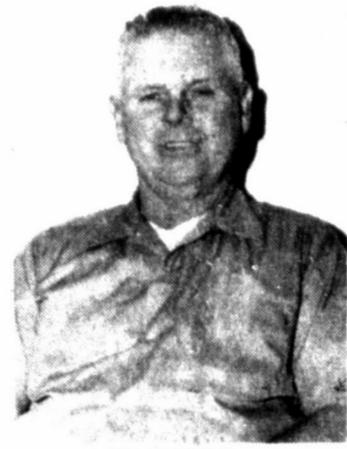

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County Precinct Commissioner's race--candidates, job profiled

The 'Press' this week profiles all candidates running for County Precinct Commissioners. In Pct. 1, Incumbent Gene White is being challenged by J.H. (Junior) Spier. Pct. 3 Commissioner, Junior Hill, has two opponents for his job, Buford Holland and C.C. Ayers, both of Hedley.

Along with thumbnail sketches of all candidates, the position itself is outlined. Responsibilities of the commissioners court, along with salaries and benefits will be discussed.

The four Donley County Precinct Commissioners along with Judge Billy Christal comprise this county's commissioners court, which is the governing body of the county.

As a group, the court is responsible for conducting all county business. They set all county policy, control salary amounts of all county officials, elected and other-

wise, approve payment of all bills, set the county tax rate and equalize taxes, see to the repair of all county properties and hear all complaints concerning the county.

Individually, each precinct commissioner is responsible for maintaining dirt and caliche roads in his precinct. To do this, each precinct commissioner has his own equipment and personnel. The amount of equipment and number of personnel varies in the four precincts, depending upon the miles of dirt and caliche roads present.

Salary of all four precinct commissioners is the same. Standard salary for each is \$4,056 a year plus another \$1,506 for car expenses, making a total yearly income of \$5,556. Each employee of the precinct earns \$6,036 a year.

The commissioners budget money for their precincts individually in three major funds: Road and Bridge Fund; Lateral Road Fund;

and Farm to Market Road Fund.

Due to money management, varying operating expenses and different amounts of money carried over from the previous year, each precinct has different amounts of money in these three funds.

The Lateral Road fund is not financed by county money but rather from state funds derived from Texas' gasoline tax. This past year, each precinct was given \$4,664 for this fund.

Money for the Road and Bridge and Farm to Market funds are derived from county Ad Valorem taxes. Ad Valorem taxes are taxes placed upon real property (i.e., land or a home) and personal property (i.e., a car).

From Ad Valorem taxes, Pcts. 1 and 4 receive 22 percent of the money collected. Pcts. 2 and 3 receive 28 percent. These two receive more money because their districts have more roads and bridges to be maintained and the soil

in this half of the county erodes quicker than the other half.

While these two precincts receive a greater amount of taxes, they also have greater monthly expenses. Pcts. 2 and 3 employ two men as road hands and maintain two motor graders while Pcts. 1 and 4 employ one man each and maintain one motor-grader each.

As of March 1 this year, the amounts of money each precinct had in each of these three funds were:

Road and Bridge Fund -- Pct. 1, \$31,149; Pct. 2, \$33,560; Pct. 3, \$14,127; and Pct. 4, \$16,127.

Lateral Road Fund -- Pct. 1, \$8,278; Pct. 2, \$5,944; Pct. 3, \$2,415; and Pct. 4, \$900.

Farm to Market Fund -- Pct. 1, \$8,931; Pct. 2, \$6,334; Pct. 3, \$6,365; and Pct. 4, \$6,327.

In addition to these figures, money was withdrawn from Pcts. 1 and 2 funds during February and invested as certificates of

deposits. Ten Thousand dollars from Pct. 1 and \$15,000 from Pct. 2 were taken from their Road and Bridge Fund amounts and invested as CDs. From the Farm to Market fund, Pct. 1 invested \$10,000 of its monies and Pct. 2 invested \$10,000. From the Lateral Road Fund, Pct. 1 has invested \$5,000 and Pct. 2, \$10,000.

This money is invested in 30 day periods. At the end of 30 days, all money above what will be required for precinct operation for the next 30 days is re-invested. Interest derived from all county CD investments is placed in the County General Fund.

Registered voters in the four precincts have not been tabulated for 1976. According to the 1975 list, however, Pct. 1 had 630 registered voters; Pct. 2, 902; Pct. 3, 595; and Pct. 4, 332.

Incumbent in Pct. 1, Gene White, 42, is one of three partners operating Wallace

Monument here. He was elected Clarendon city alderman when that position was first created in 1965. He remained an alderman for three terms until 1971. He was elected as Pct. 1 Commissioner in 1973. He has also served as president of the country club; on the First Methodist Church Board of Directors; and is currently treasurer of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, an organization which helps city and county governments obtain federal and state funds. He and his wife, Doris, have a daughter, Kim, aged 15; and a son, Mark, 13.

His opponent in Pct. 1 is longtime Clarendon businessman J.H. (Junior) Spier, 54. Spier was owner and operator of Junior's Food Market for almost 25 years here. He has served as president of both the Clarendon Lions Club and the local Chamber of Commerce and has been involved in various civic

functions during the years. Spier, a lifelong resident of the county, and his wife Wilma have three sons: Lynn Spier, of Washington D.C.; and Bill and Dale Spier, both of Clarendon.

Precinct 3 Incumbent, Junior Hill, 50, has served in that office for 12 years, winning three terms since 1964. Hill, a longtime stock farmer in the Hedley area, has lived in Donley County most of his life. He is a member of the Hedley Baptist Church. He and his wife Martha Nell have five children: Mrs. Pete (Loretta Jo) Ham of Pasco, Washington; Johnny Hill of Hedley; Mrs. Leon (Carol) Ward of Hedley; Jeffrey Lynn; and Sherrie Gail, a 7th grader.

Buford Holland, 52, a stock farmer at Hedley, previously ran for precinct commissioner in 1972. He is a lifelong resident of Donley County and has served a total of 17 years as a school board member in the county, first at Lelia Lake and later at

Hedley. He is currently a member of the Hedley Lions Club, the Farm Bureau, and the Hedley First Baptist Church. He and his wife, Geraldine, have two sons, Darrell and Glyndol, both of Hedley; and one daughter, Mrs. Johnny (Gail) Hill of Clarendon. The Holland's also have five grandchildren.

C.C. Ayers, 72, longtime Hedley stock farmer, currently serves on the board of directors for the Donley County Medical Center. He served a total of 24 years as a member of the school boards for first, the Windy Valley School System and later the Lelia Lake system. He is also a past president and director of the Donley County Farm Bureau and is currently a member of the Hedley Church of Christ. He and his wife, Grace, have five children: Mrs. George (Lola) Moore of Amarillo; Joe Ayers of Houston; Ralph C. Ayers of Belton; Dale Ayers of Albuquerque, New Mexico; and Mrs. Ted (Marilyn) Swindle of Austin.

This week's feature, Western Skies Motel

Dave Croslin and his wife Maureta bought the Bagby Motel in 1967, renaming it the Western Skies.

"We thought it was as good a name as any," Croslin said.

He and his family moved from Shamrock where Croslin had worked with the highway patrol. The Motel business wasn't entirely new to him, however. His parents had been in the motel business until they retired.

Croslin said "probably 75 percent" of his business is repeat customers. These fall in to roughly two categories, tourists and "commercial." Commercial are salesmen and businessmen who must travel too far from home to drive back at night.

Tourists, he said, come primarily from the large metropolitan cities within a day's travel of Clarendon

who are either going to the mountains (Houston residents off for a ski trip to the Denver area) or to the coast (A Colorado Springs citizen wanting to swim at Galveston.) He said Clarendon was a good mid-way point for traveling tourists.

Summertime is the best season for motel owners. During these months the motel stays "pretty well full all the time," he said.

Wintertime, however, is another story. "The worst enemy of motel owners is not the weather, its weathermen," He cited last winter when television forecasters in the Dallas-Fort Worth area repeatedly predicted blizzard conditions for the Panhandle area. "Not just snow, mind you, but blizzard conditions, and half the time it didn't even snow."

Travelers from Central Texas refused to attempt ski trips with weather predic-

tions like that. Croslin said, motel owners in Amarillo finally contacted the television media around Dallas-Fort Worth and asked them to tone down some of their predictions.

The everyday business of running a motel appears to be hectic enough without added complications like weather. Croslin said every room at a motel has to always be ready because, "you never know which room or how many you're going to rent. A line of cars could come in with the people all wanting rooms side by side."

When the Motel is full, Croslin "rough guessed" they launder 75-80 sheets and 200-250 wash cloths and towels a day.

Along with the job of keeping everything clean is the "little things that always go haywire," at a motel.

The Western Skies has 22 rooms, each room equipped

with heating and cooling systems, color T.V.s, lamps, telephones -- all of which can have some small something go wrong, not to mention plumbing and electrical problems that sometimes appear.

Another problem is one Croslin said is not unique to motel owners but still a costly one -- guests taking towels with them. He said he added up his towel bill in 1973 and he spent approximately \$1,500 for new bath linen. "I haven't figured it since," he said, "I don't want to know."

Employees at the motel besides Croslin and his wife are Alberta Adkins and Ismanell Gray, who were working there even before Croslin bought it, Billie Ashcraft, Della Allen and Louella Hinton.

Croslin and his wife have three children: Randy, aged 19; Cindy, 13; and Dalyn, 10.

Western Conference recruiting--money, time, insight and luck

Consider what it takes to recruit high school basketball talent for a winning college team in the Western Conference.

Elements of money, time, game knowledge, human insight and plain luck blend to produce what Clarendon College Basketball Coach Gene Davis wants next year. "Ten guys ready to practice and play for a full season."

Davis said he will offer 12 full scholarships, the majority probably going to new players. Davis added, the playing ability of these new additions has to be good to compete in the Western Conference. "There's not a doubt this is one of the best junior college conferences in the country. Personally, I think it is the best."

To illustrate his point, Davis pointed out Western Texas in Snyder, Clarendon College's conference rival, which won the Junior College National Tournament last year defeating teams representing the 16 regions across the U.S. Players from the Western Conference are also heavily recruited by larger universities after graduation. Mike Russell, the Texas Tech player who made the winning basket against Texas A & M that put Tech into National play this year, originally played

at New Mexico Junior College. A recent ex-player from Amarillo College now plays for the San Antonio Spurs, a professional ABA team.

Outstanding high school players from all across the U.S. come to the Western Conference to play. Some want to start out in a smaller college. For some, however, grades are the reason. If their high school marks weren't high enough for admission to larger universities, players can complete 48 hours of junior college work maintaining a "C" average and be scholastically eligible for admission almost anywhere.

Davis said the best high school basketball in the country today is being played in Indiana and the Louisville area of Kentucky. He returned recently from a six day trip to that area, checking out prospects in Indianapolis, Louisville, Little Rock and Oklahoma City while attending about 20 basketball games.

"We want to give players from the Panhandle first opportunity to play for us," Davis said, "and we're going to offer some scholarships to area players. But we also have to supplement our team with nationwide players."

During the Christmas break this year, Davis attended 64 games in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, Arkansas, and Illinois.

When at home, he also drove to area cities looking for possible players whenever the Bulldogs weren't scheduled to play.

Other recruiting elements also have to be considered assuming there is the necessary time and money. Knowledge of the game and what constitutes a winning team is basic. "To make a team," Davis said, "you need three or four kids 6'6" or better and fast, ball-handling, 6'3" guards. Any player with only 6 ft. height has got to be a 'special' player." Ability isn't the only consideration when selecting players, Davis said. Here, some human insight is needed. "To sum it up, we want basketball players that are good students and good citizens. If they're going to make trouble or lay up in their beds and not go to class, we don't want them."

To do this, Davis said he talks with persons close to the players about such things as grades, family and character. He also talks to the players, finding out things about them and telling them what to expect if they play for Clarendon College.

If its all agreeable, Davis said, the player signs a letter of intent. The letter doesn't mean he'll come to play, however.

In junior college basketball, the intent letter is not legally binding and if the player signs with another school the only stipulation is he cannot play for a team in the same conference as others he has signed with. "So after you sign the guy," Davis said, "your only worry is if some other school is going to steal him. I've heard of one player who signed with five schools."

Recruiting isn't the only way to get players, however. Occasionally, Davis said, conference teams get "walk-on" players, who try-out without ever being recruited. He said he'd never gotten one, however, but would encourage anyone wanting to try out to do so. Even if they don't start, they would benefit the team in work-outs, he said.

But most players are obtained through hours of recruiting time, and in some cases, a little luck. Davis said he recruited one of his best players this year, Terry Blanks, by simply being in the right place at the right time. According to Davis, "I've heard more than one recruiter say it. The players you work the hardest for don't turn out to be your best kids." In recruiting, it seems, that's the way it goes.

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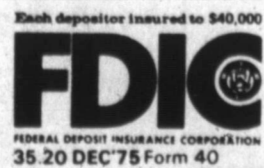


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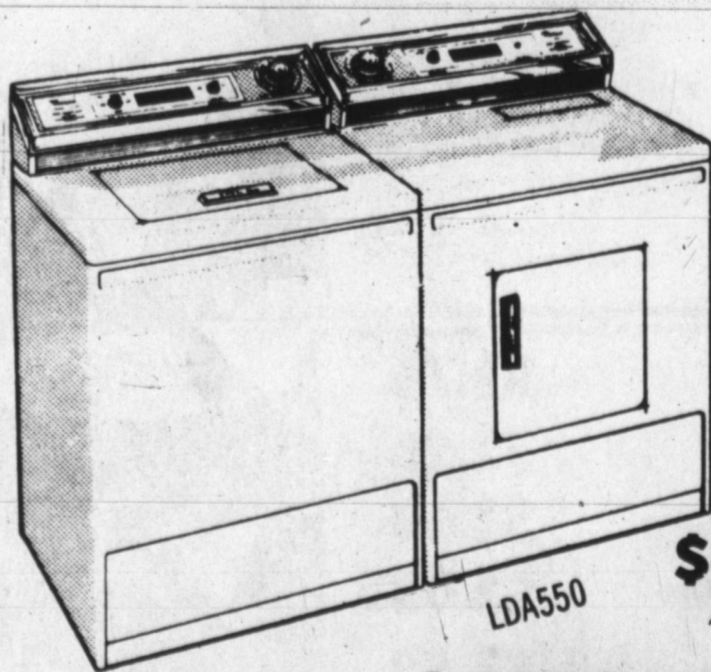
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Teams place at Quanah track meet
