# Donors sought for county blood drive

By DONNY L. BROWN

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will return to Clarendon Monday, April 26, to obtain the second series of blood donations from local residents.

The blood service will be set up on the stage of the Harned Sisters Auditorium at Clarendon College from 1:45 - 5:30 p.m.

Twice a year, residents of Donley County donate 90 units of blood to maintain their membership in the Red River Regional Red Cross Blood Program. The first blood drive was undertaken last October in Clarendon. Over 100 units of blood were donated at that time.

Age limits for donors are from 17 to 66 years. A County make each resident here. He and a volunteer seventeen-year-old must have parental permission to donate. This consent is not needed if donor is married.

donors age 66 or over may give if they have written dated with two weeks of the weeks.

Membership in the program entitles every resident of Donley County to unlimited supplies of blood if needed. Reverend Pettigrew Hamilton, local blood program chairman, stressed that this blood may be obtained anywhere in the U.S. persons requiring blood should contact him or a Red Cross office, he said.
